The Garrett McBride Farm is located on the headwaters of the Chicamacomico River, in Dorchester County, Maryland. The property includes a primary residence, built in two sections in ca. 1800 and 1840-1860, and several non-contributing outbuildings. The property retains its agricultural setting and survives as a good example of a 19th-century farm complex on Maryland's rural Eastern shore. The property is considered eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion C.

During the 1820s and 1830s, Garrett McBride began the consolidation of a large estate containing more than 500 acres of land. Most of this land was purchased in parcels of less than 100 acres; at his death in 1856, McBride's land was subdivided into three separate holdings. This farm was considered the "home farm" or "farm No. 1" in the partition of his estate. Except for a brief period in the 1870s, the home farm remained in the McBride family until 1939.

The primary residence was built in two sections. The oldest portion is presently a side kitchen wing to the larger, two-story, four-bay frame dwelling. Set directly on the ground with no foundation, this original section is a 1-1/2-story, frame structure covered with a steeply pitched gable roof and featuring a brick end chimney (now located between the two sections of the house). The walls are clad with contemporary siding and the window and door openings have been reconfigured and replaced. This section of the house survives as a good example of a modest one-room or hall-parlor plan house that was representative of the late 18th-century to early 19th-century rural vernacular dwelling form.

The main and larger section of the house was erected between 1840 and 1860 and was built to abut the end wall of the original building on the site. This main section is a two-story, four-bay, central-passage frame house covered with a gable roof featuring brick end chimneys and return cornices, indicative of the then-popular Greek Revival-style.

Behind the house (to the south) are three contemporary outbuildings including a new garage and two, large pre-fabricated sheds. A chicken house which stood on the property in April 1993 was no longer extant in September 1994. These resources are not fifty years or older and are considered non-contributing to the historic property.

The Garrett McBride Farm survives as a good local example of a vernacular Dorchester County farmhouse. The house, built in two principal stages, illustrates the evolution of rural architecture from the modest one-room and hall-parlor plan houses of the late 18th and early 19th centuries to the larger, and more permanent, two-story, central-passage plan houses of the mid-to late 19th century. In addition, the property retains its rural landscape and its associations with the agricultural economy of the region. The property is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion C, for local significance.

North of Vienna, on the headwaters of the Chicamacomico River, is Garrett McBride Home Farm. This frame house was built in two principal sections: the main section is two stories tall, with the wing being one story. The wing has a steeply pitched gable roof and contains a single room, which served as the kitchen. According to the owner's son, this small section was erected around 1800. This portion of the house lacks a foundation and was set directly into the ground.

The main, larger section was probably erected ca. 1840-1860, and has two stories and a four-bay facade; there is an interior end chimney and an added exterior one which abuts the one-story, later addition. There is a chimney on the west gable and another on the outside of the east gable, where it also pierces the roof of the wing. The east chimney is flanked by two small attic windows. The house now has new windows on the north facade; a small porch overhang with classical-style columns flanking the entrance was added since 1975. A double window is located on the kitchen wing, and on the south side is an enclosed lean-to addition.

The house lacks a full basement but has a dirt floor root cellar which is now used to house the furnace.

### Outbuildings

Behind the house (to the south) is a new garage and two large, pre-fabricated outbuildings. The long chicken house which was there in April 1993 was no longer extant in September 1994.

During the 1820s and 1830s, Garrett McBride consolidated a large estate containing more than 500 acres of land. Most of this land was purchased in parcels of less than 100 acres from subdivisions of the tracts called "Maiden Forest," "Batchelor Forest," and "Partnership." At his death in 1856, the Land Commissioners divided McBride's holdings into three separate farms. Site D-326 is associated with the home farm or Farm No. 1 in the partition of his estate. Except for a brief period in the 1870s, the home farm remained in the McBride family until 1939, when it was sold to John S. Skinner.

According to architectural evidence, the house was built in two sections, one dating ca. 1800 and the other ca. 1840-1860. The earlier section was probably standing on the property when Garrett McBride purchased it. The early section of the house was probably associated with a 30-acre parcel of land which McBride purchased from John C. Henry in 1827 (ER-10-529). A house is mentioned in conjunction with this land as early as 1792, when John Windows sold this 30-acre parcel to Henry Hodson including all "houses, buildings and appurtenances" (HD-4-307). None of the other parcels purchased by McBride included any reference to structures or improvements.

The house, largely in its present form, was standing on the property at Garrett McBride's death and is clearly drawn on the 1856 survey map which shows the division of his estate into three farms. The property was still called the "McBride Farm" as late as 1950.

The house as it is presently situated has been subdivided and stands on a 4.65 acre parcel of land. Visually, however, the property retains its historical setting as the principal residence of a working farm complex.

Since the mid-seventeenth century, the economy of the entire Eastern Shore has been based primarily on agriculture. Initially, the economy was based on the cultivation of a single cash crop, tobacco, which was not only the principal commodity of the region but also served as legal tender. The cultivation of tobacco was labor-intensive and highly specialized, requiring extensive hand cultivation. To accommodate tobacco cultivation, early plantations required housing for a large work force consisting primarily of slaves, as well as specialized buildings for the drying and storage of tobacco and wharfs and landings for its shipment abroad (Land 1974; Stiverson 1977).

During the eighteenth century, Eastern Shore planters began substituting the cultivation of tobacco with the cultivation of wheat. Wheat as a cash crop had two major advantages over tobacco. First, the cultivation of wheat was not labor-intensive and required a large work force for only a brief period of

time during harvest; second, wheat was easier and cheaper to process for market (Stiverson 1977). During the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, the Eastern Shore of Maryland was one of the principal commercial grain-producing regions of the United States. Wheat cultivation required different specialized buildings such as granaries and mills, as well as barns and stables for the mules, horses or oxen which played an important role in commercial grain farming.

By 1860, Maryland's Eastern Shore was no longer an important grain-producing region, and agriculture became more diversified. Some farms continued to cultivate wheat and corn as feed crops in conjunction with dairy farming, while other farms switched to the commercial cultivation of vegetables, poultry, and fruit. During this period, unsuccessful attempts were also made to cultivate rice, flax and cotton (Jones 1966; Stiverson 1977). As the scientific breeding and feeding of animals to enhance their commercial value was introduced, livestock and poultry were no longer permitted to range freely. The adoption of these scientific advances in agricultural technology often required the construction of new kinds of highly specialized agricultural buildings such as large dairy barns, silos, and commercial chicken houses, while scientific advances in the technology of preserving and shipping farm produce resulted in the construction of structures such as packing houses, slaughter houses, and canneries.

During the late nineteenth century, farm machinery of various kinds was introduced. The mechanization of various agricultural tasks such as plowing, sowing, reaping, and milking required either the enlargement of existing farm buildings such as barns and stables or the construction of new buildings to accommodate the farm machinery. At the same time, traditional accommodations for teams of horses, mules, and oxen, as well as tack rooms and cart houses became obsolete. Conversion to exterior power sources and the introduction of modern communications introduced utility poles and wires as an element of the rural landscape.

The Garrett McBride Home Farm is significant as a somewhat rare example of an early to mid-nineteenth century small farmhouse in Dorchester County. This version of a two-section telescope-type vernacular house was not uncommon in nineteenth century Dorchester County, but there are very few remaining today. Except for the altered fenestration on the main portion, the overall form of the house is intact. Situated at the headwaters of the Chicamacomico River, this property still retains its historic landscape setting.

The Garrett McBride Home Farm is eligible to the National Register under Criterion A for its association with farming and Criterion C for architecture. It is not eligible under Criterion B, and it was not evaluated against Criterion D.




