




Building 43 is a square, one-story, wood-frame building raised on a concrete slab foundation. The pyramid roof features overhanging eaves and exposed wood rafters. Replacement horizontal-lapped wood siding covers the exterior walls. Located on the south elevation, the primary entrance contains replacement plywood double-doors. Single square window openings on the east and west elevations have been enclosed with plywood. A projecting corrugated-metal shed roof has been added to the west elevation.

Building 43 was constructed as a watch house building in 1918 and is now used as a storehouse. Door and window replacements and residing have altered the appearance of the original structure obscuring its original function. Building 43 no longer possesses integrity of design, feeling, or materials.

Building 43 was constructed in 1918 as a watch house at the Naval Powder Factory (1900-1945). The Naval Powder Factory is an industrial facility significant as the first major chemical factory operated by the navy and an important supplier of smokeless powder during World Wars I and II. Building 43 was constructed as a minor administrative support facility and was not important individually for its association with the Powder Factory base line. Archival research did not indicate that the building is associated with distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction. The building does not represent the




Building 62 is a two-story, L-shaped, reinforced concrete building raised on a concrete slab foundation. A flat roof with parapet surmounts the building. The exterior walls are finished in stucco. Located on the west elevation, the primary entrance comprises replacement glass double-doors and an original pedimented frontispiece. All windows in the building have been replaced with metal, two-light casement units and fixed four-light ribbon windows. A two-story, flat roof addition that incorporates a rooftop porch is located on the rear elevation. A steel railing surmounts the rooftop walls.

Building 62 was constructed in 1903 as a bomb proofing facility. The building was recently renovated and is currently being used as a conference facility. The building has received substantial modifications including changes to all its original doors and windows. A two-story addition to its rear elevation has altered the historic form, plan, and massing of the structure. The original concrete walls have been finished in stucco substantially altering the character and feeling of the original building. The interior has been renovated to accommodate office and conference space. Alterations have obscured the original function and appearance of this building and it no longer possesses integrity of materials, design, workmanship, or feeling.

powder. The proving Ground is also significant as an industrial facility whose buildings and landscape were designed to facilitate bomb-proofing activities. Building 62 no longer possesses sufficient integrity of design to convey individually its significance with the Naval Proving Ground. Archival research did not indicate that the building is associated with important persons at Indian Head. Building 62 is a highly modified utilitarian structure and no longer conveys distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction. The building does not represent the work of a master or possess high artistic value. Building 62 is not likely to yield information important in prehistory or history.

Building 111 is comprised of the original block with at least five major additions ranging in construction date from ca. 1921-1980. The building is currently utilized as a public works shop. The main block, is a one-story, brick and rusticated sandstone building raised on a sandstone foundation. A hipped roof featuring a four-bay dormer surmounts the main block. A monitor roof encloses a two-story north addition. Additions to the east elevation feature flat parapet roofs and a shed roof. The entire building exhibits an irregular footprint. The building contains multiple entrances. A former primary entrance on the west elevation features an arched entryway flanked by carved sandstone columns. The entrance has been in-filled with brick. Other entrances to the building include bay and door openings that contain metal doors and roll-up metal doors. The main block, of which only one elevation is visible, contains metal six-light awning windows. Two openings have been in-filled with brick. The north addition contains industrial steel-sash units, some of which have been replaced with corrugated metal siding.

The original block of Building 111 was constructed in 1899 as a one-story, rectangular powerhouse. This original structure is surrounded by five major additions that occurred between ca. 1921 and 1980. Constructed with contemporary materials, these additions have substantially altered the original design, plan, form, and massing of the building. The current structure also exhibits significant changes to windows and window and door openings. Entrances and windows have frequently been added and enclosed to accommodate later uses. Modern industrial equipment added to the roof and façade has obscured historic


surfaces and features. Due to the cumulative effects of these additions, Building 111 no longer possesses the integrity of materials, design, and feeling.

The building is seven bays wide and six bays deep. A hipped roof surmounts the central section. The additions feature low sloped shed roofs. The building contains multiple entrances including single metal doors and roll-up metal doors. The building features industrial metal-sash awning windows embellished with concrete sills. Many window openings, including all the windows on the original structure have been in-filled with brick. Building 113 is connected to Building 111 at the north end.

The original block of Building 113 was constructed in 1899 as a two-story, rectangular, boiler house. Two major additions constructed ca. 1921 flank the entire east and west elevations of the original building substantially changing the original design, plan, form, and massing of the building. The current structure also exhibits significant changes to window and door openings. Window bays have been in-filled with brick or modified to accommodate door openings. 

