The most architecturally distinguished structure remaining in the village of Toddville is the Zion United Methodist Church, built around 1890 in a Gothic Revival format with a prominent entrance and bell tower capped by a broach spire. The double-door entrance features a pointed arch transom, and it is sheltered by a turned post, shed-roofed porch enriched with sawn corner brackets. Single, paired or tripartite colored glass windows mark the second level of the tower as well as an adjacent cross-gabled section that projects forward from the main body of the church. Single pointed arch lancet windows define the sides of the church as well as a small apse that extends from the rear wall. Accompanying the church on the lot is a nineteenth and twentieth century cemetery. North of the church is a single-story church hall.

As the community and population of "Todd Town," later modified to Toddville, developed during the mid to late nineteenth century a Methodist Episcopal congregation was established to serve the residents that occupied a ridge of land bordered on each side by extensive marshland west of Fishing Bay. Despite the prevalence of the name Todd, the land bounded by Goose Creek and Little Creek was known as Robinson's Neck due to the large number of residents with that surname. A Methodist Episcopal congregation formed by the third quarter of the nineteenth century, and a church was designated on the south side of the main road extending through the village. Although no early deed has surfaced conveying the original lot for the church, another parcel was acquired by the "Zion M. E. Church of Robinson's Neck" for a cemetery in 1889. Around the same time the congregation financed construction of a new Gothic Revival frame church, which in part followed a design developed by architect Benjamin D. Price for the Methodist Episcopal conference. Church Plan 4A called for a corner entrance and bell tower that was

juxtaposed next to a projecting single story section identified on the plan as an "Infant Room." The exterior of the taller sanctuary section in the proposed design was executed also at Zion with a pent eave crossing the gable front pierced by a square window. A similarly designed front was also executed for the Ebenezer M. E. Church in Crapo (See D-824).

DESCRIPTION SUMMARY

The Zion Methodist Episcopal Church, now known as the Zion United Methodist Church, stands on the west side of Toddville Road in the village of Toddville in the Strait Election District in Dorchester County, Maryland. Built around 1890, this single-story frame church is distinguished by an asymmetrical with a corner entrance and bell tower rising on the northeast corner. The tower is capped by a tall, needle type spire. The pointed arch entrance is sheltered by a turned post porch, which is an extension of a cross-gabled single-story front section. The asymmetrical front of the church is repeated at Ebenezer M. E. Church (D-824), which links the two buildings architecturally. The frame structure rests on a brick pier foundation, and the exterior is clad with vinyl siding. The gable roof as well as the other roof shapes are covered with asphalt shingles. Standing northwest of the church is a single-story, rectangular frame church hall. Located on two sides of the church is a burial ground contains scores of marked graves.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Zion United Methodist Church, historically known as the Zion Methodist Episcopal Church, stands in the center of the village of Toddville in the Strait Election District in Dorchester County, Maryland. The single-story Gothic Revival frame church is supported on a brick pier foundation, and the exterior is clad with vinyl siding. The medium pitched gable roof, as well as the other roofs, are sheathed with asphalt shingles. Located on two sides of the church are scores of marked burials. Standing to the northwest of the church is a single-story rectangular frame church hall built atop a concrete block foundation, and it is covered with asbestos shingles. The medium pitched gable front roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles.

The northeast (main) elevation of the church is an asymmetrical façade with a corner entrance and bell tower rising three stories, and it is capped by a needle type spire. The front, double-door entrance retains late nineteenth century paneled half-leaf doors, and the opening is topped by a pointed arch colored glass transom. The second level of the tower is marked on its northeast face by a paired set of pointed arch windows filled with colored glass panes. Single pointed arch, colored glass windows mark the southeast side of the tower. The second level of the tower is capped by a tapering roof marked by small cross gables fixed above the second level pointed arch windows. The tapering section of tower, sheathed with asphalt shingles, narrows to the belfry, which is capped by needle like spire. Each side of the belfry is fitted with louvered panels in between slender brackets.

The first story entrance porch roof is supported by turned posts enhanced by pierced sawnwork brackets. There is as well a turned baluster handrail. The shed roofed porch is an extension of a single-story cross-gabled section that projects forward from the main body of the church, which has an intermediate shed roofed extension of the gable above the cross-gable roof. The northeast face of the cross-gabled elevation is pierced by a tripartite series of pointed arch, colored glass windows. The edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave trimmed with a crown molding.

The northwest and southeast sides of the main body of the church is marked by three evenly spaced pointed arch, colored glass windows.

Standing north of the church is a single-story, gable-front frame church hall supported on concrete block piers and sheathed with asbestos shingles. The rectangular frame church hall has a small gable-front entrance vestibule on the front and a gable roofed kitchen wing to the rear. The building is lighted by six-over-six sash windows, and the medium pitched gable roofs are covered with asphalt shingles. Also standing on the property is a small shed roofed frame storage shed, which is located behind the church hall.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The most architecturally distinctive structure remaining in the village of Toddville is the Zion United Methodist Church, built around 1890 in a Gothic Revival format with a prominent entrance and bell tower capped by a broach spire. HISTORY AND SUPPORT

As the community and population of “Todd Town,” later modified to Toddville, developed during the mid to late nineteenth century a Methodist Episcopal congregation was established to serve the residents that occupied a ridge of land bordered on each side by extensive marshland west of Fishing Bay. Despite the prevalence of the surname Todd, the land bounded by Goose Creek and Little Creek marsh was known as “Robinson’s Neck.” A Methodist Episcopal congregation had formed by the third quarter of the nineteenth century, and a church was designated on the south side of the main road on the Strait Election District map of the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas.¹ Although no deed has surfaced conveying the property where the church stood to the trustees, another parcel was acquired by the “Zion M. E. Church of Robinson’s Neck” for a cemetery in 1889.² Around the same time the congregation financed the construction of a new Gothic Revival frame church, which in part followed a design developed by Benjamin D. Price in the Methodist

Episcopal Conference's catalogue of plans for churches and parsonages. Church Plan 4A called for an corner entrance and bell tower that was juxtaposed next to a projecting single-story section identified in the plan as an "Infant Room." The exterior of the taller sanctuary section of the church was distinguished by an unusual pent-style eave that crossed the gable-front of the main block. A similarly designed front was also executed for the Ebenezer M. E. Church in Crapo. (See D-824)





<p>Zion United Methodist Church, Toddville, towers above the rest of the landscape in this low-lying area of Dorchester County. The body of the church is a simple rectangular structure, three bays deep with miter arch windows, but its principal (northeast) facade is broken into several distinct architectural elements. The gable of the main body of the church has a square window set beneath a semi-jerkin head roof. From the window extends a shed roof, which is broken on the left by a tall tower and in the center by a gable. Beneath the gable are three windows, the middle one being taller. On the left is a small porch and then the tower entrance.</p> <p>The transom above the double doors is lancet, and is similar to the Eldorado church. Above the porch roof, there are double windows with miter arch sash in a rectangular frame. At the base of the tower roof is a frieze which continues beneath the gables on each side of the square tower. The tower roof is composed of three sections, the lower section, tapered inward only slightly, possessing the gables mentioned with this decorative shingle design. The second section consists of a louvered bellfry which has pilasters at the corners and dividing the louvered area. they continue to the base of the roof and form brackets to support the spire.</p>

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Zion Church is the most intricately designed late 19th century church in rural Dorchester County, excluding the major towns. Its tower is very similar to Street Church and Hooperville Church, but the remainder of the church is not like any other. It is an exceedingly important element in the landscape in the Wingate, Fallins Creek, and Toddville areas, as it can be seen for miles.
