Mid 19th century

Constructed in the mid-19th century, the Sine House is a 1 ½ story frame dwelling that is three bays wide on the eave elevation. Standing just outside of the village of Newport and bordering Newport, (now Gilbert Swamp) Run, the house has an overall double-pile plan with four rooms occupying the main block of the first floor. A quarter-turn stair occupies the southwest corner chamber. Projecting from the northeast eave elevation is a late 19th century side-gable kitchen. A late 19th century meathouse and an early 20th century garage contribute to the site's overall significance. Although the early history of the property is quite obscure the property may have originally been built for members of the Swann family. By 1878, the dwelling came under the possession of John T. Higdon, remaining in the family for the next thirty years. During the 1960's the house was extensively restored.

Erected during the mid-19th century, the Sine House is an excellent, well-maintained example of a little understood form in Charles County. The 1 1/2 story double-pile frame dwelling stands in the village of Newport and includes a setting of thirty-six acres bordered by Gilbert Run Swamp (previously known as Newport Run. The house includes a one story kitchen wing attached to the east gable end. The southwestern border is marked by Newport Run Road that borders a fence-lined open pasture. The site includes a contributing early 20th century garage and a meathouse erected around 1890. Noncontributing resources include a chicken house and cattle shed, both built in the 1970's.

A continuous stone rubble foundation supports the frame which is sheathed in wood siding. Contemporary replacement 6/6 wood double-hung windows are found throughout and a rebuilt exterior end chimney is located on the kitchen wing. The roof has composition shingles. Unfortunately, the original chimneys are no longer extant. The front elevation includes a pair of gabled dormers. The three bays consist of a door to the west and two windows to the east. A shed roof porch extends the gable roofline and is supported with four square wood posts. The entrance door is framed with reeded pilasters and plinth. The side or west elevation includes one first floor 6/6 window and two second story 6/6 windows. The north elevation includes an enclosed porch and a single dormer piercing the roofline.

The kitchen wing, which extends from the east elevation of the main block, may pre-date the main block but has been obscured by later renovations. The kitchen has an overall hall and parlor plan with two dormers piercing the front elevation and one to the rear. The kitchen wing, a one and 1/2 story building, has a boxed cornice, and a replacement chimney flue on the east wall. The south elevation has two 6/6 windows. The gable end includes a 2/2 Victorian window in the attic and a gable-porch covered door near the southeast corner. A window stands next to the door. The north elevation includes an offset doorway, a 6/6 window and a replacement pair of contemporary 6/6 windows. Interior features include a nicely executed quarter-turn stair, slender turned newel and a carved banister. Plaster walls and doors are intact.

It appears that the home underwent an extensive restoration during the 1960's and therefore warrants further study to determine the extent of the alterations and/or embellishments made at that time.

The Sine House is significant architecturally as well as for its association with the crossroads village of Newport. To date, the history of its ownership is only partially understood. It is clear that in 1878 John T. Higdon acquired several parcels including, Part of St. Thomas containing 35 acres, Westwood Manor containing 29 acres and Apington, 53 acres along with the improvements found on the land. These were previously owned by Harriet B. Swann, whose estate was disputed between 1867-1878. The Higdon family owned the property until 1910 when it was sold at public sale to Leonard S. Herbert, owner of Newport Hall. At this time the property was described as being the dwelling formerly occupied by the Higdon family and now occupied by Frank Mattingly. The Herbert's kept the property until the early 1960's when it was acquired by Julien and Dorthea Brown in 1963 who it is believed began restoration of the property.

Although there is scant visual evidence to reveal Newport's earliest history, the village was one of the first crossroads communities in Charles County. The village is identified in Griffith's map of 1794 (1) and Martinet's earliest maps of Maryland published in 1865 (2) According to a Baltimore Directory, by 1880, Newport supported a population of 60, four public schools, two physicians, two mills, and two general stores, one also serving as post office, and one hotel.(3)





