**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Louise Moore House is a small two story frame front gable Carpenter Gothic house which faces north from the south side of Buckingham Lane in Buckeystown.

The principal facade is two bays wide. The main entrance, a replaced door with one light transom is located in the second bay. The fenestration in the first bay has been changed from the original 2/2 window to a large picture window. Original 2/2 windows occupy each bay on the second level.

An original frame porch with turned columns, brackets, scrolls and spindlework extends across the front of the building on the first level.

A five pane circular window is centered in the front gable. The main block of the building extends two bays in length.

A two story addition is located to the south and west sides of the main block.

The residence is built on a low random stone foundation and is covered by a patterned slate roof on the original part of the building. A single corbeled brick chimney rises from the center of the house.

The character of the building has been significantly changed by a covering of aluminum siding.


