The village of Hansonville contains two survey districts, one near the junction of U.S. 15 and the other at the junction of Old Frederick Road on Hansonville Road. The Old Frederick Road district is a small cluster of 1-1/2 story log residences mostly built in the period 1840-1950 with modern artificial siding and one-story porches with the characteristic half-story windows of small log houses present in each. These windows are still single pane or 2/2 sliding sash. A small concrete block outbuilding near the intersection may have been a blacksmith shop or stable and another outbuilding on the south side of the road was originally a combination garage and hog barn. The southernmost log house in the district, 9537 Hansonville Road, was used as a tollhouse during the last half of the 19th century on the Emmitsburg-Frederick turnpike which followed the route of the present Hansonville and Old Frederick Roads. The survey district illustrates the loosely organized pattern of small villages in the mid-19th century, based on small rural industries (a tannery was located in the second survey district, F-3-88) or services such as the possible blacksmith shop in the Old Frederick Road district.

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 7

The Hansonville-Old Frederick Road Survey District is centered on the intersection of Hansonville and Old Frederick Roads in the village of Hansonville, a loosely defined group of mid and late 19th century residences and farmsteads located just west of U.S. 15 about five miles north of Frederick City, Frederick County, Maryland. The village has historically been an elongated grouping with agricultural fields and wooded areas separating the buildings. The group at the Hansonville and Old Frederick Road intersection is one of two principal housing groups, the other being located along the original route of Old Frederick Road, the former Frederick-Emmitsburg turnpike, now a cul-de-sac immediately west of U.S. 15 (see F-3-88). The subject survey district contains four residences with three contributing and two non-contributing outbuildings. The houses are log structures of 1-1/2 stories with modern exterior siding and non-contributing additions. Windows are principally 2/2 with some modern replacements, and the half-stories of the houses have single pane horizontally sliding sash. All but one house have standing seam metal roof coverings. The contributing outbuildings are a circa 1900 frame garage, a frame garage with attached hog barn dating from about 1890-1900, and a concrete block blacksmith shop dating from about 1890 now used as a storage structure. The general condition of the buildings is good, but the garage/hog barn is somewhat deteriorated and the residences have all been altered in exterior coverings and replacement doors and some replacement windows.

Following are brief descriptions of each contributing property in the survey district and the identification of the owner(s):

9537 Hansonville Road: The 1-1/2 story log residence is located on the southwest side of Hansonville Road and is the southernmost structure in the district. It has asphalt shingle siding and an enclosed one-story porch on the northeast side covered with modern vertical siding, similar to the "T-111" type. The house probably had three bays on the first story originally, which are now concealed in the enclosed porch. The half-story level has modern sash and a window air conditioner in the two openings. The north elevation has a single bay with 2/2 sash. The southwest elevation has an exposed foundation as the topography slopes down to the southwest away from the level of Hansonville Road. The stone foundation has been plastered and painted white. The roof is covered with standing seam metal and interior chimneys are located at the gable ends. The house was probably built about 1840-1850, dated on the basis of its architectural form and materials. A small frame garage with tongue-and-groove siding and a composition shed roof is located just northwest of the house. It appears to date from about 1900. About 50 yards north of the house and garage on the same side of the road is the rectangular frame garage/hog barn, with vertical siding covered with various types of composition materials and a standing seam metal shed roof. The hog barn section is located at the south end. The building was probably built about 1875-1900. According to local resident Mrs. Glenna Crutchley, the house was a toll station on the Emmitsburg-Frederick turnpike during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Owner: Paul O. and Barbara J. The Hansonville-Old Frederick Road Survey District illustrates the loose community development typical of villages in the mid and late 19th century in Frederick County. Although part of a larger area known as Hansonville, the two remaining concentrations of houses are located at or near the major road intersections, as in the subject district, or at the site of a local industrial or commercial operation, as in the other survey district of Hansonville (F-3-88), where a tannery operated in the from the 1840's to the last quarter of the 19th century. As in other small villages and also in those which developed into towns, the principal public and commercial features were irregularly located along a stretch of a main road. The former tollhouse is the principal structure of the Old Frederick Road survey district, although the importance of the former blacksmith shop or stable near 9603 Hansonville Road remains to be researched. The single industry did not support a continuous pattern of growth and the Hagerstown & Frederick trolley line bypassed the village to the north, which further froze its development. Hansonville remained a stopping point on the turnpike between Frederick and Emmitsburg, and the narrow road pattern with houses in both survey districts almost directly on the right of way eventually causing it to be bypassed by the main highway route, the present U.S. 15.

7.1 Description (Continued)

9603 Hansonville Road: The 1-1/2 log residence is located on the northeast corner of the Hansonville-Old Frederick Road intersection and has an exposed cellar on the southwest elevation. The main levels are covered with asphalt shingle siding and a one-story porch extends across the first story. The porch is partially enclosed on the southeast end and the cellar below this section contains a small laundry room. The main level has three bays, including the enclosed bay on the porch. The half-story has two bays. The sash is 2/2 on both levels. The roof is standing seam metal on both the porch and the main house. A single interior chimney is located at the north gable end. The north elevation has a one-story shed addition. Just north of the house is a concrete block one-story building identified by Mrs. May, the owner of the house, as a former blacksmith shop or stable, now used as storage. The building has a lift-type garage door and a single window on the southwest side with an exterior chimney on the north gable end. The roof is standing seam metal. The concrete block walls may enclose or replace the original structure, which was probably log or frame. The house was possibly built about 1840, based on its general form and materials, and the blacksmith shop may date from the same period in its original form. The house appears on the 1858 and 1873 maps as owned by "E. Palmer", probably Enos or Eneas Palmer. In an 1883 deed, the house was transferred with a stable, which probably refers to the building identified by Mrs. May as the blacksmith shop. It was built sometime between 1864 and 1883. Owner: Arthur M. and Anna M. May, 9603 Hansonville Rd., Frederick, MD 21701.

9607 Hansonville Road: This 1-1/2 story log house is located north of the blacksmith shop/stable and has an exposed cellar level on the south elevation. A two-story modern addition adjoins the original structure on the east. The log section has an enclosed one-story porch and a modern entrance on the cellar level below. The half-story has the characteristic small 2/2 windows found in the other log structures in the district. The exterior of the house is covered with asphalt shingle siding and the roof is composition. An interior end chimney is located at the east gable end. A non-contributing concrete block garage is located south of the house. The house dates from about 1840-1850, based on the similarities with the other log buildings in the district. Owner: David H. and Deborah A. Schoenly, 9607 Hansonville Rd., Frederick, MD 21701.

9613 Hansonville Road: The 1-1/2 story log house is located on the northwest corner of the intersection of Hansonville and Old Frederick Roads. The exterior is currently covered with vinyl siding and the south elevation has an enclosed concrete block cellar level below the one-story porch. The porch has a replaced railing in a sunburst design fronting the two bays of the house. The windows are 2/2 and the door is a modern replacement. The chimney is located in the center of the standing seam roof. A modern addition is attached to the northwest corner of the original structure. Based on its general form and materials, the house was probably built about 1840-1850, although it does not appear on the 1858 map. The 1873 map shows the house occupied or owned by a Mrs. Gaver, but this could not be confirmed in the current survey research. 


