Erected around 1855, Locust Grove is a well-maintained, extremely interesting example of 19th century vernacular architecture in Charles County. Carved from a larger parcel known as Banks of the Dee, Locust Grove is believed to have been constructed for Charles Carter Perry and his bride Elizabeth Francis Lloyd. In 1853 Perry was named Justice of the Peace for the Allen's Fresh Election District, and continued to serve public in various capacities as Officer of Registration, school trustee, and by 1872, as Commissioner for the 5th Election District.

Standing 2 1/2 stories in height, the main block of this frame dwelling has a three bay, double-pile, side-passage plan. The dwelling currently faces east with a 1 1/2 story gable wing flanking either gable end. The north wing is a 20th century addition, while the south wing represents a reworking of the late 19th century kitchen wing that had a simple shed roof. The farmhouse, extensively renovated by the current owners, stands on a 162 acre parcel upon which stands a mid-19th century pole tobacco barn. One of the dwelling's most interesting features is its highly irregular staircase. Aside from its unusual construction, its western orientation suggests that the house originally faced westward toward Banks of the Dee Road and Lloyd Creek.

Erected around 1850, Locust Grove is an interesting example of mid-19th century vernacular architecture in Charles County. Standing 2 1/2 stories in height, the main block of this frame dwelling has a three bay, double-pile, side-passage plan. The dwelling currently faces east with a 1 1/2 story gable wing flanking either gable end. The north wing is a 20th century addition, while the south wing represents a reworking of the late 19th century kitchen wing that had a simple shed roof. The farmhouse, extensively renovated by the current owners, stands on a 162 acre parcel upon which islands a mid 19th century pole tobacco barn, and a late 19th early 20th century stable, shed and meathouse. The latter was relocated from another site. One of the dwelling's most interesting features is its highly irregular staircase. Aside from it's unusual construction, its western orientation suggests that the house originally faced westward toward Banks of the Dee Road and the Potomac River. Locust Grove was first surveyed by J. Richard Rivoire in the mid- 1970's.

Locust Grove currently has a wood shingle roof over an earlier treatment of tin. The cornice is boxed and beaded while wood siding covers the frame. A pair of exterior brick chimneys appear on the south gable end. A full width shed roof porch extends the width of the east elevation. Original wood sash 6/6 windows are found throughout the main block. These windows, aligned in three bays form a symmetrical façade on both the east and west elevations. An exterior door stands on the northernmost bay on both eave elevations. A single, centered attic story window rests between the chimney stacks on the south wall.

The interior reveals a side-hall double pile plan with extremely simple original finishes. The hall connects exterior doors on either end, and also contains the stairway, facing west. Most of the original wood floors are found throughout the dwelling along with stark molding around the doors and baseboard. The only original mantel stands in the dining room. Original doors include 6-panel doors on the first floor and vertical plank doors on the second floor. The attic story holds original hand-planed paneling and batten doors. The original orientation is confirmed by a 1914 USGS map that identifies a road extending from Banks of the Dee Road to Harris Lot passing Locust Grove. This road continues on across Banks of the Dee Road to Lloyd Creek.

Several feature have been added at the time of the late 20th century renovation including wood paneling on the first floor gable walls, chair and crown molding and interior wood shutters. An interior window was removed and converted into the doorway when the north wing was added.

POLE TOBACCO BARN, c. 1850

East of the dwelling is a gable roof tobacco barn erected with rough hewn posts set directly into the ground. The barn roof was extensively reworked in the 20th century. Originally the barn was covered with a gable roof and had an attached shed on the south end. Around 1960 the roof was completely rebuilt, creating a symmetrical roofline. At this time barn was covered with wood shingles and later reclad with the existing metal sheathing. Early machine cut nails with irregular heads are found in the barn construction. The barn includes 8 bays.

Locust Grove is a well-maintained, extremely interesting example of 19th century vernacular architecture in Charles County. Carved from a larger parcel known as Banks of the Dee, Locust Grove is believed to have been constructed for Charles Carter Perry and his bride Elizabeth Francis Lloyd. In 1853 Perry was named Justice of the Peace for the 2nd Election District, Allen's Fresh and continued to serve in various capacities including Officer of Registration, school trustee, and by 1872 as Commissioner for the 5th election district.

Locust Grove stands on property acquired by the Lloyd family in the 1830's which once included much of the land between Piccowaxen Creek and Perry Branch. Banks of the Dee included a 990 tract purchased from Thomas Bucknan in 1835. Some time after 1854, Elizabeth Lloyd Perry formally acquired the north portion of Banks of the Dee which was later renamed Locust Grove. Around this time the Perry's erected the current dwelling.



DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

A simple, mid-19th century farmhouse of basic Federal styling, Locust Grove was recently attractively renovated and enlarged by its present owners.

The oldest section of the existing three-part house is the two-story center block. Three bays wide at both floor levels of both side elevations, it has a main entrance door occupying the first bay from the north end of the east front. This same elevation is sheltered by a one-story porch extending the full width of this side. The two first and three second floor windows are all of 6-over-6 pane sash. At the south end stands two exterior brick chimneys. Extending out from the north end of the center section is a one-story, two bay addition with two dormer windows on the front roof slope. At its north end stands a large exterior chimney. This addition was built on the site of an earlier kitchen wing and is of similar design. At the opposite end of the house is a one bay, one-story wing built in the late 19th century. It has a shed roofed porch across its south end. The whole of the exterior of the house is sheathed with beaded siding and the roof with wood shingles.

The interior of the main block has a side stair hall and two adjoining south rooms. The same room configuration is repeated on the second floor. The attic has a hall and one large room. The woodwork throughout the house is extremely plain. The stair, one of the more interesting features of the house, rises in four flights to the attic. It is of a curious design, with each of the four flights of steps set at a different angle, two with very low risers and deep treads and on the other two the opposite arrangement. The balustrade, with heavy Victorian-style newels at every turn, has been extensively reworked. It almost appears that the stair was salvaged from another building by a previous owner and made to fit into this house--no matter what the aesthetic cost. Both wings of the house contain small attic rooms accessible from the second floor of the main block. The partition wall separating the bedroom and hall of the attic of the main block is of extremely wide beaded boards.
