The Owings-Jones House is minimally significant in architecture for its stone construction, although it is in deteriorated condition. The house was built about 1820, possibly by Christopher Owings, and was sold to William Jones, Sr., (1782-1869) in 1852. The principal elevation has three bays with a center entrance, which had an entry porch as late as 1978, but which has been removed. Rehabilitation begun in the 1980's was never completed and left a large hole in the north gable end where the base of a chimney was removed along with the interior fireplace and hearth. This left the house open to weathering and its integrity has been severely damaged. A two-story frame rear wing adjoins the northeast corner. A frame and stone bank barn dating from the last quarter of the 19th century is located northwest of the house and has an enclosed stall level on the south, weathered vertical siding with painted "vents".

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 2

The Owings-Jones House is a two-story stone dwelling with a frame rear wing built about 1820 on the north side of Old Annapolis Road about 0.8 mile west of Green Valley Road (Md. 75) and 0.3 mile east of Linganore Creek near New Market, Frederick County, Maryland. The house is in very deteriorated condition and is currently unoccupied. The only other remaining contributing outbuilding of the original farmstead is a late 19th century frame and stone bank barn. An occupied non-contributing mobile home is also on the property. The dates of the structures are based on architectural details, historical maps, land records, and a biographical sketch of James G. Jones in Williams and McKinsey History of Frederick County (1910).

The dwelling has a three-bay southwest elevation with an off-center entrance on the first story. The foundation is exposed on the southwest and is whitewashed up to the sill level of the first story windows. An entry porch shown in a 1978 photograph taken at the initial survey of the Jones House has been removed. The window sash is mostly missing, except on the second story, where two windows in 2/2 sash with some missing panes and deteriorated louvred shutters are still in place. The door on the first story is a six-panel type in the "cross and bible" design. The roof is corrugated metal and the cornice is boxed. The north gable end has an interior chimney stack, but a mid-1980's rehabilitation which was initiated but not completed left a gaping hole in the north wall where the first floor fireplace and hearth have been completely removed. The cellar is also exposed by this hole. No other openings except a small attic level window are in the north elevation. The south elevation is almost completely covered by foliage, but no openings except an attic window are visible. The two-story rear wing extends from the northeast corner. It has German siding and an entry porch visible in the 1978 photo on the north side has been removed. The south elevation of the wing is also heavily covered by tree growth. An open porch which was attached to the south side has been removed. The interior as viewed through the window openings and other holes in the house reveals that much of its interior finishes and features have been severely damaged or are missing.

Barn: The frame bank barn has vertical and tongue-and-groove siding and a corrugated metal roof. The north elevation of the barn has sliding doors and the south elevation has a partially enclosed stall level. The vertical board exterior siding has traces of painted "vents". The barn appears to date from the last quarter of the 19th century.

The Owings-Jones House is minimally significant in architecture for its stone construction; however, its poor condition caused by unfinished rehabilitation and neglect has lowered its integrity considerably since 1978. The house was probably built about 1820, possibly by Christopher Owings whose wife Charlotte received a bequest of a share in a large tract of "Whiskey Ridge" from her grandfather John Worthington. The Owings and their son Washington Owings (1812-1869) held the property until 1852, when it was sold as 125 acres to William Jones, Sr. (1782-1869). In 1865, James G. Jones (1835-1925) and his sister Esther received the farm from their father William. It remained in the Jones family until 1959. The Owings-Jones House is similar to another nearby Jones family property, the Lson-Jones House (F-5-89), ca. 1800. Both are two stories with three bays and rear wings and have had late 19th century alterations in window styles and roof coverings.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Jas Jones House is a small ell shaped banked two story coursed random stone structure which faces west from the north side of Old Annapolis Road.

The principle facade is three bays wide; the main entrance, a replaced door, is recessed from the front of the building and is located in the second bay. A one bay wide frame porch extends to the west side of the house in the second bay.

Occupying the remaining bays on the first and second level are 2/2 windows with single stone lintels and some with louvered shutters. Large stone quoins are located in each corner of the building.

To the rear of the stone section of the building on the northeast side is a two story frame addition with two story open porch. The entire structure is banked against a hill and built on a high whitewashed stone foundation. A small entrance to the cellar is located in the southwest corner of the building.

The residence is covered by a flank gabled standing seam tin roof with plain boxed cornice with a return.

A frame nineteenth century barn still in use is located on the premises.


