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### 8. Statement of Significance

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The mid to late 18th century dwelling known as Dearbought was not found at the time of the survey and is presumed to have been demolished. The 189 acres associated with Dearbought at the time of its survey in 1978 has since been developed as a subdivision known as Benedict Plantation.

A modest example of a typical eighteenth century planter's house, Dearbought is one of the earliest known houses having a two-room laterally partitioned plan and one of the few such houses that before the end of the eighteenth century had been expanded by a "mirror image" addition at one end.

One of the most important features of Dearbought, but one that does not directly relate to its architectural history, is a locally made and remarkably sophisticated eighteenth century corner cabinet of exhuberant classical design. Existing evidence indicates that the cabinet was installed in the house in about the middle of the nineteenth century and was previously part of the original interior woodwork of "Maxwell Hall," (CH-196), a National Register listed property situated about one mile from Dearbought.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

Built following a regionally traditional design, Dearbought is a one-story frame house measuring 29 feet by 33 feet, with front and rear porches. At one end of the house stands a single exterior chimney with shallow stepped weatherings below an unusually wide stack. A chimney of similar lines stood at the opposite end, but was removed some years ago.

Situated on the edge of a small hill the house faces east. The front elevation is four bays wide with two entrance doors occupying the second and fourth bays in from the southeast corner. The front wall and porch roof are sheathed with random width, beaded, shiplapped boards secured with cut nails. Some of this same sheathing is retained on the west, rear elevation, although a portion of it was removed when a southwest room was later extended into the rear porch area. There is only one early, possibly eighteenth century set of 9-over-6 sash remaining, and there are no original or early doors; the trim and beaded siding, however, is believed to date at least from the early nineteenth century.

The interior of Dearbought reflects its two basic stages of development, as well as several later alterations-renovations. Structural evidence indicates that the house initially contained only two, laterally partitioned first floor rooms with a small attic chamber above, and was probably built in about the middle of the eighteenth century. There is no original woodwork remaining in this portion of the existing building except beaded ceiling joints in both first floor rooms and possibly the flooring.

In about the third quarter of the eighteenth century, possibly as early as c. 1760, the original house was extended by an addition to the north end, repeating the same room configuration of the original house. It is believed that the woodwork in the two attic chambers above both parts of the house, including three-piece chairrails and two-piece window and door surrounds, are contemporary with the date of the north extension. Unlike the earlier house the two first floor rooms of the addition had plastered ceilings, and at the time the addition was made the formerly exposed joints in the older part were plastered over. The principal feature of the addition is a closed string corner stair with molded rail, slat balusters and square chamfered posts that presumably replaced an earlier stair formerly located in the southeast room of the original house.

In the early nineteenth century the exterior of Dearbought was resheathed with the wide beaded boards previously mentioned,

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and full length porches were added to both sides. Most of the first floor interior woodwork, including chairrails, window and door trim, and two batten doors in the attic chambers, were installed at about this time.

Subsequent alterations include the replacement of the interior trim in the two first floor south end rooms in the mid-nineteenth century, the covering over of the random-width flooring on the first floor with new flooring, the extension of the west wall of the southwest room into the porch area, the removal of the south end chimney and its replacement with a single flue interior stove chimney, and the replacement of the weatherboarding on both ends of the house.

Although certainly of architectural interest, Dearbought has a particularly noteworthy feature that has no direct relation to its architecture or physical development. This is a large eighteenth century, built-in corner cupboard located between the two rear first floor rooms. Believed to have been installed during the second half of the nineteenth century, the cupboard is unusually sophisticated, having fluted pilasters supporting a full classical cornice decorated with triglyphs and mutopes. The cabinet base has solid doors with applied moldings in a stylized diamond shape. The upper cabinet, which evidently once had glazed doors, has three elaborately shaped interior shelves. The design of this cabinet and other evidence suggests that it was probably moved here from nearby Maxwell Hall when the latter underwent an extensive interior renovation in the mid-nineteenth century.
