Description: The Iserman Property is a 2½-story, 3-bay vernacular dwelling with Colonial Revival features, constructed in 1915. Located at the northeast corner of the intersection of Prince Frederick Road and Leonardtown Road (MD 5) in Hughesville, Charles County, the structure is of wood-frame construction with a cross-gable, asphalt shingle roof and a concrete foundation. The roof has closed-gable ends with wide soffits. The dwelling is extremely deteriorated and has been partially dismantled; much of the wood clapboard siding has been removed or has fallen and nearly all windows, doors, and moldings have been removed.

Significance: The Iserman Property is located on a .32 hectare (.8 acre) parcel of land at the northeast corner of the intersection of Prince Frederick Road and Leonardtown Road (MD 5). The residence was constructed in 1915, according to Charles County tax records and contains 210.5 square meters (2266 square feet) of living space. The structure is currently vacant and is extremely deteriorated. The property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places due to the extreme deterioration and loss of architectural features. Through deterioration and intentional removal, elements of the structure including windows and doors (including moldings), porch structural elements and details and interior elements are no longer extant. The roof of the dwelling has collapsed in several locations and sections of the wood clapboard siding have been removed or have fallen, exposing the insulation, plaster and lathe of the building. The loss of the architectural elements and structural deterioration have significantly compromised the integrity of the building. As a result, the building no longer represents the style and period of its construction.

The Iserman Property is a 2½-story, 3-bay vernacular dwelling with Colonial Revival features, constructed in 1915. Located at the northeast corner of the intersection of Prince Frederick Road and Leonardtown Road (MD 5) in Hughesville, Charles County, the structure is of wood-frame construction with a cross-gable, asphalt shingle roof and a concrete foundation. The roof has closed-gable ends with wide soffits. The dwelling is extremely deteriorated and has been partially dismantled; much of the wood clapboard siding has been removed or has fallen and nearly all windows, doors, and moldings have been removed.

The south, or front elevation has a 1-story, hipped-roof porch, which wraps around to the west elevation. A portion of one original wood column and some wood-frame screens remain; all other porch details have been removed. The first story has a window opening in the first bay which likely contained a paired window. The second bay is a central entry with the door and door frame removed. The third bay is a projecting bay window with openings for three, single windows.

The west elevation has an exterior, brick chimney, which has been removed above the first story. The chimney, which obscured a portion of a second story window and the gable end, was added to the structure circa 1970. The second story window opening likely originally contained a paired window which was later obscured by the chimney; the window and frame have now been removed.

The north, or rear elevation has a 1-story, flat-roof extension at the west end of the elevation and a 1-story, shed roof addition at the center of the elevation.

The east elevation includes an entry with a concrete stoop, covered by a shed roof hood, supported by wood posts.

The interior of the structure was visible, due to the removal of most windows and doors, leaving the structure unsecured. Much of the original interior detail has been removed, including a mantel in the living room, however, some door surrounds with bulls-eye corner blocks remain. In addition, the roof of the structure has collapsed in several places.

The Iserman Property is located at the northeast corner of the original Hughesville crossroads, which is now a congested commercial corridor. Much of the development around the structure is commercial, and the building is currently abandoned and extremely deteriorated.

Directory and State Gazetteer listed both Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches in Hughesville as well as a Friends' school, four (4) general merchandise stores, two (2) saloons, two (2) undertakers, a wheelwright, a blacksmith, a tobacco buyer, and a population of fifty (50). Gannett's 1904 Gazetteer of Maryland defined Hughesville as a "post village...on the Washington, Potomac and Chesapeake Railroad" (Gannett 1904: 43). By 1906 the community was known as "a station of the Southern Maryland Railroad...and a banking town" with two (2) physicians, two (2) general stores, two (2) blacksmiths, a grist and saw mill, a flour mill, an undertaker and livery, a hotel, a hotel and saloon, a grocer and saloon, an insurance salesman, and a population of 150 (Maryland 1906: 667).

While the Queen Anne, Folk Victorian and Four-square styles were at the height of popularity in the United States, the Colonial Revival style began to capture the American imagination. Popular in the years from 1880 to 1955, the Colonial Revival style resulted from a rebirth of interest in the colonial English and Dutch houses of the eastern seaboard coincident with the Philadelphia Centennial. Stylistic details in Colonial Revival dwellings were drawn predominantly from Georgian and Federal styles; secondary influences included Dutch Colonial and English Postmedieval types. Late nineteenth century examples of Colonial Revival were often asymmetrical and exhibited a combination of Queen Anne features, such as turrets and wide porches, and Colonial features such as Palladian windows and Adamesque swags or urns. Examples built from 1915 to 1935, such as the Iserman Property, reflected colonial precedents more closely, while those built after World War II simplified the style, with details which only suggested rather than duplicated the original examples. Various sub-styles, such as the Dutch Colonial Revival, were popular during the early to mid-twentieth century.

Colonial Revival houses are usually strictly rectangular in plan with few projections and have symmetrical facades. They range from one to three stories with hipped, side-gable, cross-gable, or gambrel roofs. Clapboard is the most popular sheathing material, although brick is not uncommon. After World War II, colonial homes frequently featured a brick-sided first story with an overhanging wood-sided second story. In more elaborate homes, a hipped roof is often topped with a flat deck and balustrade or a cupola. Pedimented doorways and fanlights are common. Some pediments evolved into porticos with slender columns. The typical form of the windows is rectangular with double-hung sash. Palladian windows are common on more sophisticated dwellings. The addition of side porches, terraces and sunrooms are modern features common to Colonial Revival homes (McAlester 1984, 321-6).

National Register Evaluation:

The Iserman Property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. The structure is not eligible under Criterion C due to the extreme deterioration and loss of architectural features. Through deterioration and intentional removal, elements of the structure including windows and doors (including moldings), porch structural elements and details and interior elements are no longer extant. The roof of the dwelling has collapsed in several locations and sections of the wood clapboard siding have been removed or have fallen, exposing the insulation, plaster and lathe of the building. The loss of the architectural elements and structural deterioration have significantly compromised the integrity of the building. As a result, the building no longer represents the style and period of its construction. Finally, the structure has no known potential to yield important information, and therefore, is not eligible under Criterion D.




Description:

At the time of the survey, the property contained a 2½-story, 3-bay vernacular dwelling with Colonial Revival features, constructed in 1915. Located at the northeast corner of the intersection of Prince Frederick Road and Leonardtown Road (MD 5) in Hughesville, Charles County, the structure was of wood-frame construction with a cross-gable, asphalt shingle roof and a concrete foundation. The roof had closed-gable ends with wide soffits. The dwelling was extremely deteriorated and had been partially dismantled. Since the survey, the building has been demolished. No buildings remain on the parcel and the site has been cleared.


