The old Woolford place is one of the earliest surviving houses in Dorchester County with an estimated date of construction during the second quarter of the eighteenth century. The house was reworked approximately one hundred years after construction with interior and exterior modifications in the Federal style. The south gable end was modified with the rebuilding and potential extension of the house as well as the introduction of south gable end windows on either side of the rebuilt stack. The west (front) and east (rear) walls retain twelve-over-twelve sash windows. The west wall is defined by a pair of front doors similar to another Woolford family dwelling known as John's Point, also built during the early eighteenth century, which stood on a neck of land bounded by Woolford Creek and Madison Bay. (See D-223)

Long associated with the Woolford family during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, the exact builder of this early structure has yet to be determined. Buried near the house on a former part of the farm are John Woolford (1779-1840) and his wife Ally Woolford (1772-1857). Given that John and Ally (or Allie) Woolford occupied the house during the second quarter of the nineteenth century, they were responsible for the nineteenth century modifications to the interior and exterior of the early house as well as the frame addition to the north. After Ally Woolford's death in 1857, the property, then comprising 247 acres, was transferred by John and Caroline Woolford to James, George, Mary E., and Sarah Ann Woolford in 1861. The farm is identified on the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas under the name "Colonel James Woolford," who held title to around

250 acres at that time. Woolford family ownership was maintained until 1909 when Eleanor E., Marion, and Rosa Woolford sold the property to Ernest and Effie M. Gillis.

DESCRIPTION SUMMARY

The old Woolford place is a second quarter of the eighteenth century, story-and-a-half Flemish and English bond brick dwelling that stands on a prominent site overlooking the northeast branch of Fishing Creek in between Cambridge and Church Creek, Dorchester County, Maryland. Built on a low foundation defined by a beveled watertable, the story and-a-half hall/parlor plan brick dwelling extends to the north by a story-and-a-half wing, which extends further north by a slightly shorter single story early to mid twentieth century addition. Attached to the east side of the nineteenth century frame section is a small gable roofed addition that was moved up to the house from somewhere on the property. The house faces west with the principal gable roofs oriented on a north/south axis. Joining the house on the creek-front site is a nineteenth century smokehouse, an early twentieth century brick root cellar with a subterranean section, and a couple of frame storage buildings.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The old Woolford house, situated on the northeast branch of Fishing Creek, and located by road at 2123 Silver Goose Lane, is a second quarter of the eighteenth century Flemish and English bond brick house resting on a low foundation and covered by a steeply pitched wood shingle roof. A beveled watertable defines the low foundation wall, and the brickwork, formerly displaying a glazed checkerboard brick pattern, has been painted white. The main block is covered by a steeply pitched wood shingle roof. The house faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

The west (main) elevation is a four-bay façade with two center door openings fitted with six-panel doors, and to each side are twelve-over-twelve sash window framed by beaded edge surrounds. The two doors are sheltered by a shed roofed screened-in porch. The base of the roof is finished with a boxed cornice trimmed with bed and crown moldings. The steeply pitched roof is defined by three gable roofed dormers fitted with six-over-six sash windows.

The south gable end features a rebuilt early nineteenth century corbelled shoulder brick chimney stack with six-over-six sash windows to each side. The window openings are spanned by jack arches. When Henry Chandlee Forman visited this site during the second quarter of the twentieth century, he stated that the east end has been entirely rebuilt and potentially extended. The upper gable end is pierced by six-pane casement style windows. Fixed in the corner of gable end to each side of the chimney stack are small louvered vents. The top of the chimney stack is finished with a corbelled cap, and the edge of the roof is trimmed with a plain bargeboard.

The east (rear) elevation of the main block is three-bays across with an off-center six-panel door and flanking twelve-over-twelve sash windows. There appears to be a disturbed and rebuilt section of brickwork between the door and north window. The base of the roof is finished with a boxed cornice, and three gable roofed dormers are evenly spaced cross the roof slope.

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The north gable end of the main block is largely covered by the story-and-a-half frame wing. The wing is extended to the east by a single-story gable roofed section that was reportedly moved up to the house from somewhere in the farmyard and converted to a first floor bedroom. The nineteenth century frame section is served by two stove chimneys, one of which rises against the back of the brick section and surfaces through the roof against the north face of the wider stack to the main block, thereby creating a T-shaped chimney top. Another stack rises off-center through the center section.

