DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The W. C. Mead House is a two and one-half story frame residence with one story rear log addition which faces north from the south side of Old Route 80 in Buckeystown.

The principal facade of the building which is built in two sections is five bays wide. The main block of the house is three bays wide. The main entrance, a replaced multipane door is located in the second bay. The entrance is covered by a one bay wide pedimented entrance porch. Occupying the remaining bays are original double hung 6/6 windows.

A two bay wide two story addition extends to the west side of the building. A replaced paneled door with bracketed overdoor occupies the first bay of the addition (fourth bay of the principal facade). Located in the remaining bays are double hung 6/6 windows.

A shed roofed frame and shed addition extends to the east side of the residence partially enclosing the exterior chimney.

A rear one story frame over log building extends to the south of the residence.

The entire structure which sits on a low random stone foundation is covered with weatherboarding with corner boards. The building is covered by a flank gable replaced composition shingle roof on the main block.

The rear addition is covered by a tin roof. Both roofs are attached by a plain boxed cornice. Three single brick chimneys rise from the house. The chimney on the rear addition and on the east gable end of the main block is an exterior brick chimney. The third chimney, now located in the west center of the main block was also probably an exterior chimney before the west addition was made.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The W. C. Mead House is one of few buildings which were standing in Buckeystown at the time the Bond Map of 1858 was made. Dr. Walter Mead and his wife, Mary, had purchased the property from Benjamin Cunningham who owned the stone house at the corner.

Mead served as one of two physicians in the town according to Grove's History of Carrollton Manor.¹

In 1864, Mrs. Valietta Weasley Blessing purchased the property from Mead. The house was occupied by the Blessing family for almost one hundred years.²

One of the occupants was Minnie Keller who served as the village school teacher. The building has had numerous owners since 1957 when it was sold at public auction.³


