The Rocky Springs School House is a one-story stone school built about 1839 with a stone foyer added about 1850 and a concrete block addition of about 1930. The stone is painted white and the cupola with bell, which were in place until late 1991, have been removed. The unusual foyer is a "half gable" extension of the ridge with a shed roof. The 1835 date stone in the foyer may be incorrect as land records indicate that the land was acquired by the school district trustees in 1839. The interior of the school retains its late 19th century tongue-and-groove wainscot and ceiling and blackboards between the windows. The school was closed about 1930 and acquired by the Rocky Springs Chapel for use as a community center. It is a good, well-preserved example of the early 19th century stone school house, and one of the few to retain interior features of its original use.

The Rocky Springs School House is a one-story, white-painted fieldstone school with a one-room plan built about 1835-1839 with a stone foyer added at a later date in the 19th century and a concrete block kitchen addition on the rear elevation erected after 1930 when the building was converted to use as a church hall and community center. The school house is located on the northeast side of Rocky Springs Road about 50 yards northwest of the intersection of Kemp Lane, near Frederick (City), Frederick County, Maryland. The building is located about 25 feet from the edge of the road and its principal elevation with the projecting foyer faces southwest toward the street. An inscribed stone in the foyer gable reads "Built 1835"; however, land records indicate that the date may have been 1839.

The building is generally rectangular in form with a gable roof covered with composition material over wood shingles. The stone walls are topped by a corbeled brick cornice. The southwest gable end originally had two bays and the east and west elevations each have two bays. The windows are 6/6 with plain lintels and sills. An open cupola with a bell was located over the southwestern gable. It was removed in 1991 because of deterioration and the bell is stored by Mrs. Grace Koehl, a local resident and advocate of the preservation of the Rocky Springs School. At a date yet undetermined, but probably prior to 1850, an entrance foyer and cloakroom with a shed roof was added to the southwest elevation, with the original ridgeline extended and the foyer built at the same height with a shed roof on the east side. The doorway was placed near the corner of the foyer facing east. The present door is a vertical tongue-and-groove type, undoubtedly a late 19th or early 20th century replacement of the original vertical board door. The western bay of the original section with its 6/6 window remained as built. On the east and south sides of the foyer are 2/2 windows. A possible theory on the date discrepancy is that the 1835 date was thought to be correct at the time the foyer was added and was unverified by deed research. The 2/2 sash indicates the foyer is a later addition as this type of fenestration was more common than the early 19th century 6/6 sash in the period of about 1850-1900. When the school was closed and sold to the Rocky Springs Chapel in about 1930, a rusticated concrete block addition was added to the northeast or rear elevation. The gable of the school above this addition is covered with German siding which may have been added at the same time. An interior end chimney is located on the north gable end. The addition has an entrance on the southeast side with double doors with arched molding panels. On the north side of the addition are two windows of horizontally sliding 6/6 sash.

The interior was not accessible, but can be observed from the windows. The walls have a tongue-and-groove wainscot below plaster walls with blackboards placed between the window openings. A single center pier rising through the tongue-and-groove ceiling supports the roof ridge, placed in recent years following a fire in the original chimney stack which was located at this point. The current heating unit is near the north end of the room. The floor is random pine boards.



The Rocky Springs School House is a well-preserved example of an early 19th century rural school in Frederick County. Land records indicate that in April 1839, John Staley sold 150 square perches of the "Foxe's Spy" tract to the school trustees of District No. 26 for \$5 "for a school house to be built . . . to be called 'Rocky Springs School House'". The date 1835 in the foyer gable of the school house may be an error of the mid-19th century based on personal recollection unconfirmed by documentation. At either date, very few of the surviving schools of any historic period which have been converted to other uses retain as much integrity in form, materials, and plan. Only one other converted school building yet surveyed in the County is known to have blackboards, the Hope Hill Colored School (F-7-37) in the Urbana vicinity. The interiors of most of the schools identified in this survey have not been documented and many have yet to be identified. Other schools of any period with high interior and exterior integrity are rare. Two other known stone schools of the 1830's period are the Bethel School (F-3-94), built prior to 1838, and the Mountain View School (F-8-113), built about 1840. Both of these schools have exterior additions of later date and, like the Rocky Springs School, were used for church services for varying periods of time. Further documentation of their interiors will clarify the significance of the Rocky Springs School.

Prior to the erection of the Rocky Springs Chapel (F-3-96) immediately northwest of the school house in 1882, the United Brethren congregation which originated at the nearby house of Peter Kemp held services at the school from about 1860.



Rocky Springs School House

County, 1858.


