The Rocky Creek Farm consists of an ell shaped two story brick residence, one story common bond brick outbuilding with header vent decoration and nineteenth century frame bank barn with three decorative tin vents. The entire farm is a very fine example of a mid-nineteenth century farm complete with complimentary outbuildings.

The brick house, which is whitewashed, is laid in common bond. The main entrance, a four panel door with recessed paneling, bracketed hood and six light transom is located in the third bay. Occupying the remaining bays are double hung 6/6 windows with decorative wood entablatures with flower corner blocks. The structure is covered by a flank gable standing seam tin roof with decorative snow stops which is connected to the building by a three step brick cornice.

The history of Rocky Creek Farm is closely related to the Grafton Fout House. The land upon which the house was built was willed to Lewis Fout by his stepfather in April, 1849. Upon Fout's death, the land was sold to his heirs in March, 1868. The farm, commonly known as Rocky Creek was owned collectively by the heirs until 1907, when it was sold at public sale.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rocky Creek Farm is an ell shaped whitewashed two story brick residence laid in common bond which faces east from the west side of New Design Road.

The principle facade is five bays wide; the main entrance, a four panel door with recessed paneling, bracketed hood and six light transom is located in the third bay. A columned one bay wide frame entrance porch covers the front entrance. Occupying the remaining bays are double hung 6/6 windows with decorative wood entablatures with flower corner blocks.

Extending to the rear of the building is a four bay wide two story original brick addition. A two story open porch, typical of the area, extends along the entire south side of the buildings. The entire building is built on a low random stone foundation. The structure is covered by a flank gable standing seam tin roof with decorative snow stops which is connected to the building by a three step brick cornice.

A whitewashed corbeled brick chimney is located on either end of the gable on the north and south sides. Another chimney is located in the center of the addition.

Located immediately to the rear of the building is a one story common bond brick outbuilding. This structure is divided into two parts; the eastern-most section of the building is two bays wide; a replaced door with wood lintel is located in the first bay; a double hung 6/6 window with wooden lintel is located in the second bay.

A replaced door with wooden lintel is located in the east section of the building. The entire structure is covered by a flank gable standing seam tin roof. The east gable end has an unusual header vent decoration.

Also located on the premises is a nineteenth century frame bank barn with three decorative tin vents. The entire farm is a very fine example of a mid-nineteenth century farm complete with complimentary outbuildings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The history of Rocky Creek is closely related to the Grafton Fout House. Both were built at approximately the same time and are very similar in architectural style.

The land upon which the house was built was willed to Lewis Fout by his step father in April, 1849.¹ Upon Fout's death, the land was sold to his heirs in March, 1868. The farm commonly known as Rocky Creek was owned collectively by the heirs until 1907, when it was sold at public sale.²

Rocky Creek is still a working farm with many of its nineteenth century outbuildings intact.


