

STEWART HOUSE - 203 HIGH STREET

The date of this house is unknown, although it was extensively renovated in the mid 19th century by Judge James A. Stewart. Originally the house stood directly on the pavement like a store, was painted red, and had an upper portico which extended across the pavement. Sometime in the 1850's Stewart moved the house back from the street, and in 1865 he enlarged the house adding the present Greek Revival style columns. An unusual feature of this house is the two end bays which are "paneled", rather than being covered with weatherboard as the rest of the house. Carved brackets ornament the cornice of the roof and portico.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house, with a two story gabled portico supported by four Doric columns with brackets, is one of the few Cambridge buildings to reflect the Greek Revival influence. This portico was an 1865 addition, although the house itself goes back to an earlier but unknown date. The house has been converted to apartments and the original interior woodwork has been removed.

It is a two and one half story frame structure with a gable roof. There is a gabled dormer on either side of the center portico gable. There are four bays across the front plus a two story polygonal bay window on the north east corner. An unusual feature of this house is the two end bays which are paneled, rather than being covered with wood siding as the rest of the house. Ornamental paneling is also seen in a large rectangle above the door. The first story windows are tall nine over nine sash type, while those on the second floor are six over six sash. Carved brackets support the projecting eaves of the roof and portico, as well as a cornice between the first and second story of the bay window. Brackets are also used for ornamentation to support a sill above the door and on the upper edge of the paneled rectangle.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

History:

This land was part of the 200 feet of property that was conveyed by Dr. William Murray to his son David in 1761. The property then passed through two generations of Murrays to Henrietta Murray Robertson, wife of William M. Robertson, who in April 1800 conveyed it to Richard Hayward for \$600. Richard Hayward died and devised it to Elizabeth Hayward. After her death in 1820, it was conveyed to Thomas Haywood for \$600. In July 1820, Thomas Haywood sold it to James Shanley for \$673 and in March 1837, Shanley sold it to James Pattison for \$600. In 1847, Hon. James A. Stewart, trustee for Pattison's estate, sold this property to John T. Stewart who in 1848 sold it to Judge Stewart for about the same price.

It is not known who erected the original house on this lot, although Col. Clement Sullivane claimed that as far back as 1844 there was an old frame house on the lot. He assumed that the original house was built by the Murray's. During his boyhood, he wrote, the house directly on the pavement like a store, was painted red, and had an upper portico which extended across the pavement. Sometime in the 1850's, Judge Stewart set the house back in line with the other dwellings on the street, making several "improvements" in the house. In 1865, Stewart greatly enlarged the house adding the columns which are there today.

Significance:

This building, renovated in the Greek Revival style, contributes to the historic character of High Street which consists of many houses of architectural interest ranging from the 18th century to early 20th century construction.

My research confirms what Cathe Moore has written already. I would like to add the following biographical information on Judge James A Stewart.

James A. Stewart was born in 1808 near Milton, Dorchester County. He practiced law in Cambridge and edited the Cambridge Chronicle from the late 1820's until 1843. Stewart ran for several political offices during his public life, usually unsuccessfully. But in 1854, he was appointed Judge of the First Judicial District and was also elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. Stewart served three terms from 1855 to 1861. He retired from the public scene, but in 1867 won election to the Court of Appeals, where he served until his death in 1879. Stewart was also an enterprising businessman, being involved in real estate and shipbuilding among other things. In the 1870's he purchased 1,200 acres near Berkely Springs, West Virginia, where a resort hotel was under construction at the time of his death.

The house has been remodeled in the Greek Revival style, one of the few buildidngs of that type in Cambridge.


