Based on the available information, it does not appear that the Mrs. Easterday House, located at 4411 Gene Hemp Road in the Jefferson vicinity, meets the National Register Criteria for individual listing. The frame I house, probably dating to the third quarter of the 19th century, a frame 19th century bank barn, an early 20th century concrete block dairy barn, and nine other outbuildings, most dating to the 20th century, comprise the farmstead. The house is an extremely common type, found in large numbers in Frederick County and throughout the state. It does not appear to possess any particular architectural distinction and has lost some sense of the original character through the application of asbestos siding and other mid- to late-twentieth century modifications. The bank barn also is not particularly noteworthy in the context of Frederick County which retains many fine examples of 19th century barns. The concrete block barn, probably reflects the 20th century transition of Frederick County agriculture from grains to diaring, is good, though small, example of what is a fairly common barn type in Frederick County. Thus, the buildings in the farm complex are not individually distinguished and, in the context of Frederick County, the overall complex is does not appear to be of sufficient quality to be eligible under Criterion C. The farm is not known to have been associated with any significant person or event, and thus is unlikely to be eligible under Criterion B or A. In addition, it is not located in any known historic district. (This determination is contrary to the consultant's recommendation. However, the consultant failed to back up their determination of "potentially eligible.")

The Mrs. Easterday House is a frame I-House with Classical influences. This residence is rectangular in plan and is two units wide and one unit deep in massing. According to the consulted source, this structural style dates to after circa 1850 to 1890 in construction. The side-gabled roof is clad in diamond-shaped asbestos shingles. Fan-shaped snow dams trim the roof line, and rain gutters line the eaves. One internal brick chimney is located on either gable end. The house is clad in asbestos shingle siding. The fenestration consists of two over two light, double hung sash windows with shutters. A window flanks either side of the centrally located door on the front elevation's first story. Three, symmetrically spaced windows are present on the second story of the front elevation. Two, symmetrically spaced windows are located on each story of the side elevations. Shutters are present on the front (north) and west sides of the house. The main entry is obscured by a wood frame screen door with a transom light. The foundation is of stone masonry construction.

A one-story, dropped hipped-roofed porch extends the entire width of the front facade. The porch consists of a full entablature supported by four wooden columns along its outer edge and two engaged columns flush with the front facade. The columns are of the Doric order. The porch floor is of wood construction. Its foundation, however, is not visible.

A one-story, dropped shed-roofed addition is present on the rear of the house. This addition extends the full width of the rear facade. It has a standing seam metal roof with rain gutters, and asbestos shingles clad the exterior walls. A modern, curved glass atrium is appended to the rear of this addition. Alterations to the original structure include the asbestos shingle roof, the rain gutters, the asbestos shingle cladding, and the replacement of some windows along with the addition of the storm windows.

The house is set in a rural landscape with eleven outbuildings, both contemporaneous and modern. one barn may predate the house. This structure is a two-story, gable-roofed bank barn with a standing seam metal roof, vertical wood plank walls, and an uncoursed rubble stone foundation. A second barn, estimated to have been constructed in the early to mid-20th century, is a two-story, gambrel-roofed building with a standing seam metal roof having exposed rafter tails and a centered metal roof ventilator. The first story of the structure is constructed of rock-faced concrete block whose corners are quoined with panel-faced concrete block. The second story is clad in drop weatherboard. Twelve light, hopper windows, hinged at the sill, comprise the fenestration. Panel-faced, concrete block lintels rest atop the windows. A one-story, gable-roofed structure, similarly clad, is joined to the side of the barn by means of a covered walkway. A one-story, one by one unit, shed-roofed, concrete block structure with a standing seam metal roof has been appended to the rear of the barn. An ice house was formerly present on the property. A modern, concrete block garage has been constructed on its site. Other contemporaneous outbuildings include structures that housed specialized farming activities, a possible smoke house, and chicken coops.

The survey undertaken, inclusive of this structure, did not include a search of related literature and records as such efforts were deemed outside the scope of the associated project. Therefore, the submitted statement of significance is derived solely from a visual/architectural assessment of the structure in question, its outbuildings, and its surrounding setting/landscape.

A preliminary assessment of the Mrs. Easterday house indicates that it is potentially eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places under criterion A. This structure provides evidence of regional agricultural settlement. Its pre-Civil War bank barn may be presumed to have been a part of a prior-established farmstead. As well, the Easterday house demonstrates regional agricultural development. The large number of extant outbuildings provides a representational sample of structures constructed as specific components of the farming process. These multiple, specialized structures are an example of agricultural advancements beyond the use of fewer multifunctional buildings. Note also that this residence appears on the 1873 Atlas of Frederick County, Maryland.




RESOURCE SKETCH MAP




