


Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

The Garrot-McDuell farm, located between Burkittsville and Knoxville, is setback from a country road that leads to Route 17. Route 17 extends along the base of the South Mountain. The farm is sited on a knoll with the residence on a ridge facing south. Currently, the residence is approached from the rear using a driveway that leads to the barns. According to a tenant, there was a road to the front of the residence but it is overgrown and not used. In addition the view south from the front façade is obscured by the vegetation so that the prominently placed building is not visible from the public way.

This stone farmhouse represents two major construction periods: the first section constructed ca. 1800 consists of a 2-story vernacular stone side-gable farm house with a stone rear ell that was probably constructed at the same time. This 3-bay building retains original 6-over-6 wood sash windows. There are two (2) one-story frame shed-roof additions appended to this building, one is used as an enclosed entry, both new sections detract from the historic character of the building. Appended to the south end of the ca. 1800 building is a mid-19<sup>th</sup>-Century Greek Revival stone building that has a 3-bay front façade, suggesting an interior plan consisting of a hall and parlor type. The front elevation consists of a central doorway flanked by tripartite windows with original six-over-six sash and flanking narrow one-over-one side lights. There are 3 tripartite windows on the second elevation. The front porch is missing. The doorway retains the original 9-light transoms with 3-light and panel

sidelights along with delicately ornamented doorway jambs, consisting of dentils across the top of the jamb. The details and portion of the doorway as well as the dentilled roof cornice and bull's eye decoration on the window surrounds contribute to the refined character of this superb local example of the Greek Revival style. The coursed-fieldstone residence with a shallow-pitched roof is consistent with the local building tradition that incorporates local stone. This building tradition can be found in the many buildings in the vicinity, particularly along Route 17, where there are late-18<sup>th</sup>- and early-19<sup>th</sup>-Century examples of stone vernacular buildings. The settlement along Route 17 and Burkittsville, consisting of late-18<sup>th</sup>- and early-19<sup>th</sup>-Century stone (and brick) structures predate the later development of Knoxville where the building tradition of stone construction continued well into the 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

The Garrott-McDuell residence relates to two historical periods such as the settlement of this part of Frederick County as illustrated by the buildings along Route 17 and Burkittsville and later growth as seen in the development of Knoxville. With respect to the architectural style, the Garrott-McDuell residence is an important local example not only because of the refined mid-19<sup>th</sup>-Century ornamentation but because the residence combines Greek Revival details with the local stone building tradition to produce an uncommon example of the style.


Unfortunately the barns have not fared as well as the house and the 1875-1900 frame double wagon shed and corn crib has fallen. The materials are being salvaged but may not be used at this site. The terra cotta dairy barn is in fair condition. The cemetery is overgrown but is enclosed by the original stone wall with a 19<sup>th</sup>-Century wrought iron gate. The property has recently been purchased and the new owners intend to rehabilitate the residence and have a sheep farm.

The residence retains much architectural integrity and is a unique example of the Greek Revival style interpreted in the local stone building tradition; further, the level and refinement of detail of the doorway and windows of the front façade is unusual for this area composed chiefly of well-proportioned but unadorned residences. The construction periods of the residence early ca. 1800 and mid-19<sup>th</sup> Century reflect the early development of the area and later growth owing to the development of transportation routes, such as the C & O Canal and B & O railroad. With respect to the agricultural buildings, a significant agricultural building, the double wagon shed/granary, has been lost, but the other farm buildings along with the cemetery exist as well as the continuing agricultural use of the property. The rural setting of the farm and residence has not been altered significantly and so the rural character of the farmstead is also retained.

The farm is eligible under Criterion C, architecture.



The Garrott-McDuell Farmstead is centered on a circa 1800 stone dwelling with tripartite windows and a vernacular late Georgian doorway, with a deteriorated log smokehouse and an agricultural group consisting of a circa 1850 frame bank barn, a circa 1875-1900 frame double wagon shed/corn crib, and a terra cotta block dairy barn, feed shed, and milk house built about 1943. The stone dwelling is a good example of a vernacular house of the first quarter of the 19th century and the agricultural buildings are fair examples of a transitional farmstead of the period about 1850 through the early 1940's. In particular, the double wagon shed/granary is the only known example of the type in Frederick County.

The Garrott-McDuell Farmstead is an agricultural grouping centered on a two-story stone dwelling built about 1800 with a log smokehouse of about 1800, a frame bank barn of about 1850, a double pull-through wagon shed/corn crib of about 1875-1900, and a terra cotta block and frame dairy barn, milk house, and feed building, all dated about 1943, and a concrete silo of about the same date. Also included in the farmstead is a Garrott family cemetery enclosed by a stone wall dating from the early 19th century. The farmstead is located on the south side of East Mountain Road about 1/2 mile north of Maryland Rt. 340 near Knoxville, Frederick County, Maryland. The farmstead is located at the end of an access driveway from East Mountain Road.

