The David Specht House is a two-story brick dwelling with Greek Revival interior details built about 1837 as the center of a farmstead. Most of the farm buildings are no longer extant, except for a non-contributing dairy barn, milk house, and silo base near the house. The house has a three-bay main elevation on the north with a partially rebuilt one-story porch. The perpendicular rear wing has been extensively remodeled in the mid-20th century, with an enclosed and enlarged two-story porch on the east side and a surrounding brick terrace. The interior has also been much changed, with the removal of at least one wall in the main section and the possible relocation of the staircase. Two Greek Revival mantelpieces remain in the house, with vernacular versions of fluted pilasters and frieze panels. Davis Specht (born 1796) is the probable builder of the house and was killed by a falling brick during a storm, although it is unknown whether the death occurred at this house or another family property. During the Civil War, the property was the scene of an incident between Union troops and Jacob Specht, David's brother, in which Specht's fences were torn down, rebuilt by Specht, and taken down again as the Union party first pursued and then were pursued by Confederate cavalry, all within the space of an hour.

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 1

The David Specht House is a two-story brick dwelling built about 1837 with extensive alterations to the interior floor plan and finishes in the period about 1960 to the present. The house is located on the south side of Doubs Road about 1/4 mile east of the former B&O Railroad tracks near Doubs, Frederick County, Maryland. The house was formerly the center of a working farm, but all of the major outbuildings except the non-contributing concrete block dairy barn and milk house and a concrete silo base have been removed. The house is currently a private residence and is located on a hill screened from Doubs Road by trees. The principal elevation faces north and a much-altered two-story wing extends to the south of the main section. The date of the building was estimated by architectural evidence, land records, and historical maps.

The dwelling has 6:1 American bond brick walls currently painted gray. The three-bay north elevation has an exposed stone foundation and a one-story porch with turned columns and a modern balustrade and steps. The porch roof has been extensively repaired in the past year, but retains spindle brackets and some pendants along the lower cross beams. The center entrance has a four-panel door and a three-light transom. The windows are 6/6 with plain wood lintels. The brick cornice is corbeled and the roof is covered with standing seam metal. Interior end chimneys are at the east and west gable ends. The west elevation has no opening other than the 2/2 attic windows. The east elevation has two bays with 6/6 windows and the 2/2 attic windows. The south side of the main section is almost entirely dominated by the two-story wing. The west side of the wing has three irregular bays with two entrances. One first story window opening has been reduced in size. A modern carriage lamp is located next to the southernmost door. A modern brick terrace surrounds the entire wing. The east side of the wing has a modern wood deck and an extensively enlarged and enclosed one-story porch, work also primarily from the 1960's-1980's period. The interior floor plan has been altered by the possible removal of a wall which separated a central hall from the two flanking rooms. The current interior wall finish is wallpaper, concealing any evidence in the older wall plaster which might hint at the original configuration. The remaining wall has an enlarged doorway into the east parlor. Both rooms in the main section have molded wood mantelpieces in the Greek Revival style with pilasters and a frieze panel adorned with closely grouped half-round molding, apparently a vernacular interpretation of the flutes of a classical column. The window surrounds are also molded in the Greek Revival style, with a center raised molding flanked by inverted channels. The stairs are currently located behind the two front rooms and it is unclear whether they were relocated from the possible center hall. The rear wing is much altered, as suggested by the exterior, containing the kitchen and a sun room. The second story rooms are also extensively remodeled.

The David Specht House is minimally significant in architecture as an example of a vernacular brick dwelling with Greek Revival details of the period about 1837-1840. This is approximately the peak of the Greek Revival style in Frederick County, although decorative features such as window and door frames, mantelpieces, and stair detailing in the Greek Revival style continued to be used into the 1850's. The Specht House, although considerably altered on the interior and on much of the exterior, retains two representative Greek Revival mantelpieces, with simple lines and a vernacular craftsman's version of flutes on the pilasters and frieze panel. The house was probably built about 1837 by David Specht, who bought 251 acres of Carrollton Manor land from Richard Bayard in that year. In Grove's History of Carrollton Manor (1928), the Spechts are said to have come to Frederick County during the 1770's and that David was born in 1796. Married three times, but having no children, David Specht was killed by a brick falling from a chimney after a storm. It is not clear whether the death happened at this house or at another nearby property shown on the 1858 and 1873 maps. Another David, a nephew of the one born in 1796, is also mentioned, leaving some doubt about which generation is the David Specht indicated as the owner on the 19th century maps. The Grove account goes on to tell of the crossing of the Specht lands by advancing and retreating Union and Confederate raiding parties going from Point of Rocks toward Adamstown along the railroad line. Jacob Specht (born 1804), the brother of David, was a Southern sympathizer and immediately rebuilt the fences knocked down by the Union troops on the way north. A half hour later, the troops came back the same way in retreat and were enraged to find the fences in their way with the Confederate cavalry in pursuit. They forced Specht to take the fence down again, threatening him with death, but the approaching Rebel troops made them ride off without carrying out the act. Since the Specht property at that period was much larger than the current parcel (approximately 50 acres) on which the David Specht House stands, the actual site of this incident is unknown. From 1913 to 1943, the 50-acre property was owned by John P. Hickman, who erected the concrete block dairy barn and other structures remaining near the house.






