The Day-Burdette House is moderately significant in architecture as an example of the Queen Anne style of the early 20th century. The exterior retains much of its original character, although the roof has been replaced with modern composition material and a two-story addition was built in the 1940's or 1950's. The exterior cladding is german siding and a two-story polygonal bay is at the southwest corner. Shingled gables are at the ends of the house and over the polygonal bay. An additional gable rises from the roof of the rear wing extending from the southwest corner. The windows are 1/1 with replacement shutters. A dentil cornice edges the eaves and the porches on the southeast and south elevations have turned columns and balustrades with scroll-sawn brackets. The interior has been altered, but the basic two-room plan with a center hall remains intact, as do the molded architraves and bull's eye corner blocks of the trim. The stair has a turned newel and balustrade. Small molded mantelpieces built for heating stoves are in the main rooms. The compact design and unified decoration of the house strongly suggest that it was built from a design in a builder's catalog or other published architectural plan. The house was probably built about 1905-1910 by Harry T. Day. In 1912, Perry G. and Lucinda Burdette purchased the house and it remained in the possession of their descendants until 1980.

The Day-Burdette House is a two-story frame Queen Anne style dwelling built about 1905-1910 on the north side of Penn Shop Road about 1 mile southwest of the intersection of Ridge Road (Md. 27) near Mt. Airy, Frederick County, Maryland. The house has the typical exterior characteristics of the style, with a polygonal two-story bay, shingled gables, porches with turned columns and scroll-sawn brackets, and german siding. The principal elevation faces southeast and the house is one of a line of dwellings along the north side of Penn Shop Road, most of which were built from the 1950's to the 1990's. The north elevation of the house faces open agricultural fields. The date of the house is based on architectural details and land records.

The southeast elevation of the house has three bays, with a polygonal two-story bay at the southwest corner and the two other bays are sheltered under a one-story porch. The exterior is covered with german siding, except for the gables in each elevation, which are covered with patterned shingles. Arched windows with 2/2 sash are centered in each gable. The entrance is in the center bay and has a glass panel door with a narrow transom and sidelights. The windows are 1/1 with modern replacement shutters. The porch has turned columns and balusters with scroll-sawn brackets. The roof is covered with composition material, a replacement of the 1980's. Two off-center chimneys rise from the roof. A dentil cornice ornaments the house and the porch roof. On the northwest corner of the house is a short rear wing with a one-story side porch facing south. This porch also has turned columns and brackets. Both the front and side porches have concrete decks, replacing the original wood decks. The rear wing has an additional shingled gable above the second story facing south. The foundation of the house is stone. At the northeast corner is a two-story addition on a concrete foundation. An enclosed shed porch on the north elevation and this porch appear to have been added in the 1940's or 1950's. An exterior concrete block chimney stack rises on the north elevation.

The interior spaces of the house are small in proportion to the height of the building, with a narrow center hall flanked by two rooms in the first story and a single room in the original wing as the kitchen. Much of the wood trim remains at the door and window surrounds, with bull's eye corner blocks and molded architraves. The staircase has a turned newel and balustrade. Simple wood mantelpieces in the two main first story rooms indicate that the house was designed for stove heat. The rear wing and the addition have been much remodeled in recent years, although a winding enclosed stair at the northwest corner of the wing remains in place.

The Day-Burdette House is moderately significant in architecture for the exterior design of the house, a little-altered vernacular Queen Anne style dwelling built about 1905-1910, possibly according to a published design from a builder's catalog. The construction history has not been determined, but land records show that Harry T. Day purchased the approximately 2-acre lot in 1903 for \$225 and sold it to Perry G. and Lucinda Burdette in 1912 for \$1500. The house was probably built during the 9 years between the two transactions. Its compact design and unified decoration strongly suggest that it is an example of a published design, perhaps from a builder's catalog or newspaper offering. Both of these sources of architectural plans were frequently used in the early 20th century. The house remained in the Burdette family until 1980.