The dwelling house faces south southeast on a terraced knoll. The rubblestone structure has three bays with a center entrance. At the corners of the south elevation are large stones forming quoins. The window and door openings have gauged brick arches. The cornice has a dentil molding. Interior chimneys rise at the east and west gable ends of the house. The roof is hipped and covered with standing seam metal. A rear two-story ell extends from the northwest corner. A one-story projection with a raised basement adjoins the main section near the junction of the ell on the west elevation. On the south elevation, the original porch was removed due to deterioration and has not been replaced. The entrance is recessed, with paneled soffits and a transom and sidelights. The projecting pilasters at the doorway jambs have dentil molding. The door has eight panels. The windows on the south elevation are tripartite with 6/6 center sections. The sills are wood. The frames and mullions of the windows have been replaced. In the raised basement windows on this facade may be seen the original design of the window frames, which had bull's eye corner blocks and flutes on the mullions. The west elevation and the north elevation both show evidence of original window openings filled in with stone or terra cotta block. A one-story frame shed addition with german siding, possibly an enclosed porch, extends along the east side of the rear ell. An interior chimney is located at the north end of the ell.

Smokehouse: The rectangular log smokehouse is in a deteriorated condition. Located west of the house, it has a single entrance on the east gable end. The roof is covered with corrugated metal. The building was probably built about 1800-1820.

Agricultural Outbuildings:

Dairy barn, milk house, feed building, silo: The four dairy-related structures in the farmstead were built about 1943. The barn, milk house, and feed building have terra cotta block walls and frame gables. The barn has a gambrel roof. The gables are covered with german siding. The roofs are both standing seam and corrugated metal. The concrete silo has smooth sides and a domed cap.

**SECT. 8: Significance:**

The Garrott-McDuell Farmstead is significant for the architecture of the circa 1800 stone dwelling, a good example of vernacular stonemasonry of the period, and for the design of the agricultural outbuildings which constitute a fair example of agricultural life from about 1850 to 1943. Most important among the agricultural group is the circa 1875-1900 double wagon shed/corn crib, the only known surviving example of this type in Frederick County. Among stone dwellings in the lower Middletown Valley, the Garrott-McDuell house may be compared to the G. W. West House (F-2-73), which has the same three-bay facade with tripartite windows and original trim. It also dates from about 1800. The principal difference is in the doorway design, which is relatively intact in the Garrott-McDuell House, and a good representative of the late Georgian influence still prevalent in the Federal period.

Although the exact date of the dwelling house is not yet known, the Garrott family has associations with the Knoxville area since the last quarter of the 18th century. The Garrott-McDuell Farmstead is on the northern boundary of the original Garrott property. Its principal homestead is located south of the farmstead with access from Mountain Lane. The siting of the family cemetery on one of the later farmsteads on the family property hints at the close nature of family farms in the early 19th century; these properties were intended to remain in family ownership for the indefinite future. The farm was sold to Robert McDuell in 1866, with access rights to the family cemetery retained through subsequent transfers to the present time.



7.1 Description (Continued)

Bank barn: The frame bank barn, built about 1850, has a stone base and a vertical sided upper structure. A non-contributing frame loafing shed is attached perpendicular to the southeast corner of the barn. The east elevation of the barn has horizontal siding, a replacement of the mid-20th century. Other vertical boards appear to be randomly replaced during the 20th century, based on the saw marks. The gable roof is standing seam metal. A non-contributing concrete block silo and shed extension to the barn are located on the west side of the barn on either side of the ramp.

Wagon shed/corn crib: The frame wagon shed with double pull-through openings was probably built in the last quarter of the 19th century. This is the only example yet discovered in Frederick County with two sheds. The east elevation has clapboard siding and a semi-circular opening which may have originally had a louvred fan infill. The side elevations have vertical slats and one of the sheds is closed on the west elevation with vertical boards. The gable roof is corrugated metal.

Cemetery: The Garrott family cemetery is located west of the bank barn and is surrounded by a field stone wall with an iron gate in the north side. Several stones are standing, but the date inscriptions are not visible from the wall. Access to the cemetery is difficult because of foliage growth. The cemetery was in use at least as late as the first decade of the 20th century, according to Williams and McKinsey's History of Frederick County, p. 1576.





Districts Nos. 10 and 6, and the northwest parts of 2, 4, 5 & 11, are mountainous, producing little but timber, except in the rich and fertile Harbaugh and Eyer Valleys, about Wolfsville and Wolfsville and in a few other spots. Nos. 16, 3, 12 and 14, form the hilly but productive and
