The Morgantown Road House, now demolished was a representative example of the types of vernacular dwellings which were once a common part of the Charles County landscape. The relatively sophisticated treatment of Morgantown Road House shows similarities with other tenant houses associated with large plantations in Charles County.

The dwelling was a two-story, two bay frame dwelling on the north side of Morgantown Road. Abandoned for some time, the house faced south and stood slightly removed from the roadside. An original one story ell extended from the east elevation. Although all windows and doors had been removed long before the property was evaluated, the original exterior finishes including novelty siding remained intact. Simple in design and treatment, the dwelling had some decorative finishes including a boxed cornice, eave returns and corner boards. A single interior end chimney flue was placed in the main block, near the east wall.

The Morgantown Road House, demolished soon after being field surveyed, was a two-story, two bay frame dwelling on the north side of Morgantown Road. Abandoned for some time, the house faced south and stood slightly removed from the roadside. An original one story ell extended from the east elevation. Although all windows and doors had been removed long before the property was evaluated, the original exterior finishes including novelty siding remained intact. Although overtly simple in design, the dwelling had some decorative finishes including a boxed cornice, eave returns and corner boards. A single interior end chimney flue was placed in the main block, near the east wall.

The façade was symmetrical with a first floor doorway to the west and a window to the east. Above this were placed two second story windows. The rear elevation included only two first floor windows. The west elevation was without fenestration. The ell included a doorway on the façade, a single centered window on the east wall and a doorway at the rear.

Due to the building's ruinous condition interior evaluation was limited to the first floor revealing a narrow partitioned stair on the west wall. The stair was enclosed in a narrow stair passage partitioned from the larger room to east. Wide Victorian trim surrounded the windows. Walls were plastered above matchstick wainscoting.

The Morgantown Road House, now demolished was a representative example of the types of vernacular dwellings which were once a common part of the Charles County landscape. Usually associated with families of lesser means, these simple houses typically were two stories in height with a narrow stair passage located on a gable end. The relatively sophisticated treatment of Morgantown Road House shows similarities with other tenant houses associated with large plantations including the tenant house found at Mt. Aventine (CH-75NR) This dwelling was not specifically surveyed in the National Register Nomination but is included in the complex of buildings associated with contributing resource site #12. Less ornate examples include the Sam Montgomery House (CH-644), and the Bowling Tenant House (CH-251)


