The Patuxent City House is a two-part, side-gable dwelling with a five-bay, 1 3/4 story main block attached to a two-bay, 1 1/2 story kitchen wing. The dwelling has five pedimented dormers on both the façade and rear elevations. Two narrow, brick exterior chimneys flank the main block, and a massive brick chimney with a corbelled watertable and stepped shoulders is attached to the kitchen wing. Existing exterior woodwork includes a boxed and beaded cornice and dormer pediments. Several late 19th century, early 20th century outbuildings surround the dwelling including a meathouse, outhouse, shed/workshop and a chicken house. Named for its central location in the 19th century village of Patuxent City, the dwelling was probably constructed during the first quarter of the 19th century. Patuxent City House is an important and relatively unaltered example of a once popular house type in Charles County.

Prepare both a one paragraph summary and a comprehensive description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Patuxent City House is a two-part, side-gable frame dwelling probably constructed during the first quarter of the 19th century. A 1 3/4 story, five-bay, 1 3/4 story structure facing south comprises the main block. A 1 1/2 story kitchen wing extends the dwelling to the west elevation. Five pedimented dormers appear on both the façade and rear elevations. A hipped roof porch, of probable late 19th or early 20th century construction extends the width of three bays across the façade. The rear elevation has a full width partially enclosed shed porch of early or original construction. The house has two narrow brick exterior chimneys flanking the main block and a massive brick chimney with a corbelled watertable and stepped shoulders attached to the exterior of the kitchen wing. Although reclad in composition shingle siding, some original exterior woodwork is visible including a boxed and beaded cornice and dormer pediments. The frame rests on a rubble foundation. With the exception of a few replacement windows, and the reclad exterior the dwelling appears to retain a high degree of integrity. It is surrounded by several late 19th or early 20th century outbuildings including a meathouse, outhouse, shed/workshop and a chicken house.

The façade of the main block includes a centrally and symmetrically located door flanked by two windows on each side. The windows lying to the east of the door are 1/1 replacements while the two westernmost are 6/6 light with double-hung sash, as are the three dormer windows above. A later hipped roof porch spans over three bays and is supported by four wooden Doric columns. The porch floor is of poured concrete. The façade of the kitchen wing includes one exterior door nearest the west wall opposite a single replacement window.

The rear or north elevation of the main block includes a full-width shed porch that extends the roofline. The porch which is likely an original feature, has been partially enclosed in the 20th century and includes two modern windows. The porch, resting on thick square wood posts, shelters two original 6/6 windows underneath. The kitchen wing has a centered door flanked by an original window to the east and a replacement to the west. Dormers on the rear elevation mirror those on the façade.

The gable elevations are without fenestration but are distinguished by simple beaded molding at the roofline.

All existing outbuildings including a shed, outhouse, workshop and outhouse appear to date from the late 19th or early 20th century.

Probably constructed during the first quarter of the 19th century, the Patuxent City House is an important and relatively unaltered example of a once popular house type in Charles County. The Patuxent City House stands within the 19th century village of Patuxent City, located near Old Fields Church on Prince Frederick Road (now Route 231). Although one would not recognize it today during the 19th century Patuxent City once boasted a store, blacksmith shop, and a number of dwellings located on small lots lining the main road. The town developed during the early 19th century as one of the several trade centers that grew up at crossroads across the county. Today, only a handful of original buildings remain in Patuxent City.

Although the entire history of the site has not yet been determined, the house rests on land known as "Wilbur's Benefit" or "Wallace's and Wilbur's." During the second quarter of the 19th century it was owned by James Morton, who at the time of his death left the property to his heirs John and Julia Smoot. The Smoot's transferred the property to Thomas Estep in 1859 who sold the property to James T. Thomas the following year. While little is known of Thomas, he was apparently not successful and was forced to sell his property due to insolvency in 1866.

The land was eventually acquired by Jeremiah Dudley who died intestate in 1902. At the time of his death he owned 894.25 acres valued at \$17,468. Most of this lay in the vicinity of Patuxent City. As a result of an Equity case involving a dispute among Jeremiah's heirs, a commission was appointed to equitably divide his acreage among his heirs. The result was several subdivisions and combinations of former tracts. This particular tract identified on Dudley's survey map as "Thomas Farm" and consisting of 107 acres, was retained by the Dudley heirs until 1927 when it was sold to Charles Loughran, in 1944 when it was sold to A. Mac and Estelle Lindsey, and 1957 when it was sold to Joseph P. and Nellie Thompson.

This is a small frame dwelling of frame construction, a two part composition, 1 1/2 storéys in heighth. The roof design is "A" with the ridge running E to W and a single double flue chimney at each gable with free standing stack.

The house is five bays in length with center door and three balanced dormers above. The W wing has a single chimney on its W gable, a door and window with two dormers above. All chimneys are exterior. The roof is ^{100%} shingle.


