The Old Main Building, the first planned building for the Maryland School for the Deaf, was an imposing five-part brick structure constructed between 1870-1873. This commodious structure housed both the male and female dormitories, offices for the school officials, living accommodations for the superintendent, classrooms, the kitchens, dining room, chapel and an infirmary. In 1967, the Old Main Building was razed to be replaced by the Ely Building.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Old Main Building, which faced west onto South Market Street and located on the site of what is now the Ely Building, was a handsome, commodious three-story, brick building, with its stone basement elevated almost a full story above street level. The structure was composed of a mansard-roofed central block with a projecting gable-roofed pavillion and terminal towers, all crowned with open-octagonal cupolas. Flanking the core section and connected to it by two-story brick hyphens were three-story, mansard-roofed wings. They too had projecting gable-roofed central pavillions. The wings were of equal height to the main block. The roof areas of both the main section and the wings were, punctuated by evenly-spaced, gable-roofed dormers and outlined by a continuous modillioned cornice. Continuous stone belt courses separated the basement level from the first story and the first story from the second.

A one story multi-sectioned portico, surmounted by a balustraded deck on its flat roof, projected from the central pavillion of the main block. Balconies were located at the second story level of the wings, the end towers of the main section, and in the gable area of the projecting bay of the central pavillion. Windows were highlighted by arched, hood-molded lintels.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old Main Building, the first planned building for the Maryland School for the Deaf, was begun in August of 1870 following the appropriation of \$100,000 by the Maryland Legislature. After four years of financial insecurities, the school received \$125,000 from the legislature to complete the building and landscape the grounds. The building was occupied September 8, 1975.¹

"For over 100 years the Old Main Building provided living accommodations as well as classroom facilities for deaf students in Maryland.... The wing (on the north) housed the boys while the wing (on the south) provided facilities for the girls. The center section provided offices for the school officials, living accommodations for the superintendent, and some staff members as well as the kitchens, dining room and chapel. Classrooms occupied some of the rooms in the basement and first floor and an infirmary was housed on the first floor, girls' wing."²

The school expanded in the 20th century, particularly in the 1950s and 1960s. This prompted the building of additional facilities on the campus. The completion of the primary building (1960), the two dormitories (1964), and the new administration building (1967) to accommodate the growing need of the school ironically became the demise of the Old Main Building. "When the administrative offices moved, the Old Main Building ceased to serve any campus function. Since the building was in need of extensive repair, it was demolished during the summer of 1967."³






