By the mid nineteenth century the roads connecting Shorter's Wharf on the Big Blackwater River, Lakesville post office and Wesley Methodist Episcopal church were lined with private dwellings or small farms, and the center crossroads a store was operated by George W. Wroten. Listed as a merchant and farmer in the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson patron list for the Lake District, George W. Wroten owned the general store at the unnamed crossroads east of the Lakesville post office. In addition to the store, he held 220 acres north of the road to Shorter's Wharf.

In 1881 the land at the crossroads was conveyed in a deed between William T. Pritchett and William T. Andrews; a parcel known as "Wood Pasture" was described as situated in the fork of the road leading from Wesley's Church to Shorter's Wharf. William T. Andrews (1846-1927) was also a dealer in dry goods, clothing and the typical lien of merchandise found at a general store. Within the years that followed the unnamed crossroads community of the 1870s came to be known as Andrews. At the turn of the twentieth century, William T. Andrews is listed in the U.S. census as a 53-year old merchant with his wife, Kate, 35; a son, Herman, who was a 16-year old "salesman" in the mercantile operation, a younger son Walter and a daughter Lydia. Late nineteenth century architectural finishes point to the construction of the house and the store across the road during the ownership of William T. Andrews. He maintained ownership of the crossroads properties until 1910. In January 1910, the property, then in receivership, was sold to another local merchant and land holder, William F. Applegarth. Nine months following, in October 1910, William F. Applegarth sold the Andrews crossroads house and store to Robert L. Simmons, who at that time was in partnership with Applegarth in the general merchandise business. For 40 years afterwards, Robert L. Simmons owned the store and occupied the two-story, three-bay frame house with its

story-and-a-half wing. He resided at the Andrews property until his death in 1953. In his will, he left many bequests, and his wife Mina J. Simmons inherited \$10,000, three stores on the east side of Race Street in Cambridge as well as the residence and store property at the Andrews crossroads.

The two-story, three-bay, center hall/single-pile plan house shares architectural finishes with the two-story store building on the west side of the road. (See D-276) The house, store and the nearby canning house complex (See D-825) are the principal historic structures defining this rural crossroads.

DESCRIPTION SUMMARY

Located at 2302 Andrews Road, the two-story, three-bay, single-pile frame dwelling commonly known as the Robert Simmons house is a late nineteenth century four-part house supported on a low infilled brick pier foundation, and the exterior of the historic sections covered with plain weatherboards. The medium pitched roofs are covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, mid to late twentieth century frame wing covered with vinyl siding. The house faces southwest with the principal gable oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Robert Simmons house is a two-story, three-bay, center hall, single-pile frame dwelling dating to the fourth quarter of the nineteenth century. The main two-story house extends to the southeast with a slightly shorter true story-and-a-half three-bay, single-pile wing, which has a single-story shed roofed section to the rear. The late nineteenth century house is supported on an infilled brick pier foundation, and the exterior is clad with plain weatherboards that have distinct circular kerf marks. The weatherboards terminate at the corners of the house against narrow paneled pilasters. The various gable or shed roofs are covered with asphalt shingles.

The southwest (main) façade of the two-story section is three bays across with a center entrance flanked by six-over-one sash windows. The four-panel front door is framed by a narrow beaded edge surround, and is topped by a two-light transom. The windows are flanked by board-and-batten type shutters. The first floor openings are sheltered by a hip roofed porch supported on square posts that rest on a poured concrete slab. The second story is defined by three evenly spaced six-over-one sash windows, also flanked by board-and-batten shutters. Finishing the base of the roof is a boxed cornice trimmed with a crown molding.

The northwest gable end features an exterior corbelled base, common bond chimney stack, which finished at its top with a corbelled cap. The single-flue chimney stack is flanked on each side on both the first and second stories by six-over-one sash windows. All of the windows are flanked by board-and-batten shutters. Piercing the gable end is a pair of two-over-two attic windows. The edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave with returns at the base.

The southeast gable end of the main block is largely covered by the true story-and-a-half three-bay wing, which is contemporaneous to the main block. A center, partially glazed door is covered by a gable roofed hood supported on stick brackets. To each side are six-over-one sash windows flanked by board-and-batten shutters. The second story is lighted by six-over-three sash windows, and each opening has a pair of board-and-batten shutters. The base of the gable roof is finished with a boxed cornice trimmed with a crown molding. The southeast corner of the wing is fitted with a paneled pilaster. The southeast gable end of the wing features an exterior, corbelled base brick chimney stack, which is finished at its top by a corbelled cap. The chimney stack is flanked on its left (west) side by a small window opening that occupies a former door opening. The second floor of the wing is defined by a six-over-three sash windows. Finishing the edge of the roof is an extended eave with returns at the base. To the

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rear of the wing is a shed roofed kitchen, which has a side door on its southeast end that is sheltered by a shed roofed hood.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The Robert L. Simmons house, and before that known as the William T. Andrews house, is a defining historic structure for the crossroads community of Andrews in southern Dorchester County. Developing as a crossroads trading center during the mid nineteenth century, the extant buildings date from around 1880-90 during the ownership of William T. Andrews, a local merchant who purchased land at the crossroads in 1883.¹ The two-story, three-bay house with its story-and-a-half service wing share architectural finishes with the two-story store building across the road. (See D-276) The house and store as well as the nearby canning house complex (See D-825) are the principal historic structures to mark the Andrews crossroads.

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

By the mid nineteenth century the roads connecting Shorter's Wharf on the Big Blackwater River, Lakesville post office and Wesley Methodist Episcopal church were lined with private dwellings, and at the center crossroads a store was operated by George W. 



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house shows the influence of the Greek Revival style in the use of the corner pilasters, almost eighty years after it was first popular. It is a simple building which has more importance because it was the home of Robert Simmons, who originally lived in the store across the street, and who also began the canning business in 1916.
