The Joseph Plummer House is one of only a few large brick residences which date to the eighteenth century in the area surrounding New Market.

The house is a very fine Federal rectangular two and one-half story gable roofed brick residence laid in Flemish bond which is five bays wide. Double hung 6/6 windows, most of which have been replaced, occupy each bay. A double brick belt course is situated in between the first and second level of the residence.

The interior of the building is laid out in a typical Georgian plan with one room opposite each side of a main hall with an open staircase. Much of the woodwork remains intact including a staircase, mantelpieces, beaded baseboards, and wood grained paneled doors.

In 1751 Samuel Plummer, planter and early settler of the New Market area, sold 184 acres of his "Pleasant Meddo" tract to his son, Joseph Plummer, wheelmaker for seven shillings and four pence. Plummer had built the existing brick residence by 1797 when he sold it and the surrounding area to James Adams.

In 1824, the land included not only the house described as "a good two story brick dwelling house and kitchen, a log barn and other outhouses, but also "a Fulling Mill and Saw Mill in good order, and capable of doing much work."

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Joseph Plummer house is a rectangular two story gable roofed brick residence laid in flemish bond which faces south from the north side of Weller Road. The principal facade is five bays in width; the main entrance door is located in the third bay. It is a replaced door with a transom which has been boarded shut. Located in the remaining bay on the first and second levels are double hung 6/6 windows which have been replaced. In between these levels is a brick belt course. There is evidence on the front side of the building that there was a small pedimented entrance porch connected to the front door, which is no longer in existence. The replaced wood shingle roof is connected to the structure by a boxed cornice with a decorative frieze which is very similar to that found on Rock Hall near the Sugarloaf Mountain Johnson Furnace.

On each end of the house is a replaced brick chimney flush with the east and west sides. The house is built on a low random stone foundation. Located on the west end of the building is a one story summer kitchen addition, which is whitewashed brick. Located directly behind the residence is a log smoke house which presently is in deteriorating condition.

The interior of the building is laid out in a typical Georgian plan with one room opposite each said of a main hall with an open staircase. Much of the wood work remains intact including a staircase, mantle pieces and baseboard.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Joseph Plummer house one of only a few large brick residences which date to the eighteenth century is located in the New Market area.

In 1751 Samuel Plummer, planter and early settler of the New Market area sold 184 acres of his "Pleasant Meddo" tract to his son Joseph Plummer, Wheel maker for 7 shillings and 4 pence.¹ It is very likely that the existing brick residence was built by Joseph Plummer since in 1797 he sold 83 acres of the land where the building stands to James Adams for 390 pounds.²

Certainly by 1824, the land included not only the house described as "a good two story brick dwelling house and kitchen, a log barn and other out houses", but also "a Fulling Mill and Saw Mill in good order, and capable of doing much work."³

When James Adams died his executor sold his estate to his wife Lydia who lived in the plantation house until 1847 when she died. There have been only 3 owners since that time until the present.

The Joseph Plummer house is important to the New Market Region not only because of its associations with the Plummer family but also because of its very fine brick Georgian style of architecture.


