Saint Mathews Evangelical Lutheran Church is a one story rectangular gable roofed white frame church and an excellent example of late Victorian Carpenter Gothic architecture. The main entrance is a twin paneled door with an etched glass four light transom. Above the doorway and extending to the belfry tower is decorative fishscale shingle work. The belfry is an open frame structure with decorative millwork and a swinging bell intact.

According to William's History of Frederick County, a congregation was meeting in the vicinity of the church as early as 1784. In April 1831, the congregation was officially organized by Reverend John H. Smaltz, pastor of the reformed church in Frederick. In 1840, the congregation joined the Jefferson and Loudon groups in a preacher circuit. For more than fifty years, the group worshipped in a union chapel with a Lutheran congregation.

In the spring of 1893 the building committee, Stephen A. Thomas, George W. Myers, E. T. Waskey, C. F. Zimmerman and S. C. Thomas bought out the Lutheran interest in the Union Chapel, razed it and constructed the present building at the cost of \$4,000.<sup>1</sup>

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Saint Mathews Evangelical Lutheran Church is a one story rectangular gable roofed white frame church which faces east from the west side of Ballenger Creek Pike in an area known as Church Hill.

The church is an excellent example of late Victorian carpenter gothic architecture. The principle facade is three bays wide; a belfry tower extends forward of the main block of the building in the second bay.

The main entrance, twin paneled doors with an etched glass four light transom is located in the second bay. Above the doorway and extending to the belfry tower is decorative fishscale shingle work. The belfry is an open frame structure with decorative millwork and a swinging bell intact. A pyramidal roof with bell finial covers the belfry tower. Located in the remaining two bays are simple double hung 1/1 windows.

The building is four bays deep with double hung 4/4 windows with louvered shutters. Two original small shed roof frame additions extend the rear of the structure. The entire building frame is built on a coursed random stone foundation. A standing seam tin gable roof with a hip to the rear covers the building.

A one story modern cinder block addition is located southwest of the original building.

A cemetery is located immediately south and across Ballenger Creek Pike, east of the building. Graves dating into the eighteenth century and printed in German indicate early settlements in the area.


