The Mountaindale Center Survey District encompasses about 2.5 acres and three buildings with a fourth outbuilding centered on the intersection of Mountaindale Road and Powell Road, which is the loosely defined center of the village of Mountaindale. The buildings include a 1913 frame church, a two-section frame store and residence building built about 1870 and enlarged in the early 1890's, a circa 1935 frame and brick bungalow, and its frame garage, which was used as part of the village school until about 1930. The district represents by the vernacular architecture of the store building and the standardized bungalow design the transition of the village from a 19th century crossroads settlement to the early 20th century with more outside contact. The church is typical of many early 20th century rural and village churches of the first quarter of the 20th century. The crossroads settlement pattern is loosely visible here, with the major elements of church, school, store, and residence all present, in spite of modern non-contributing surrounding development filling in the formerly scattered development of Mountaindale in the late 19th century.

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 4

The Mountindale Center Survey District is a small village center grouping consisting of a frame store/residence combination built originally about 1870 and expanded in the 1890's, the Mountindale Union Chapel, built in 1913, a frame and brick circa 1935 bungalow, and its frame garage, which was originally used as a school in the early 20th century prior to about 1930. The district is located at the intersection of Mountindale Road and Powell Road, the functional center of the village of Mountindale, Frederick County, Maryland. The surrounding village buildings not included in the survey district are mostly post-1945 in date and are scattered at irregular intervals along both sides of the two roads to the east, west, and north of the intersection, with a modern development located off Mountindale Road in a cul-de-sac to the south. (An additional survey district of residences along Mountindale Road to the west of the Mountindale Center Survey District, between Bethel Road and Putman Road, is under study at this writing. This district would be called Mountindale Road Survey District.) The character of the village is linear, with frequent open fields, wooded sections, or large side yards which break up the continuity of the small groups of continuous dwellings on both sides of Mountindale Road. The contributing buildings are located mainly on the south side of Mountindale Road and the store/residence is located at the northwest corner of Mountindale and Powell Roads. A large open field separates the store/residence from the properties on the north and west. A concrete block commercial garage is located west of the store on the same property, but is not included within the survey district boundary. The buildings are occupied and in use as built, with a modern convenience store occupying the first story of the store/residence building and apartments on the upper story. The condition of the buildings is good.

Following are brief descriptions of the buildings in the survey district and the names and addresses of the owners:

Charles Rice Store and Residence (Mountindale Convenience Store), 6726 Mountindale Rd.: The building is in two sections forming a rough L-plan with a corner tower containing the entrance. The two-story section facing Mountindale Road is probably the earliest section and may contain log structure. It was probably built by David Warner about 1870, according to land records and architectural details. The exterior is covered with german siding and there were probably originally three bays or four bays on the first story and three on the second. The first story has been altered over the years as the size of the store established by Charles Rice in the building in the 1890's changed. The second story windows are 2/2. A one-story porch extends across the south elevation, around the corner tower and entrance, and across the east elevation of the second section of the building. The porch columns are turned and the roof is standing seam metal. Interior end chimneys rise above the pressed metal roof. The second section of the building extends northward from the polygonal corner turret with a conical roof and has four bays. This section was possibly added after an early 1890's fire destroyed part of the original building. According to Mrs. Alice Fisher, a local resident, the living quarters in the first

The Mountaindale Center Survey District is a fair example of a small crossroads community of the last quarter of the 19th century and the first quarter of the 20th century. The main elements which define a town, a commercial enterprise, residences, a church, and a school, are all present in some form in the district, although only four buildings are included. The Charles Rice Store was built about 1870 as a residence, probably by David Warner. In the early 1890's, the building was purchased by Charles Rice from his mother and, after a fire which partially destroyed the structure, a store room was built on the rear of the original residence. The architecture of the building reflects the period, with a corner turret giving a varied roofline and pressed metal details on both the exterior and the interior. In 1930, Rice purchased the school buildings after the school was consolidated with Lewistown and erected the bungalow on the site. The style of the bungalow also shows the current architectural interests of the period, with Arts and Crafts details such as the bracketed eaves and the general design and scale of the house. The Union Chapel of 1913 brought together the German Reformed and German Baptist congregations of the area. Its design is typical of many small rural and village churches of the period. The village has remained a small, loosely organized group of residences, in spite of modern infill of the open areas between the older houses and a modern housing development off Mountaindale Road. The survey district represents the section of the village with the most defined center of commercial, social, and religious activity during the historic period.

Mountaindale Center Survey District is one of several small villages in the Lewistown and Frederick Election Districts of the Frederick Planning Region which have similarities in scale, architecture, and historic use. Bethel, Charlesville, and Hansonville in the Frederick Election District share with Mountaindale a crossroads location, with a church, store, or school sited on a prominent corner. Nearby are farmsteads and a few small individual residences along the roads leading into the crossroads. In several such communities in the Middletown Valley and elsewhere, the crossroads communities were an interim phenomenon between the isolation of farming and the business centers of the larger towns and Frederick City. The store or shop provided a vital service and often a mail stop, although Mountaindale apparently never had a post office, and the church or school was a community center and meeting place. Most of these communities were off the main market and turnpike routes and remained small entities, with vernacular buildings showing their long-standing traditional techniques and values. With the better

section facing Mountaindale were spared by the fire and the other section was rebuilt afterwards. The inner angle of the two sections facing northwest is now occupied by various additions to the structure and contain apartments. Some of these additions are concrete block. Additional concrete block storage sections have been added to the north end of the second section. The interior of the store has been greatly altered with expansions into the first section, but the late 1890's store room is clearly defined in the second section by the pressed metal ceiling with a dropped border and cornice. One or two sections of wood shelving still are in place along the east wall and the wood floor appears to be of the 1890's.

Charles Rice House, 6805 Mountaindale Road: The 1-1/2 story frame bungalow was built by Charles Rice about 1935, the date estimated by land records and architectural style. It has brick veneer and a standing seam gable roof with a one-story porch on the north elevation under a large dormer with a group of three 3/1 windows. The dormer has weatherboard siding. The eaves of the roof have brackets and the main elevation has three bays with paired 3/1 windows. Two interior end chimneys rise at each gable end. The frame garage of the house was identified by Mrs. Alice Fisher as one of two buildings of the Mountaindale school which was located on the site from about 1881. The school closed in 1930 and Charles Rice purchased the property, demolishing one of the school buildings to build the bungalow.

Mountaindale Union Chapel, south side of Mountaindale Road: The frame church is a one-story structure with german siding and a projecting bell tower with the main entrance on the north elevation. A marble date stone at the northwest corner gives the date of construction as 1913, confirmed by land records. The double main entrance doors are five panels each under a Gothic arch transom. The windows flanking the bell tower are also Gothic arched, with colored Queen Anne sash. Above the doorway is a pent roof and a small diamond-shaped window. The belfry is open, with a scroll-sawn balustrade and a pyramidal hipped roof of pressed metal. The main roof is also pressed metal with bracketed eaves. The east and west elevations have flat-arched Queen Anne style windows. At the south elevation of the church is a one-story addition with a concrete block foundation and pressboard siding. The scored concrete foundation of the main church probably covers a stone base.

transportation and machined materials of the 20th century, however, architectural styles such as the bungalow were more easily produced in small towns. Mountaindale Center shows this transition from 19th century crossroads to the early 20th century community in the Rice Store and Rice Bungalow.

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






