The Lewis F. Stunkle Farmstead has a circa 1880 frame dwelling with modern vinyl siding, which retains the original segmental window and door openings and an elaborate one-story porch with turned columns, brackets, decorative moldings, and pendants. The outbuildings include a frame smokehouse, a bank barn, wagon shed/corn crib, and a chicken house. These date from about the 1880's to 1910. The architectural features are moderately significant, having been altered in the modern period, and the relationships between the domestic and agricultural groups remain generally intact, though several non-contributing structures have been built in the agricultural part. The farmstead was established beginning about 1878 by Lewis F. Stunkle, the grandfather of Mr. Glenn Stunkle, the current owner.

The Lewis F. Stunkle Farmstead is moderately significant for the architecture of the dwelling, which, although altered with vinyl siding and some replacement windows, retains the segmental window and door openings, cross gable, and fairly elaborate porch ornamentation of the last quarter of the 19th century. The architecture of the remaining outbuildings is minimally important, as most of the buildings have been altered in exterior materials and by modern additions. The farmstead was established about 1880 by Lewis F. Stunkle with two land purchases, one in 1878 for 111.25 acres, and one in 1899, for 43.5 acres. The farm remains the property of his grandson and presently has approximately 107 acres.

In comparison with other late 19th century farmsteads, the Stunkle Farmstead has many of the same characteristics in the apparent original planning of the domestic and agricultural groups. The domestic group is directly adjacent to the bank barn, separated only by the common entrance drive. Alterations have also followed generally the same course, with modern buildings of concrete block and metal mostly in the agricultural group and the dwelling remodeled with artificial siding covering the original german siding.

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 5

The Lewis F. Stunkle Farmstead is an agricultural complex centered on a circa 1880 frame house with a cross gable, vinyl siding, and a bracketed one-story porch with a frame smokehouse of about the same period, a frame bank barn, a frame wagon shed/corn crib, and a frame chicken house, all of the period about 1880-1910. The farmstead also contains several non-contributing modern agricultural outbuildings and sheds, including a deteriorated frame hog pen. The farmstead is located on the south side of Dickerson Road, about 1/4 mile north of the CSX Railroad tracks, formerly the B&O Railroad, approximately 1-1/2 miles east of Tuscarora, Frederick County, Maryland. The farmstead is reached via a long, unpaved driveway shared by several other property owners with its entrance off Dickerson Road near the Licksville School (F-1-173). Dates of the buildings are based on architectural evidence and a personal interview with Mr. Glenn Stunkle, the current owner who is a grandson of Lewis F. Stunkle.

The dwelling is located near the center of the farmstead and faces east toward the bank barn and other agricultural buildings. The main elevation has three bays with segmental arched openings. The windows are 2/2 with louvred shutters. The central cross gable has a narrow 1/1 window. The central entrance also has a segmental arched transom with four lights and sidelights. The door has moldered arched panels. The one-story porch has turned columns and a concrete deck. Ornamental scroll-sawn brackets, a dentil molding, a dog-tooth edging, and pendants distinguish the porch. The gable roof has a standing seam metal covering and interior end chimneys. A two-story rear wing extends from the southwest corner of the main section. The wing also has an interior end chimney on the west end. An enclosed one-story shed porch is on the south elevation of the wing. The sash in the wing are 1/1 replacements. The interior of the house was inaccessible for this survey.

Smokehouse: The frame smokehouse is located southwest of the house. Built about the same time as the dwelling, around 1880, the smokehouse has board-and-batten siding and a modern composition gable roof. On the east elevation is a vertical board door.

Chicken house: The frame chicken house is located north of the smokehouse. It appears to have been built about 1900-1910. It has tongue-and-groove siding and a standing seam metal shed roof.

Bank barn: The frame bank barn was probably built in the 1880's at about the same time as the house, but has additions and alterations made at several periods up to the present. It has tongue-and-groove siding with some sections in board-and-batten. The roof is covered with standing seam metal. The ramp is on the north elevation with two sets of sliding doors. A non-contributing concrete block milk house is located near the southwest corner of the barn, which is currently used a hog barn with hay storage on the barn floor.


