The Ernest E. Lyon House occupies a 43-acre site on the east side of Mason Springs Road approximately one mile south of Mason Springs. The house, a modest 2-story frame Vernacular Victorian building, is surrounded by several domestic outbuildings. A historic tobacco barn that pre-dates the dwelling also occupies the property. The house retains many of its original exterior features, with only a few notable alterations. Standing atop a modest hill and set approximately fifty yards back from the main road, the T-shaped house is approached by a tree-lined dirt driveway.

This modest turn-of-the-century farm house and its collection of frame outbuildings are typical of the many rural farmsteads built in Charles County in the early 20th century. Its modest Vernacular Victorian architecture, collection of domestic and agricultural outbuildings, and rural setting are common features of this form and period. The house and outbuildings remain much as they were when originally built, and reflect a rural agricultural lifestyle that predominated in Charles County throughout the first half of the 20th century.

The Ernest E. Lyon House occupies a 43-acre site on the east side of Mason Springs Road approximately one mile south of Mason Springs. The house, a modest 2-story frame Vernacular Victorian building, is surrounded by several domestic outbuildings. A historic tobacco barn that pre-dates the dwelling also occupies the property. The house retains much of its original exterior features, with only a few notable alterations. Standing atop a modest hill and set approximately fifty yards back from the main road, the T-shaped house is approached by a tree-lined dirt driveway. The site slopes down steeply just east of the dwelling, extending out into open fields broken by thickets of dense trees.

The dwelling consists of a 2-story, T-shaped frame structure with Victorian-era detailing. The house stands on a poured concrete pier foundation that has been infilled with concrete blocks. Covered in decorative pressed metal sheets, the cross-gable roof terminates in a boxed eave with cornice returns at the gable ends. Wood cornerboards define the building's edges. Two chimneys break the ridge line. Both are constructed of brick with decorative corbeled caps. A third exterior brick stove flue was added at the northeast corner of the house. A screened half-hipped roof porch occupies the southwest corner of the house. The porch is supported by Victorian-style turned wood posts. Two-over-two double-hung wood sash of late-19th century design occupies the window openings throughout the house. Square-edged flush wood moldings with slightly overhanging "ears" surround the windows and door openings.

The facade, or south and west elevations, contains one original window and a door on the south wall, and one window opening on the west wall on the first story. Above, the three original windows are vertically aligned with the bays below. The south gable end reveals that the house is one room deep and pierced at this end by two vertically aligned windows. The rear of the dwelling reveals some alterations. The first story contains two original windows, matched by two second story windows aligned above. However, at the north end of the rear elevation, an enclosed shed-roof porch was added. This shed addition is pierced by three modern 2/2 wood sash windows, two on its south side and one on its east elevation. In addition, its north end is lit by a small 4-light wood casement window. A single panel-and-light wood door opens into this enclosed porch. Other alterations to the rear elevation include the addition of a single 6/6 wood sash window with a thin wood casing near the northeast corner of the house.

Along the north wall of the house, a modern wood porch provides

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access to a single panel-and-light wood door on the west wing of the house. Otherwise, one original window pierces the first story and two pierce the second story wall. A pair of modern 2/2 wood sash windows have been added to the first story at the north gable end, while a single original window occupies the upper story of this same location.

While the house retains much of its original fabric, it has been altered by the application of asbestos shingles to the exterior walls, and the addition of metal shutters on all the windows. Furthermore, the pier foundation has been infilled with concrete block and the rear porch enclosed. Otherwise, the house retains much of its original appearance.

OUTBUILDINGS:

The domestic outbuildings associated with the Ernest E. Lyon House include a toolshed and a 1-story frame workshop that are likely contemporary with the house. The toolshed that stands directly behind the house is a small 1-story, 1-bay structure with a front gable roof clad in the same pressed metal sheets on the main house. The shed is set on a poured concrete foundation, and has a 5-panel wood door and exposed rafter tails.

The workshop, located just northeast of the house, consists of a 1-story, front gable frame building set on a poured concrete foundation and clad in wood weatherboard. The roof is covered in pressed metal sheets, like the house. A 6/6 double-hung wood sash window pierces the west elevation and a 1-story, 1-bay frame addition extends off the north side of the workshop. The addition appears to date to the mid-20th century.

A small board-and-batten frame goat shed stands still further northeast of the house. This shed is a post-in-ground structure with a sloping shed roof and asphalt shingled roof. This building likely dates to the first half of the 20th century.

The only other building on the property is a ruinous tobacco barn located down the slope behind the house. This building consists of a 1-story frame barn dating to the second or third quarter of the 19th century. The structure consists of unhewn posts set directly in the ground that support a hewn plate and rafters. The posts are joined to the plate with mortises and tenons and pegged. The original building has a steeply pitched roof and a rectangular

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block configuration. A large shed-roofed addition extends off the southeast side of the barn. The verticalboard cladding is circular sawn and the corrugated metal roof is a replacement. Overall, the barn is lightly framed and modest in size, indicating that it was used for drying small crops of tobacco.

In addition to these standing structures, the current resident of the E.E. Lyon House indicated that a slave burial site occupies a wooded hillside some two tenths of a mile southeast of the house. The site could not be properly inspected due to copious undergrowth obscuring the ground.

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This modest turn-of-the-century farm house and its collection of frame outbuildings are typical of the many rural farmsteads built in Charles County in the early 20th century. Its modest Vernacular Victorian architecture, collection of domestic and agricultural outbuildings, and rural setting are common features of this form and period. The house and outbuildings remain much as they were when built and reflect a rural agricultural lifestyle that predominated in Charles County through much of the first half of the 20th century.

During the late 19th and into the early 20th century, the County was predominantly rural and agricultural. Following the Civil War, the County underwent a long period of recession, with many of its wealthy farming families abandoning their lands and moving out of the area. Their large estates were slowly divided up among former tenant farmers into smaller farms, and cultivated with a more diverse array of crops, including grains, vegetables, and tobacco. By the early 20th century, many of these smaller farmsteads had become well established and their owners had acquired the means to construct relatively substantial homes.

The Lyon House is a good example of an early 20th century farmstead in Charles County. The buildings retain much of their original fabric and remain in nearly their original form. Their architectural expression follows the Vernacular Victorian style, popular in rural areas well into the first decade of the 20th century. In addition, the presence of a 19th century tobacco barn, and potential slave burial site, indicates that the site has long been occupied and cultivated.

In 1908, Ernest E. Lyon purchased 9 acres of land from M. Geneveive Green for \$75. The land was a portion of an estate known as "Retreat," which M. Genevieve had inherited from Ferdinand T. Maddox. Ernest grew up across the street at the house of his father and mother, Joseph W. & Ellen A. Lyon (5165 Mason Springs Road), and moved to his new house with his wife, Ella, sometime after 1908. He continued to add to his property over the years, acquiring one acre in 1912 from his parents, another parcel by inheritance from his father in 1923, and a third 3-acre tract in 1946. The land has remained in the ownership of the Lyon family ever since, passing to Ernest E. Lyon's sons, Leonard, Ellis, and the Reverend E. Carl Lyon. Leonard Lyon, born in 1919 at his father's house, continues to reside there.




