The most significant aspect of this house is that it is dated (1827) and shows a late use of an earlier style.

A one-story frame house built with an end hall plan, it is three bays in length at the west facade and has a pair of end chimneys connected by a projecting pent closet at the south end elevation. Each of the two exterior stacks carries a date brick near the attic gable window level which reads 1827. The roof is A-frame and the two west facade windows contain nine over nine pane sash. The weather boarding is of twentieth century date as is the tin sheathing of the roof. To the rear (east elevation) is a flat roofed kitchen addition extending the entire length and projecting slightly at the south end.

The house is situated on a rise of land, overlooking the ~~Zeck~~^mia Swap. Judging from the many artifacts found in the vicinity by the present owners, it was the site of a well established Indian settlement.

Previously owned by members of the Mudd and Miles families.