Attached to the north end of the center nineteenth century wing is an early to mid twentieth century addition of lower height than the adjacent wing.

The interior of the house was not open to inspection on the first, unannounced visit.

Standing north of the house is a gable roofed frame smokehouse resting on brick piers and covered with plain weatherboard siding. Dating to the early nineteenth century, the smokehouse is covered by a medium pitched gable roof. A board-and-batten door pierces the west (main) façade.

Located next to the smokehouse is a brick and frame root cellar built with a stretcher bond brick walls above grade. There is a subterranean section for the storage of potatoes and other root vegetables. The root cellar is covered with a medium pitched roof with flush gable ends and plain boxed cornices that trim the base of the roof. A board door provides access on the south gable end.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The old Woolford place is one of the earliest surviving houses in Dorchester County with an estimated date of construction during the second quarter of the eighteenth century. HISTORY AND SUPPORT

Woolford family ownership was maintained until 1909 when Eleanor E., Marion, and Rosa Woolford sold the property to Ernest and Effie M. Gillis.²

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

It is reputedely built in 1675 because it has the same type of brick work as Old Trinity Church. The house is a three bay long, one and one-half story brick structure, with a one and one-half story, two bay long addition, with another smaller one story wing addition. The two earliest portions are the first two mentioned.

On the west facade, which looks over a harbour of the north east bank of Fishing Creek, the house is laid in Flemish bond with glazed headers. It has two front doors, with a window on each end. The facade arrangement is similar to Genesar and Makepeace. It is built very close to the ground, but does have a chamfered water table.

The sash on the first floor windows have 12/12 panes, but very small. The original or very early paneled shutters are in place and are hung on "H" hinges. The original frames are in place as well as the cornice. On both sides it has a very steep "A" roof with three dormers on each side of the roof. The back side of the house, which is the approach side, has one door and two windows. The one door entering into the stair passage. The back of the house is laid in English bond. The north gable, which sticks up above the story and a half wing, is laid in Flemish bond and a portion of that is exposed so that you can see the glazed headers. The rest of the house is painted.

The south gable appears to have collapsed and was re-constructed in the 19th century.

On the east side of the kitchen wing, there has been added a very small building which is now used as a bedroom. The west side of the kitchen wing has irregular fenestration because it has been changed. There is a chimney which butts up against the chimney of the main portion of the house and actually forms a T shaped chimney. There is also another chimney in the center of the kitchen, which is north of the preceeding chimney.

Inside the floor plan is like Makepeace and Genesar, it is composed of a central stair passage with a room on each side. The room on the north or living room, is seperated from the stair hall by a vertical board partition. The living room has a chair rail and a mantel which appears to date from the second quarter of the 19th century. The stair is a very simple stair, it raises in two flights, one up to a platform and the other from the platform to the hall, actually doubling back on itself. The stair handrail has a nearly round profile, which is typical of the 1830's. The dining room has a fire-place with a mantel of approximately the same period. On the right side or east side of the fireplace is a cupboard, and according to Mrs. Vane, there is a space behind the cupboard where the children used to be hidden in case of an Indian attack.

Upstairs has the same floor plan, there are two chambers. There is also a small room at the head of the stairs, which

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The building is one of the best houses of the typical one and one-half story form constructed throughout Dorchester County during the early period of its history. Besides being brick, it is also of interest because it has such an unusual facade, with two entrances. There are many unanswered questions concerning the age of the building, since the majority of the interior is from the second quarter of the 19th century and the reputed date of construction is 17th century. More research should be undertaken on the history of the building.

is now the bath. The two chambers are separated from the hall by a vertical board wall, as is the one at the head of the stairs.

The wing is composed of two rooms. The one closest the dining room is a combination dining-living room. It has a fireplace which is back to back with the dining room fireplace, and that wall is composed of vertical board paneling. There is also a stair, in the east corner, with a paneled door on the stair. The door looks to be very early, perhaps from the 1720's or 30's. The rest of the paneling appears to be early 19th century. From a seam in the wall, there appears to have been a passage on the west side of the room, which has been eliminated. This arrangement was found in the kitchen wing of Willow Grove, Caroline County, as well as the Young house in Dorchester.

The house is one of the few remaining one and one-half story brick houses in Dorchester County.
