The John Grabis House is a two-story, frame, cross-gable dwelling resting on a ten acre parcel surrounded by level open fields. The house is square in form with a four-room massed plan on both the first and second story. Also on the site is a small, 10 room tobacco barn covered in vertical board siding. Owned and likely built by John Grabis, a local carpenter of German descent, the site is significant in its association with the life of a local craftsmen and the history of German families in the region prior to World War II.

The John Grabis House is a simple, unadorned two-story, cross gable frame dwelling constructed around 1922. The house faces west and is situated to the east side of Olivers Shop Road on a level ten acre lot surrounded by open fields. A tobacco barn stands to the south of the dwelling and a concrete block shed lies to the east. Non-contributing resources include a small mid-20th century frame workshop and a garage.

The dwelling is essentially square in form and has a wood frame resting on a continuous concrete block foundation. The steeply pitched cross gable roof is covered in asphalt shingles and the walls are covered with beveled novelty siding. A hipped roof porch, enclosed before 1945 is attached to the front elevation and a shed rear entrance porch is attached to the east wall. Original windows are 2/2 sash, although approximately half have been replaced with 6/6 sash.

The front elevation includes an off-center entrance door to the north that leads into the enclosed porch. The façade of the porch includes a total of five replacement windows, all 6/6 sash. On the second floor are two 2/2 windows.

Moving clockwise, the north wall includes paired 6/6 windows in the enclosed porch. Two 2/2 windows are found on the first floor to the east. A 6 light casement window is found to the west, representing a change in fenestration to compensate for the interior stair passage. On the second floor is a single, centrally placed 2/2 light window.

The rear elevation includes the shed porch that has been partially enclosed. This later addition now includes a 6/6 light window. The rear entrance is near the north wall and includes its original 4 light and panel door. Opposite the door to the south is an original 2/2 wood sash window. A single 2/2 window is found centered on the second floor.

The south elevation includes four symmetrical 2/2 windows on the first floor and a single original window above.

INTERIOR

The dwelling follows a square four room plan. The first floor has a hall and stair in the northwest corner above a living room to the southwest. The dining room is located in the southeast room below the kitchen to the northeast. The upstairs follows a similar four room plan with three rooms and a stair passage. One of the bedrooms converted to a bathroom c 1950.

TOBACCO BARN

The tobacco barn, c. 1930 is of frame construction with vertical board siding. It measures 26x40 and has 10 rooms. The roof is metal.

SHED

A concrete block shed, c. 1930 is located behind the house and is built into a shallow bank. Concrete blocks have been molded to resemble stone. The front gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The John Grabis House is the home of, and likely built by, a local carpenter of German descent, John Grabis. As such, the site is significant as one of the few documented examples of historic standing structures associated with the life of a regional craftsman and his family. Additionally, the site has the potential of increasing our understanding of German influences on the Charles County landscape prior to World War II.

In 1922, John P. Grabis purchased 10 acres from Matthew P. and Josepha Therres. The Grabis family lived at the site until 1948 when the property was sold to George Forbes. Grabis was an established carpenter who also developed a cottage industry of making rock-faced concrete block on site for sale throughout the region. Similar concrete blocks were used as primary building materials in several Charles County domestic and commercial buildings including the Dudley and Lyons Department Store (CH-489), and several homes along Washington Avenue in LaPlata. Grabis worked with another tradesman of German descent named Kilhofer, and they were the contractors who built the Waldorf School (CH-391).

The cross gable house is not well represented in Charles County and no other examples of similar forms have yet been identified.







