DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pierce-Davis Farm c. 1870 is a 2½ story five bay by one room center hall single pile stuccoed frame house on Wards Hill Road, just east of Route 282, at Cash Corner. The house faces north with the main gable running east/west.

The main block has a two story three bay by one room ell kitchen wing to the south. The entire house rests on a fieldstone foundation with a partial basement under the dining room. The entire youse was sheathed with weatherboard but has been completely stuccoed. The main block is covered with a steeply pitched seamed tin south slope and composition tile north slope. The kitchen roof is also seamed tin with a less of a pitch.

The north (main) facade of the house is symmetrically oriented with a central entrance and corresponding 6/6 sash windows with plain surrounds but no shutters. The entrance retains its four panel door with two light sidelights and three light transom which are framed by a heavily molded surround. The pintels remain, however. A central cross gable is flanked by two 6/6 sash dormers with extended eaves with simple supportive brackets. This was set in below the main cornice and above the attic light for added emphasis. The cornice is also molded with cyma curves and a bed molding. A front porch used to stretch across the entire first floor but has since been reduced to a single central bay porch supported by square columns with rectangular inset. The base is molded as are the capitals. The shed roof has a molded cornice with scrolled brackets at each front corner. Between the posts is an arched decorative fill with clover-leaves cutout in each corner and a central pendant drop.

The east and west ends of the main block are similar with a few first and second floor 6/6 sash with attic lights, which flank the interior end brick stacks.

The south side of the main block is covered partially by the rear wing but the three eastern bays are exposed. 6/6 lights illuminate the first and second floor. Two simple 6/6 sash dormers with fluted pilasters light the attic from the south.

The rear kitchen wing is primarily plain with a side entrance with adjacent 6/6 sash windows. A small gabled hood protects the doorway. A boxed cornice stretches across the second floor windows. The eave is extended on the end with short returns. A central brick chimney rises out of the kitchen wing. A single story single bay by single bay shed addition is to the east side and covers the inside corner.

The front block consists on a center hall with flanking parlors. The main stair has a chamfered post with molded base and grooved sides. Applied roundals decorate the top portion of the post and it is capped with a round finial with reeded horizontal band. A molded handrail is supported by turned balusters. The stringer is fairly plain and the triangular area below is plastered. The stair rises openly to the third floor. The four panel parlor doors are elaborately grained. The mantels have simple pilasters with a plain frieze, bed molding, and thick shelf. The dining room has a similar mantel with an adjacent beaded board door to the second floor rooms. No significant late 19th century farm structures remain with the house. A small storage shed with block foundation and vertical board sheathing sits directly east of the kitchen wing.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Pierce-Davis Farmhouse is another example of the widely used "Georgian" I-house form in Cecil County. This structure has retained most of its architectural details although it has been stuccoed. Less common decorative forms were employed in constructing this house and therefore possesses more architectural significance as a late 19th century farmhouse. The interior graining and woodwork is also worthy of note. George R. Pierce owned the house in 1877 and is listed on the patron list for the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson Atlas as a farmer of 60 acres whose family came from Sussex Co., Delaware around 1843. The farm was owned by George Davis of Delaware according to the Martenet Map of 1858. Whether the present structure was there ^{in 1858} is not known but highly unlikely.
