The Levin West House is a two-story stone house with a 1-1/2 story brick rear wing originally built about 1815 and containing both Federal and Greek Revival decorative details. Located on the former road between Petersville and Berlin (later Brunswick), the house was partially used as a doctor's office by Dr. Levin West, the grandson of the builder in the late 1880's. The house is significant for its representative transitional stylistic details and building technology, which combines both stone and brick materials and interior moldings and mantels of the Federal and Greek Revival periods.

The Levin West House is a two-story rubble stone dwelling built about 1815 located on the west side of a driveway running south off Jefferson Pike (Maryland Route 180) just west of Petersville, Frederick County, Maryland. The drive was once a public road connecting Petersville and Berlin (later Brunswick), but is now a dead end just south of the Levin West House. The house faces east toward the drive.

The house has two sections, a two-story stone main part with three bays facing east, and a 1-1/2 story brick rear wing with additions and alterations made in the mid-20th century. The main part is partially plastered on the south gable end, the north elevation, and the west elevation above the roofline of the rear wing. The principal entrance is in the southern bay of the three, with a transom and sidelights. The partial plastering of the exterior is mostly around the doorway on this elevation. Wood lintels and sills are at the door and window openings and the sash is 6/6, flanked by louvred shutters. The cornice is brick and is corbeled. The roof is composition with interior end brick chimneys. On the north elevation is a one-story brick addition near the junction of the two sections of the house. The brick is painted white, as is the rear wing. The date of this addition is unknown and the projection has only a single small room with a trap door in the floor, suggesting a room for safekeeping of valuables, a need that may have arisen during the Civil War.

The rear wing has 4:1 bond and a corbeled cornice. Two dormers are located in the north and south slopes of the composition roof; these are apparently 20th century additions. On the west end of the wing is an exterior brick chimney enclosed by a screened porch which is also a later addition. On the exterior wall above this porch is the outline of a gable roof, indicating a further addition which has been demolished. On the south side of the wing was an open porch which was enclosed during the mid-20th century as a kitchen. The stone foundation visible on this elevation suggests that the enclosed area may possibly have been a separate structure, such as a summer kitchen, that was linked to the main section and brick wing by infill segments over several time periods. The link between the main structure and the kitchen area shows a concrete block foundation on the south side, clearly a modern addition which contains a bathroom. The exterior of the enclosed kitchen section is german siding.

The floor plan of the main house is a side hall type, with a single large parlor on the north side of the hall in the main section. Bull's eye corner blocks and simple wood moldings in the hall suggest the transition between Federal and Greek Revival influences. A dentil cornice in the parlor is likely a late Federal feature, while the mantel is a columned Greek Revival style. The first floor room in the wing, now the dining room, also has a Greek Revival mantel. This room is said by local tradition to have been a doctor's office, possibly referring to the 1880's period when Dr. Levin West, the grandson of the builder Levin West, had his practice in Petersville. The projecting room referred to in the exterior description is entered from this room, suggesting the safekeeping of medical

The Levin West House is important for its architectural details and design, which indicate its construction during a period of transition in both stylistic and technological methods in the first and second quarters of the 19th century. The stone structure and side hall plan of the main section are typical of the late Federal period and have much in common with similiar structures built around 1800. The brick wing with its successive extensions and alterations are similar to alterations made on the majority of Frederick County dwellings during the middle third of the 19th century and later. The Greek Revival and Federal moldings and mantels in the house are also indicators of a transitional house.

The house may have been built by Levin West, a son of one of the early settlers of the Petersville district, Joseph West. The original homestead of the West family may be the George W. West Farmstead (F-2-73) on the north side of Jefferson Pike. Levin West is described in Williams and McKinsey's History of Frederick County as a farmer. Bessie West, whose 1848 inscription is in the bedroom of the main section of the house, was the youngest daughter of Levin West. One of his sons, Patrick McGill West (1825-1904), was the father of Dr. Levin West (born 1864). Dr. West first studied medicine under his uncle, George W. West, and later graduated from the University of Maryland in 1886. He practiced in Petersville from 1886 to 1890, when he took special training in New York. This four-year period is probably when the association of local tradition with the first floor room in the wing with the doctor's office was established.

equipment and pharmaceuticals as its purpose. A second stairway to the upper level of the wing is enclosed next to the fireplace, indicating that this may have been the original kitchen of the house and later was given more refined finish for use as the dining room or doctor's office. The western end of the wing is occupied by a small room now serving as an office. Its original use is undetermined.

On the second floor of the main section is a single bedroom separated from the upper level of the wing by a cross hall with a curved wall near the main staircase, a feature seen in early 19th century rowhouses in Baltimore, but as yet unresearched in Frederick County dwellings of the period. The Frederick County Landmarks Foundation registry information submitted in the early 1970's stated a dated wall inscription of 1848 with the name Bessie West exists in this room, but was unobserved during the survey. Bessie West was probably Elizabeth West, one of the children of Levin West and an aunt of Dr. Levin West (Williams and McKinsey, History of Frederick County, p. 872). The original hardware in the bedroom on the early closets is of a high level of craftsmanship not usually associated with rural blacksmiths, indicating they may have been acquired elsewhere.

No outbuildings presently exist on the property, but the stone foundation of a probable smokehouse or springhouse are located southwest of the rear wing near a grove of trees.







Scale 2 inches to the mile





(New Market Dist.)



 Detail of Petersville Map


