## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ada Schaefer House is a two and one-half story frame residence covered with asbestos shingles which faces north from the south side of Buckingham Lane in Buckeystown.

The principal facade is four bays wide. The main entrance, a replaced half panel, half window paned door with narrow two light transom is located in the third bay from the east corner of the building.

Occupying the remaining bays on the first level and all bays on the second level are double hung 2/2 windows covered with storm windows and flanked by louvered shutters.

An original one story frame porch with dentiled cornice and six turned columns extends across the entire front of the residence. The entire building is covered by a patterned slate flank gable roof with plain boxed cornice and return. Two single corbeled brick chimneys extend from the east and west gable ends of the building.

The entire building is constructed on a low brick foundation laid in stretcher bond. A one story frame addition covered with asbestos siding extends to the southeast rear of the building.


