Norwood is a good example of a rural interpretation of Queen Anne architecture in Charles County. Consisting of a 2 1/2 story frame structure with an overall front gable orientation and irregular plan, cross gables are found on the eave elevations which are accentuated with several projecting bays. A one story wrap-around porch shelters the façade and extends to the south. The home was extensively renovated in the late 1980's and 90's.

Associated with the Turner family from the late 19th to early 20th century, John R. Turner's left his property in the vicinity of Wicomico to be equally divided between his two sons after his death in 1888. Robert Turner took over possession of the farm and soon after constructed the current dwelling house. The name Norwood first appears in 1920 when Mary Turner's heirs sold the entire Norwood property containing 500 acres to Washington Bowling. The Bowling family occupied the site until 1972.

Norwood, constructed around 1900, Norwood is an unusually elaborate rural example of Victorian architecture in Charles County. Consisting of a 2 1/2 story frame structure with an overall front gable orientation and irregular plan, cross gables are found on the eave elevations which are accentuated with several projecting bays. A one story wrap-around porch shelters the façade and extends to the south. The home was extensively renovated in the late 1980's and 90's.

The dwelling faces east and rests on a continuous brick foundation and the frame is currently sheathed in wallboard. The roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles and is pierced by two interior corbeled cap chimneys. An exterior brick chimney was salvaged from a nearby site and attached to the rear elevation in the 1980's. The hipped roof porch includes a decorative gable over the entry and extends southward. The porch is distinguished by an octagonal seating area on the buildings southeast corner.

The front elevation includes four bays on the main levels. The first story has three long 6/6 windows and an offset entry door with transom. The second story fenestration is symmetrical but consists of smaller 6/6 windows. The attic story is also lighted with two small 6/6 windows.

The north elevation includes a prominent decorative gable interrupting the eave wall. Two projecting bays interrupt the first floor fenestration. The first is a rectangular bay holding a 6/6 window. The other is octagonal with narrower 6/6 windows. Finally a 6/6 window is set on the eave wall near the rear elevation. The second story has four equally sized and placed 6/6 windows. A small window also lights the attic.

The rear elevation is dominated by a salvaged chimney acquired from the site of a demolished structure once part of the property. The attic has a single 6/6 window. The second story has two asymmetrical 6/6 windows as does the first floor. A small gabled entry porch shelters the kitchen door.

The south elevation is dominated by a decorative center gable, mirroring the same found on the north side. Adornment differs from the opposite elevation in that this wall includes a single, centered two-story projecting bay rather than two first floor bays. The bay holds three windows each on the first and second floors. To the west of the projecting bay is a single second story and two first floor 6/6 windows of similar size. To the east is a single second story window above a larger first floor window.

The interior floor plan is irregular. The entry leads into a hall containing a staircase on the north wall. A hall passage proceeds to a dining room, now used as a sitting room lighted by the octagonal bay window. Beyond this, a hallway leads to a pantry along the north wall which has been converted into a bathroom. At the far end is a service stair. Opposite this hall way is a large kitchen. The south side of the house, beginning again from the main entry, includes a library, beyond which is a parlor, currently used as a dining room. The library and parlor are divided by a folding double door. Floors throughout appear to be original although most molding and hardware was replaced at the time of the renovation. During this time the attic story was finished. Before the renovation this hold a cistern feeding a gravity fed plumbing system that allowed water to circulate throughout the house.

Norwood is a good example of a rural interpretation of Victorian architecture in Charles County. In 1888, John R. Turner's last will and testament left his property in the vicinity of Wicomico to be equally divided between his two sons, Robert H. Turner and Thomas Turner, Jr. At that time, Robert was already living on the property as evidenced by the stipulation that Robert have the privilege of selecting for his share that part on which stands the dwelling house where he now resides. By 1900, Robert had passed away and in that year Thomas T. Turner deeded his portion Mary Thomas Turner, wife of the late Robert. The name Norwood first appears after Mary Turner's heirs sell the entire Norwood property containing 500 acres to two brothers Joseph W. and George P. Bowling. The house was occupied by the family of George P. Bowling. In 1972 when it was sold to F. George Heinze who initiated the renovations.


