The Benedict Road House, also known as Patuxent City Farm, is a rare example of a central-passage, single-pile dwelling of the latter half of the 19th century in Charles County. The house features a formal 5-bay facade and two gable end double-flue brick chimneys. The building is also characterized by its 2-story, full-width front porch capped by a substantial front gable. This feature is likely a later 19th century addition, but is significant as a common feature of dwellings in the area, especially in the nearby town of Benedict prior to the early 20th century fire.

The house is in poor condition with its windows and doors removed. However, the roof appears to be in good condition as are the two exterior end chimneys. Built between 1840 and 1870, the house is located in the early commercial village of Patuxent City.

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The Benedict Road House, also known as Patuxent City Farm, is a good example of a central-passage, single-pile plan dwelling of the latter half of the 19th century. The house is in poor condition with its windows and doors removed. However, the roof appears to be in good condition as are the two exterior end chimneys. Built between 1840 and 1870, the house is located in the early commerical village of Patuxent City.

Located on a 56.75-acre parcel on the north side of Route 231 (Prince Frederick-Benedict Road) near its intersection with Route 381 (Brandywine Road), the house sits very close to Route 231, facing south. The property slopes down at the rear and several mature trees dot the property.

The house consists of a 2-story single-pile side gable dwelling with a full-width 2-story front porch. Set on a continuous brick foundation, the house is sheathed in wood weatherboard and features two double-flue exterior gable end chimneys, one on either end. A 1-1/2-story frame wing sitting on a continuous brick foundation extends off the west gable end. It also is clad with weatherboard. In addition, an enclosed rear porch extends across the width of the main house and overlaps onto the west wing.

The 2-story front porch is crowned by a sizable center gable that contains a single round-headed window. The porch has been altered by the reconstruction of the first floor using poured concrete and block, and by the replacement of the porch posts. The porch ceiling is composed of beaded matchstick paneling.

Divided into the five bays, the building's facade is characterized by a centered entry, now missing its door, and by the symmetrical placement of two windows to either side of the entrance. This design is repeated above on the second story where a single-leaf door provides access the the second story piazza.

Either gable end of the house is broken only by two small 2/2 sash windows set in the upper story gable and flanking the chimney stack.

The rear wall of the house reflects a similar organization as the facade. The second story windows are placed identically to those of the facade. However, the first story of the original house is covered by the 1-story enclosed porch. This porch is clad in wood weatherboard and is pierced by three windows and one door. The only remaining element here is the single-leaf 4-panrel wood door

that provides access to this enclosed porch. The last bay on the east end of the rear porch enclosure has lost its north wall.

The 1-1/2-story west wing is pierced on its facade by a single-leaf entrance and a single window missing its sash. The wing's gable end features a single window on the first story and two 2/2 wood sash windows in the gable. The rear of the wing is covered by a 1-story porch. The porch is accessed from the wing via a single leaf door on its north wall.

The dwelling's interior is in very poor condition, and only the first floor was surveyed. The first floor contains a center stair hall/passage with a open dog-leg stair that is severely deteriorated, and two flanking rooms. A single room occupies the first story of the wing, and the rear porch enclosure is divided into two rooms and a hall.

The remaining interior finishes consist of random width tongue-and-groove flooring, reciprocal sawn lath with plaster finishing, and convex, Greek Revival style window and door casings. The heavy timber framed structure incorporates hewn framing members and brick nogged walls. The west wing is nogged as well although there appears to be a break in the foundation between the main block and the wing.

The most remarkable feature of the house is the massive base on the western gable end chimney. The base extends far into the first floor room of the west wing and has been whitewashed. It was difficult to determine whether there was once a firebox on the wing side of the chimney.

None of the original mantels remain, and the stair has been stripped of its decoration. The few remaining interior doors consist of 4-panel single-leaf doors like the one opening off the rear porch enclosure.

There are no outbuildings associated with the dwelling.

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The Benedict Road House is a rare example of a central-passage, single-pile frame house from the mid-19th century in Charles County. The house features a formal 5-bay facade and two gable end double-flue brick chimneys. The building is also characterized by its 2-story, full-width front porch capped by a substantial front gable. This feature is likely a later 19th century addition, but is significant as a common feature of dwellings in the area, especially in the town of Benedict prior to the early 20th century fire. The house was likely built between 1840 and 1870 in the early-19th century village of Patuxent City.

The Benedict Road House stand within the 19th century village of Patuxent City, and at one time was known as Patuxent City Farm. Patuxent City, located near Old Fields Church on the Highesville-Benedict Road (now Route 231), once boasted a store, blacksmith shop, and a number of dwellings located on relatively small lots lining the main road. It appears that the town developed during the early 19th century as one of the several trade centers that grew up at crossroads across the county. Today, only a handful of original buildings remain in Patuxent City. These include Patuxent City House (18th century, CH-122), Old Fields Chapel (CH-112), the Herbert House (19th century, CH-119), and the Benedict Road House.

The Benedict Road House was a substantial dwelling of the time, and at one time fashionably finished. Its original owner was likely a local merchant, who may have run the store located on the adjacent lot. Both buildings were sited prominently on a main thoroughfare. A 1911 survey map that was drawn to indicate the division of Jeremiah Dudley's property labels the 54.5-acre parcel upon which the house stands as "Patuxent City Farm."

Jeremiah Dudley died intestate in 1902. At the time of his death he owned 894.25 acres valued at \$17,468. Most of this lay in the vicinity of Patuxent City. As a result of an Equity case involving a dispute among Jeremiah's heirs, a commission was appointed to equitably divide his acreage among his heirs. The result was several subdivisions and combinations of former tracts. Known as "dower subdivisions" since they represented the dower of Jeremiah's widow, Jennie R. Dudley, the new tracts of land incorporated different acreages. "Dower Subdivision No.1" encompassed 199.25 acres that included a 54.5-acre tract labeled "Patuxent City Farm" on the 1911 survey map, and a 1.75-acre parcel known as the "Store House Lot" (see Equity Case #1275, Charles County Circuit Court Equity Records, Liber CP 13, Folio 636-). At the time of the survey, the "Store House Lot" was located what was

then known as Woodville Road (now Brandywine Road, Route 381), but has since the relocation of that road farther west, been incorporated with the Patuxent City Farm tract. Evidence of the original road bed that once divided the two lots is still evident in the landscape as well as on current property maps. Judging from these maps, it appears that the present house was erected on the Patuxent City Farm tract.

Between 1934 and 1946, the heirs of Jeremiah Dudley sold Walter J. Mitchell a 56.25-acre portion of "Dower Subdivision No.1," which incorporated all of the original Patuxent City Farm along with the 1.75-acre "Store House Lot." Mitchell and his wife, Florence J., devised this property to their five children at their deaths. In 1964, James C. Mitchell, acting as attorney in fact for himself and his father's other heirs, sold the same parcel to Patrick A. & Mary C. Deck. After Mary Deck's death, Ellen D. Neshiem, the current owner, inherited the property.

The house sits on brick foundations, is five bays in length with center door and overhead transome. The ends of the house are unbroken visably with exception of two small windows flanking the chimneys at the attic gables.