The rectangular structure is topped with a corrugated metal gable roof that features overhanging eaves with exposed metal rafters. Two hipped roof metal ventilators project from the apex of the gable roof. The exterior walls are finished with corrugated metal panels. The primary entrance is located centrally on the south elevation and contains metal double-doors with strap hinges. A double eight-light fixed window is located on the west elevation.

Building 120 was constructed in 1904 as a warehouse. Minor alterations include the addition of ventilators and the rain gutter system. Building 120 possesses integrity of location, materials, design, and feeling. Building 120 is located among a concentration of substantially modified industrial buildings and does not possess integrity of setting.

Building 120 was constructed in 1904 as a warehouse at the at the Naval Powder Factory (1900-1945). The Naval Powder Factory is an industrial facility significant as the first major chemical factory operated by the Navy and an important supplier of smokeless powder during World Wars I and II. 

Archival research did not indicate that the yard is associated with important persons at Indian Head. The scrap yard is a simple waste disposal facility that exhibits few landscape features. As an individual structure, the yard does not convey distinctive characteristics of a structure associated with the manufacture and storage of smokeless powder. The scrap yard does not represent the work of a master or possess high artistic value. The scrap yard is not likely to yield information important in prehistory or history.

Building 135 is a two-story, metal-frame building raised on a concrete slab foundation. The rectangular structure is topped with a corrugated metal and rolled asphalt gable roof that features a clerestory monitor. The clerestory contains a band of metal-sash awning windows and horizontal metal vents on each elevation. The primary entrance is centrally located on the east elevation and consists of a large metal roll-up door and a separate single metal-door entrance. The north and south elevations contain ten regularly spaced steel-frame industrial sash windows. The north elevation also contains two four-light fixed sash windows. The building originally featured corrugated asbestos siding. Most of the building's siding has been replaced with green corrugated fiberglass panels.

Building 135 was constructed in 1915 as a nitrate plant. This facility was converted in the 1960s to a torpedo fuel chemical plant. The plant is now defunct and Building 135 is used as a storage facility. Alterations to the building include replacement of the siding with green corrugated fiberglass, replacement of the roof with rolled asphalt, and the replacement of select doors and windows. These changes have compromised the overall form and design of the building. The building no longer contains equipment related to nitrate production and is located in an area with substantially modified industrial buildings and new construction. Building 135 does not possess integrity of setting, materials, feeling, and association.

The Indian Head Senior Center is the former post office, constructed in 1918 by the federal government to serve the Naval Ordnance Station (NOS) at Indian Head. The building is eligible for the Maryland Register for its association with the development of the naval facilities at Indian Head and for its architectural design which is representative of the Colonial Revival Style. The construction of the post office was a component of a large scale building program at Indian Head that was prompted by the outbreak of World War I. The Navy developed the northeastern section of the base with the post office as well as a school, 100 single family houses and three dormitories. The only remaining building from this effort is the post office, although the street pattern and park are still extant. The post office is one of the most stylish buildings at NOS Indian Head and retains significant elements of its Colonial Revival architecture including its configuration, pedimented portico, and rounded fanlights. The courts are simple asphalt and concrete structures bordered by a chain link fence and do not convey distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction. The yard does not represent the work of a master or possess high artistic value. Facility 417 is not likely to yield information important in prehistory or history.

The courts are not located in an area that contains a concentration of historic buildings with integrity sufficient to be included in the Naval Powder Factory Historic District.



Building 551 is a one-story, rectangular, wood-frame building raised on a concrete foundation. The building is nineteen bays wide and two bays deep and incorporates at least two wind additions. An asphalt side-gable roof surmounts the entire building. All the walls are clad with horizontal vinyl and lapped wood siding. The principal elevation features a projecting, front-gabled, central block. The projecting wind contains an enclosed, shed-roofed, entry porch. The building features six-over-six-light, double-hung sash and one-over-one light, double-hung sash and one-over-one light, double-hung, vinyl sash windows.
The original, three-bay, central block of Building 551 was constructed ca. 1935 as a storage building. Subsequent alterations include the addition of a five-bay wind on the south elevation and a six-bay wing to the northeast elevation. Most windows and doors are replacement units. The entire building was renovated to accommodate office space. Major alterations to Building 551 have changed the original form, massing, plan, materials, and design of the structure. The building is no longer used as a storage building. Additions and alterations have obscured the original function of this building and have removed important character defining features. Building 551 no longer possesses integrity of design, materials, feeling, and association.


