The Middleton Farm Tenant House is an example of the modest dwellings, barns and outbuildings associated with the tenancy system in Charles County during the early twentieth century. The farm consists of over 96 acres formerly known as "Jordan's Progress" and includes a dwelling, two barns, a stable, madhouse, and wellhouse.

The dwelling is typical of the vernacular residences built for Charles Countians of modest means. Two stories in height with a one story porch extending the length of the facade and a one story shed addition off the rear, the dwelling is similar to an I-house, yet does not possess the symmetry and proportions characteristic of the form. Although the house is currently abandoned and has deteriorated significantly, the surrounding structures are generally in good condition and the original spatial orientation of dwelling, barns and outbuildings remains intact.

The Middleton Farm Tenant House is located on the west side of Tommy Middleton Lane just south of Renner Road near Waldorf. The surrounding farm consists of almost 97 acres currently cultivating corn and soybeans. The principal dwelling and outbuildings are clustered in an approximately five acre area surrounded by open fields. Existing buildings and structures include a circa 1915 two-story frame dwelling, two barns, a stable, meathouse, and wellhouse. A non-contributing trailer is also located on the property.

The two-story frame dwelling is two bays wide and one room deep. The frame is currently clad in asbestos shingles. The roof is side-gabled in plan and sheathed with standing seam metal. A one-story hipped roof porch extends the width of the façade. This porch has been enclosed with plywood. A one story shed addition extends from the rear or western elevation. Two brick chimneys break the roofline; one in the main block and a second in the rear of the shed addition.

The façade includes a total of three asymmetrical windows. The northernmost second story window is of wood sash with 6/6 lights. The easternmost second story window is also of wood sash with 1/1 lights. Both are double-hung. On the first floor a centered 1/1 light wood sash double-hung window is located on the enclosed porch wall. To the west of this window is an entranceway covered by a narrow porch awning extending out from the porch roof.

The northern elevation consists of a single window located in the shed addition. The western façade includes one window centered in the first floor main block, and a second approximately in the same location as the northern elevation in the shed addition. To the southwestern corner is a secondary entrance covered with a small pedimented porch.

The rear elevation consists of four asymmetrical windows, two on each floor. These windows are all 2/2 lights, wood sash and double hung. Lights span the window horizontally. An asymmetrical rear entrance is also positioned on this elevation.

The dwelling has deteriorated and has lost a good deal of its original material.

OUTBUILDINGS

Five outbuildings contribute to the sites significance and all appear to be in good condition. The largest of the outbuildings includes a stable and grain barn located to the west of the dwelling. This is a braced frame structure with a gambrel roof. The ridge runs on a north/south axis and is covered in metal sheathing. The structure is clad with wood weatherboards. The roof ridge extend to form a point which allows hay and fodder to be lifted into the upstairs lofts. This structure appears to have two loft spaces; one just below the roofline on the gable wall, and the other just above it. Traces of whitewash are present on the exterior.

Just to the rear of the structure is a small tobacco barn. The structure is of frame construction and is clad in vertical boards, once whitewashed. The roof ridge runs on a north/south axis and the roof is covered with corrugated metal. The entire structure rests on a concrete pier foundation. This side gable barn is two bays in length. Double doors on the eave wall, when opened expose the entire eastern

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elevation. A square opening is located in the gable wall under the apex.

To the immediate north of the tobacco barn is a frame meathouse supported on a concrete pier foundation. This structure is covered with a metal roof and the walls are clad with wood weatherboarding. Traces of whitewash are also present on this structure.

The well house is located north of the dwelling at the edge of the yard. Beyond this is a cultivated field. This shed roof frame structure is in a deteriorated state. It is clad in German siding and has a metal roof.

Finally, another barn of undetermined use is located on the northernmost edge of the farm cluster. This is a gable end structure with a shed extending from the gable wall. The siding is of vertical board and the roof is clad with corrugated metal.

The Middleton Farm Tenant House is an example of the modest dwellings, barns and outbuildings associated with the tenancy system in Charles County during the early twentieth century. Although the house is currently abandoned and has deteriorated significantly, the surrounding structures are generally in good condition. The original spatial orientation of dwelling, barns and outbuildings remains intact.

The farm consists of over 96 acres formerly known as "Jordan's Progress". In the first part of the twentieth century the original 110 acre farm was owned by the Richards, Hemmings, Portzens and Mudd Families. By 1938 Joseph B. and Helen Mudd sold the property to Thomas A. and Viola H. Middleton. Today the property is owned by descendents of the Middleton's.

Some of the tenants recalled by the current owner were Joseph Mudd, the Lucas family, Ernest Duckett and Woodley Morgan. At various times the property was occupied by both Anglo and African-American families.

The dwelling is typical of the vernacular residences built for Americans of modest means. While this dwelling is similar to an I-house, it does not possess the symmetry and proportions characteristic of the form. One notable example is the shortened exterior eave wall that meets the roofline at the top of the second story window sill.

In Charles County the system of tenancy flourished after the Civil War and continued well into the first decades of the twentieth century. Despite efforts to diversify agricultural production, tobacco remained the main cash crop. The tenancy system guaranteed farm owners the availability of skilled, reliable labor at the time of harvest, while providing shelter to families who could not afford their own farms.




