Saint Josephs Church on Carrollton Manor is a one story gable roofed coursed grey limestone Church. The structure is one bay wide and four bays in length with a main entrance, of twin gothic arched paneled doors framed by carved and paneled pilasters carrying an entablature which extends forward of the main block of the building. Rising directly above the main entrance is a frame octagonal Church tower with louvered belfry and patterned shingle spire.

Saint Josephs is an important site to the Buckeystown area as an early establishment of Roman Catholicism and because of its associations with the John Carroll family. According to Jesuit historical archives the Church was built through funding by Carroll and completed by 1829.

In 1867, the Church was rebuilt in the same location despite opposition from local parishioners to move the workshop place to a more populated area in Buckeystown or Adamstown. The walls of the original church were left standing and the entrance was changed from the west to the north side.

Saint Joseph's Church on Carrollton Manor is a one story gable roofed coursed grey limestone Church which faces north from the south side of Manor Woods Road near Buckeystown, Frederick County, Maryland.

The structure is one bay wide and four bays in length. The main entrance, twin gothic arched paneled doors framed by carved and paneled pilasters carrying an entablature extends forward of the main block of the building.

Located directly over the doorway are twin segmented narrow Gothic windows with radiating brick arches. Rising directly above the main entrance is a frame octagonal Church tower with louvered belfry and patterned shingle spire. In the northeast and northwest corners of the principle facade of the building are located small stone buttresses which extend to the roof line.

Located in each bay on the west side and in the second, third and fourth bays on the east side is an arched stained glass gothic window with radiating brick arches. The front asphalt gable roof is attached by a plain cornice with plain frieze. A small entrance is located in the first bay on the east side.

A brick single flue exterior chimney is centered in the south gable. A double hung 12/12 window is located in the southeast corner of the building.

An ornate cast iron fence surrounds the church on the north side. A large cemetery including the graves of "about a hundred Irish Catholics, who died in 1814-1826 and 1832, while building the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal", is located south of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Saint Joseph's Church on Carrollton Manor has been important to the Buckeystown area of Frederick County, Maryland, not only as an early establishment of Roman Catholicism, but also, because of its association with the Charles Carroll family.

The first St. Joseph's was built on Carrollton Manor under the auspices of Charles Carroll and through the leadership of Father Maleve, S. J. (1820)

According to a letter in the Jesuit historical Archives at Woodstock College, "Father Maleve was allowed to take his last vows on the 29th of June 1815. On his return to Frederick he continued the work he had been doing so well. The next undertaking worthy of notice was the building of Saint Joseph's Church on the Manor about seven miles from Frederick. The work was finished in 1829. The lot of ground for the church and graveyard with a portion of the funds, no doubt, for the building itself was a gift to the Father from Charles Carroll of Carrollton."

In 1867, the church was rebuilt in the same location despite opposition from local parishioners to move the worship place to a more populated area in Buckeystown or Adamstown. The walls of the original church were left standing and the entrance was changed from the west to the north side. The cost of the new church was seven thousand dollars, five thousand of which was provided by a great granddaughter of Charles Carroll, Miss Emily Harper. John K. Taylor, an Emmitsburg contractor, was the builder.



Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Saint Joseph's Church on Carrollton Manor is a one-story, gable-roofed coursed grey limestone church, which faces north from the south side of Manor Woods Road near Buckeystown, Frederick County, Maryland.

The structure is one bay wide and four bays in length. The main entrance, twin Gothic arched paneled doors framed by carved and paneled pilasters carrying an entablature, extends forward of the main block of the building.

Located directly over the doorway are twin segmented narrow Gothic windows with radiating brick arches. Rising directly above the main entrance is a frame octagonal tower with louvered belfry and patterned shingle spire. In the northeast and northwest corners of the principal facade are small stone buttresses which extend to the roof line.

Located in each bay on the west side and in the second, third, and fourth bays on the east side is an arched stained glass Gothic window with radiating brick arches. The front asphalt gable roof is attached by a plain cornice with plain frieze. A small entrance is located in the first bay on the east side.

A brick single flue exterior chimney is centered in the south gable. A double-hung, 7/12 sash window is located in the southeast corner of the building.

The interior of the building is dominated by the front altar, which has a frame canopy supported by four columns of the Ionic order on boxed supports. A frame railing of decorative millwork extends across the front of the altar. Walnut pews with doors extend to the rear of the room. A balcony overhangs the entrance in the rear of the chamber. Four stained glass windows are located along each side. All of the interior fixtures of the building were donated by a local prominent citizen, William Jarboe Grove.

An ornate cast-iron fence surrounds the church on the north side. A large cemetery, including the graves of "about a hundred Irish Catholics, who died in 1814-1826 and 1832, while building the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal", is located south of the building.

The three and one-fourth acres include both the church and cemetery, which is extensive. The area also includes a 2½-story frame house once used as a parsonage located east of the church.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SIGNIFICANCE

This grey limestone building is typical of the late 18th and early 19th century structures in the Buckeystown area of Frederick County; however, it is the only church constructed during this period and still standing.

It is important to the Buckeystown area of Frederick County not only as an early establishment of Roman Catholicism, but also because of its association with the Charles Carroll family. St. Joseph's Church was built on the Carroll's Carrollton Manor under their auspices.

HISTORY

The first St. Joseph's was built on Carrollton Manor under the auspices of Charles Carroll and through the leadership of Father Maleve, S.J. in the 1820s.

According to a letter in the Jesuit Historical Archives at Woodstock College, "Father Maleve was allowed to take his last vows on the 29th of June 1815. On his return to Frederick he continued the work he had been doing so well. The next undertaking worthy of notice was the buildings of Saint Joseph's Church on the Manor about seven miles from Frederick. The work was finished in 1829. 




Scale 20 Rods to an Inch




