The R. S. Weedon House is a one and one-half story log residence covered with German siding.

Owned by the current owners since 1952, the R. S. Weedon House is believed to have always been the property of Black residents who lived in this area of residence since the mid nineteenth century.

The building is located on the 1858 Bond Map of the town although no owner is indicated. In 1873 the house is inhabited by G. Scholl, although nothing is known about the resident.

Probably one of the most modest dwellings in Buckeystown, the house is important to the town as one of the earliest residence which is constructed of log.

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The R. S. Weedon House is a one and one-half story log residence covered with German siding which faces north from the south side of Old Route 80 in Buckeystown.

The principal facade is three bays wide. Small pegged 6/6 windows occupy the first two bays and are covered by stationary aluminum awnings. The main entrance, a replaced door with lighted panes is located in the third bay and is covered by a single bay aluminum covered frame porch.

A single story frame addition extends to the rear of the building and is covered by a shed tin roof.

The very modest residence is built on a low rubble stone foundation and is covered by a flank gable standing seam tin roof. A single replaced brick chimney rises from the center of the roof. A white picket fence of several different variations surrounds the building.



Circa 1850

The W. C. Mead House is a two and one-half story frame residence with one story rear log addition. It is one of few buildings which were standing in Buckeystown at the time the Bond Map of 1858 was made. Dr. Walter Meade and his wife, Mary, had purchased the property from Benjamin Cunningham who owned the stone house at the corner.

Meade served as one of two physicians in the town according to Grove's History of Carrollton Manor.

In 1864, Mrs. Valietta Weasley Blessing purchased the property from Mead. The house was occupied by the Blessing family for almost one hundred years.

One of the occupants was Minnie Keller who served as the village school teacher. The building has had numerous owners since 1957 when it was sold at public auction.
