Circa 1795

The Philip Sinstock House, a fine vernacular Federal style residence in the north section of Buckeystown was built by Philip Sinstock, c. 1795 after he purchased the land upon which it sits for fifty pounds from John Darnall.

In February 22, 1806, the property was advertised for rent in the Fredericktown Herald as follows:

"I will rent the house and lot in Buckey's Town six miles south of Fredericktown formerly the property of Philip Sengstack, deceased. The house is large with four rooms below and one above, a good kitchen and smokehouse, all of brick, a good stable and excellent garden. It is a fine stand for a blacksmith or any other mechanic. Possession can be given immediately."

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Philip Sinstock House is a two and one-half story gable roofed brick residence laid in common bond which faces east from the west side of Route 85 in Buckeystown.

The principal facade is five bays wide. The main entrance is a replaced raised three panel door with colonnaded entrance, three side lights and seven light transom with architrave hood molding.

Occupying the remaining bays on the first and second levels are 9/9 windows in pegged frames with many original panes flanked by louvered shutters. Jack arches are located over each window.

An original two story brick addition extends to the southwest corner of the building.

A one story brick addition four bays wide extends to the north side of the building.

Replaced vertical panel doors occupy the second and third bays. Replaced 6/6 windows with jack arches and louvered shutters occupy the remaining bays. The addition is believed to have been used as a kitchen and smokehouse. Original brick flooring is retained in the building.

Both buildings are covered by a replaced corrugated tin roof with original stepped brick cornice.

The entire building is constructed on a low random stone foundation. Two large corbeled brick chimneys rise from the north and south gable ends of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Philip Sinstock House, a fine vernacular Federal style residence in the north section of Buckeystown was built by Philip Sinstock, c. 1795 after he purchased the land upon which it sits for fifty pounds from John Darnall.¹

In 1803, Sinstock died and his estate which included "houses, land, and store goods" was sold by Ignatius Davis and George Buckey, trustees, to Jeremiah Tarlton,² who subsequently sold it to George Buckey.

In February 22, 1806, the property was advertised for rent in the Fredericktown Herald as follows:

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Daniel Buckey later purchased the property.

According to Grove's, History of Carrollton Manor, "Miss Coventry taught school in this house about 1858. This room was used as a store and dwelling by the Buckeys. The last to keep store here was Blessing and Day. They also sold liquor."⁴

The house has had many subsequent owners, but has changed very little since it was built in the eighteenth century.


