Likely constructed during the first quarter of the 20th century, the Jameson-Moran House is a two story, three bay, side passage dwelling with a hipped roof front porch and a decorative center gable. It is set slightly back from the north side of Olivers Shop Road near Grosstown. The house sits amid open fields and several typical outbuildings. Two of the outbuildings, a tobacco barn and a chicken house, are likely contemporary with the dwelling. Other later outbuildings include a large livestock house, a butchering shed, a double isle tobacco barn, a stripping shed, and a pump house. A one story, cross gable kitchen ell and several late 20th century additions extend from the rear of the dwelling.

The Jameson-Moran House is representative of the typical dwellings constructed in the rural areas of Charles County during the first quarter of the 20th century. The dwelling is noteworthy in its synthesis of an overall side-passage plan with architectural details typically associated with a center-passage I-house.

Likely constructed during the first quarter of the 20th century, the Jameson-Moran House is a two-story, three-bay, side-passage dwelling with a hipped-roof porch extending the width of the front elevation and a decorative center gable. The dwelling is set slightly back from the north side of Olivers Shop Road near Grosstown. Open fields and several typical outbuildings surround the house. Of these outbuildings, the two likely contemporary with the dwelling include a tobacco barn and chicken house. Other later outbuildings include a large livestock house, a butchering shed, a double isle tobacco barn, a stripping shed, and a pump house. A one-story cross-gable kitchen ell and several late 20th century additions extend from the rear of the dwelling.

The dwelling faces southeast and is clad with a metal seam roof pierced by a two original corbelled cap chimneys. Stucco covers the original exterior wood siding. Windows on the front elevation are original and consist of 6/6 lights. The façade is characterized by a hipped porch resting on four square tapered columns and a decorative gable holding a square 4-light fixed window. The dwelling's most formal entrance door includes a 5 light transom and 3-light sidelights on either end. The porch base is concrete.

The side elevations of the main block are without fenestration. The kitchen wing includes a small porch on the southwest wall and shelters an entrance door and window. The opposite wall is without fenestration.

The interior has been substantially altered during a recent renovation at which time many features, including crown molding and chair railing, have been introduced. Many salvaged architectural elements from other historic sites, have been incorporated, including the façade exterior door and shutters serving as closet doors. A major change in the structure's historic use of space occurred when the original kitchen was converted into an informal living space and a modern kitchen was constructed in an addition to the rear. Floorplan changes include the removal of a partition wall that created a side hall plan in the main block.

The tobacco barn is located to the rear of the dwelling and is connected to the domestic complex by a short farm lane. This is a front gable, center isle tobacco barn with a shed addition providing an additional isle. The ridge runs generally on a north/south axis. As is typically found on tobacco barns, this example has vertical board siding and a metal roof.

The chicken house stands just north of the dwelling in the rear yard, a fair distance away from the house. This is a rectangular structure with an asymmetrical gable.

The Jameson-Moran House is representative of the typical dwellings constructed in the rural areas of Charles County during the first quarter of the twentieth century. The structure is noteworthy in its synthesis of the side passage plan with the exterior appearance of an I-house form. First appearing locally during the first quarter of the 19th century, the side passage plan endured in popularity well into the 20th century and was often adapted to new house forms. The two-story, three-bay, side gable structure with a decorative center gable began to appear in Charles County during the last decade of the 19th century as a derivation of a center passage I-house.

The Jameson-Moran House is believed to have been built by members of the Jameson family during the second decade of the 20th century. During the previous century 74 acres formerly owned by Lucinda Dent, and known as "Katie Dent's Place" was sold for back taxes to Deborah Mankin. In 1874, just three years after their purchase, Deborah and her husband James, then residing in the District of Columbia, sold "Katie Dent's Place" to Elizabeth, Julius, Eustace, and John Gibbons. By 1908 the property, which included some improvements, was sold at public auction for \$500.

By 1912 it was conveyed to Austeneous Jameson, who sold the same to his son J. Warren Jameson. Austeneous also owned property in the vicinity including the adjacent "Burch Tract" consisting of almost 25 acres. In 1917 J. Warren Jameson sold the "Katie Dent" tract to Oscar B. Jameson which then included "buildings and improvements". In 1926, Oscar Jameson acquired from Austeneous Jameson's heirs additional acreage including the Burch Tract.

The property left the Jameson family in 1928 when it was sold to Cornell W. and Annie Moran. The Moran family occupied the dwelling until the close of World War II. From 1945 until 1971 it was owned by Ernest and Marguerite Cooksey.






