The Highland School is a one-story brick schoolhouse built about 1852 which was converted to residential use about 1942. It has a gable facade with double entrances and a semi-circular window above a porch added after its residential remodeling. The standing seam metal roof has a patch near the west end which was the location of a cupola. Among the seven outbuildings east of the structure is a frame privy with german siding, which probably dates from about 1900. The other outbuildings are related to its domestic use. The school was built as Highland District School No. 99 and appears on both the 1858 and 1873 maps of Frederick County. Its simple architecture is a result of traditional school design in the 1850's period and of the often concurrent membership of school and church building committees, which produced religious and educational structures with similar designs. The school closed in 1931 when consolidation with the Myersville and Wolfsville schools took place.

The Highland School is a one-story brick schoolhouse built about 1852 and converted to residential use about 1942 which is located on the east side of Highland School Road at the intersection of Crow Rock Road near Myersville, Frederick County, Maryland. The building has a gable facade with a one-story porch facing west toward the road. Seven outbuildings are located east of the building, one of which appears to be a former privy with a shed roof and german siding. This building may date from about 1900. The rest of the outbuildings have composition siding and were probably added to the property since 1942.

The schoolhouse is painted white and the west elevation has two bays with four-panel doors with transoms of four lights in each bay. The one-story porch extends across the entire gable end and was undoubtedly an addition made after its conversion to a residence. The porch platform is concrete and the supporting wood posts are plain. Above the standing seam metal porch roof is a semi-circular fan window. On the other elevations, the stone foundation of the building is visible. The north and south elevations have three bays each, with 3/1 windows, which are replacements of the original sash. The roof of the structure is standing seam metal, and a patched area near the west gable end suggests that a cupola once was located at that point. An interior end brick chimney rises above the east gable end. The east elevation has no openings, but a cellar entrance is located near the southeast corner. The interior of the building was not accessible for this survey. The possible frame privy is located about 50 feet east of the building, behind several of the non-contributing outbuildings. It has a corrugated metal shed roof and german siding, with a single vertical board door in the west elevation.

The Highland School is a good example of an 1850's period rural schoolhouse. It was built about 1852 as Highland District School No. 99 and appears on both the 1858 Isaac Bond and 1873 C. O. Titus Atlas maps of Frederick County. The architectural details are simple, the fan window of the west elevation being the only decorative feature. This semi-circular shape was often part of rural church designs in the Middletown Valley. Since often the members of church building committees also served on similar school building committees, the same aesthetic principles, and undoubtedly the same contractors, were clearly used for the two types of buildings. The Highland School is one of a dwindling number of rural schools in the northern section of the Middletown Valley. The only other identified rural school still standing in the Jackson Election District is a 1912 frame building at Church Hill, which has a distinctly contrasting form including a tower and a hipped roof. The Highland School is similar in form to other 1850's schools such as the Petersville School (F-2-69), a much-altered structure, and the Grove Academy (F-8-90), which has a mostly intact exterior. The Highland School closed in 1931, during a period of school consolidation into the newer schools at Myersville and Wolfsville.






Scale 2 Inches to the Mile






ETOWN 280 32'30" 282 283 INTERIOR GEOLOGICAL SURVEY, RESTON, VIRGINIA 22,400m.F.
