Circa 1850

The John Trundle House was built between 1852 and 1873 on one hundred, ninety-two acres of land which Trundle purchased from Emily McTavish, an heir of Charles Carroll of Carrollton on October 9, 1852.

Twenty years later, Melville and Abby Cromwell purchased the land from the heirs of John Trundle and sold it to a relative, Christian Cromwell in 1896.

In 1909, William Baker, the Buckeystown entrepreneur, purchased the property and sold it to the Standard Lime and Stone Company of West Virginia in 1909, who certainly made use of the large lime kiln sitting on the northwest corner of the property. (F-1-21)

The house is a two and one-half story whitewashed brick residence with a frame tenant house, wagon shed, frame barn, and stone lime kiln also located on the premises.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John Trundle House

The house is a two and one-half story whitewashed brick gable roofed residence which faces north from the south side of Manor Woods Road.

The principle facade is five bays wide. The main entrance, a replaced colonnaded door with single side lights, recessed paneling, three light transom and dentiled cornice, is located in the third bay. A circular molding is centered over the doorway which has a triple header arch.

Occupying the remaining bays are replaced 1/1 windows with storm windows, louvered shutters with circular moldings and double header brick arches above each window.

A columned five bay wide frame porch extends across the front of the building on the first level. A two story brick addition extends to the rear of the building. This addition is unusually wide and appears to have been built at the same time as the main block of the house.

A two story open porch runs along the west side of the building and extends around the south side of the house on the first level. Portions of the porch have been enclosed in two areas of the building. A part of the two story open porch has been enclosed in brick in the southwest corner of the main block and first level of the southeast corner of the building.

The entire structure is covered by a flank gable roof of slate shingles with plain boxed cornice with return. The house is built on a low random stone foundation. Two whitewashed corbeled chimneys with bare caps rise from the east and west gables of the building.

Also located on the premises are a frame tenant house, wagon shed, frame barn and stone lime kiln. (F-1-21)

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The lime company sold the farm in 1945 and it has several owners since that time.⁴


