The property known as Big Mill Tenant House is a 68-acre farm containing an early 19th-century farmhouse with later additions, and several non-contributing outbuildings. Although the Big Mill Tenant House survives as a local example of an early 19th-century dwelling, the building has been significantly compromised by later additions and alterations and no longer retains its original form, massing or detailing. The property does not meet the criteria for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

The property was originally part of a larger tract of land purchased by Silas Fleming in 1839. In 1856, the extensive property was divided into six smaller tracts by the Land Commissioners responsible for dividing Fleming's estate. The Big Mill Tenant House was included as a separate part of the "Big Mill" tract (Tract 6), which was described, at that time, as including "...a dwelling house, fixtures, garden lot, wood lot and a small tenement with about 20 acres of 'Condemned Land'..." The property known as the Big Mill Tenant House is probably that "small tenement with about 20 acres..." Although the house and property were attached to the Big Mills tract, it appears to have been unrelated to the milling activities on the adjacent property. No historical documentation was found to support the local tradition that a tavern was kept at this site.

Probably built around the turn-of-the 19th century, the Big Mill Tenant House is a 1-1/2-story, three-bay frame structure. It is covered with a steeply pitched gable roof with three gable dormers, a boxed wood cornice and two brick end chimneys (one interior, one exterior end). A two-story ell with shed-roof additions abuts the rear of the dwelling, while a single-story enclosed porch extends across the front elevation. The interior has been significantly altered by the addition of modern paneling and drop ceilings.

Three outbuildings, including a frame, gable-roofed structure set upon a stone foundation, a contemporary carport and a modern shed, are located on the property.

Although the Big Mill Tenant House survives as a good local example of an early 19th-century dwelling, it has been compromised by substantial additions and alterations and lacks the architectural distinction necessary to qualify it for listing in the National Register. The dwelling follows a typical vernacular form which began in the 18th century and continued well into the mid-19th century. This house form can be seen in other, better Dorchester County examples.



This three-bay house has a steeply pitched side-gable roof, end brick chimneys, one of which is exterior, and three prominent gabled dormers. The front or north portion of the house is probably the oldest section and may date to the turn of the nineteenth century. The roof is covered with asbestos shingles and the house is covered with white asbestos.

A number of additions and changes have been made to this house. The house was originally a three-bay long, one and one-half story structure with hyphen and kitchen, and these were removed when the house was remodeled. Attached to the front of the house is a large enclosed porch with hip roof, which masks the original main facade that faced north. The house has a two-story ell, with two shed-roof additions on each side of the ell. Appended to the southern end of the ell is a large, single-story, flat-roofed modern wing, which forms a sunroom facing the south. A cinder block chimney has been added on the west side of the sunroom. Inside the house, synthetic panelling and drop ceilings have been applied in the older core.

### Outbuildings

There are two outbuildings on the property and a modern carport. To the rear (south) of the house is a gable-roofed structure with stone foundation and an unusual, projecting side entrance and upper loft level. A large, open shed has been added to the rear of this and another, lower wing has been added to the east side. The core structure is semi-subterranean and although the owner states that it has always been used for storage, it may have served other functions in historic times, such as an icehouse or root cellar. To the southeast of the house is a corrugated metal structure with an open shed attached. Near this is a satellite dish, and on the west side of the house is a garage/carport. With the exception of the semi-subterranean structure, all outbuildings date from the third or fourth quarter of the twentieth century.

This house was probably standing when Silas Fleming purchased "Big Mill" from Henry Willcox in 1839 and was included as a separate part of the "Big Mill" tract (Tract #5) in the division of Silas Fleming's estate made by the Land Commissioners in 1856. The description of "Big Mill" made in 1856 included a ". . .dwelling house, fixtures, garden lot, wood lot and a small tenement with about 20 acres of 'Condemned Land' attached, parts of 'Crafts Addition to Luck By Chance,' 'Coxe's Addition to Bridge Neck,' the 'Condemned Land,' also Big Mill and the house attached nr. Logg Landing laid out for 52 acres clear of water also a wood lot added by the Commissioners being part of 'Laural Hill' and 'Bonwell's Regulation.'" D-96 is probably the small tenement on the 20 acres called "Condemned Land." The 1877 Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson Atlas map of the Vienna area shows the house in the possession of Ezekiel Fleming. Although the house and property were attached to the Big Mills tract, it appears to have been considered a separate tenancy unrelated to milling activities on the adjacent property.

No historical documentation was found to support the local tradition that a tavern was kept at this site.

In spite of significant alterations, there is still some evidence of its early nineteenth century form. The one-and-one-half story, side gable structure with symmetrical facade was a typical vernacular form of the period which appeared to persist until as late as 1840. This house form can be seen, for example, at the more substantial Little Mill Farm, which was built several decades earlier, and the James Dean Farm (D-116) built around 1840 and located in East New Market. Another similar vernacular house form in the area is North Joseph's Right (D-286), located on Morris Neck Road near Cambridge. The Big Mill Tenant House is a relatively typical early nineteenth century house for Dorchester County. The house appears to have at least the core of an early nineteenth century dwelling; however, its integrity had been compromised by alterations, additions, and remodelling. The property would not be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A, B and C. Archaeological evaluation would be required to make complete evaluations under Criterion D.




STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Big Mill on Big Mill Pond was on the north side of the present U.S. 50 on the Chicamacomico River. The mill had been dated as early as 1750 and is also known as Flemming Mill. The Big Mills post office was established 1831. The atlas lists E. T. Flemming, showing the mill on the south side of the narrow road of that time.

The mill was built of granite with pegged woodwork and the stone has been identified as ballast from ships that once docked at Vienna. The mill produced hominy and meal; for hot cakes; also dark flour good for hot cakes but not good for rising. Silas Flemming operated the mill and tavern in the mid-19th century; he had a Negro miller named Moses. It was related that Flemming instructed Moses to take out double tools on a customer with the dictum, "Well, Moses, take it again. If he's poor, keep him poor. If he's rich, he's able to stand it." Flemming died in 1855 and the mill later passed to Alexander H. Hurley. There was also a sawmill. An overshot wheel was employed.

Solomon Sherman operated the mill at another time. It closed in 1917 and was later wrecked in a storm and the materials reused. The site is now the farm of J. Leslie Bradley. Dorchester News, August 2, 1967. Also, "The Old Mill at Salem," It Happened In Dorchester, pp. 71-74.

The present house may have been the Tavern mentioned in #7, in which case it is important as an early hostelry. It is like many early 19th century dwellings.
