The Delashmutt-Utz Farmstead is centered on a circa 1885-1895 frame Queen Anne style house with modern artificial siding and a corrugated roof, with a polygonal end bay, cross gables, and an extensive veranda on the south and west elevations. The property also includes a two-story frame tenant house located so close to the rear wing of the main dwelling that it strongly suggests that it predates the house and was part of an earlier farmstead group. Other contributing outbuildings are a small frame summer kitchen of about 1890, a wagon shed/corn crib, and a hog barn of about 1910. The farmstead is minimally significant for the architecture of the dwelling, which is similar in general features to the John S. Watkins House (F-5-86) near Monrovia, which retains much of its original exterior cladding and roofing. Both houses have the polygonal end bays, cross gables, decorative brackets, and porches which were common features of the Queen Anne style applied to vernacular houses in Frederick County.

CONTRIBUTING RESOURCE COUNT: 5

The Delashmutt-Utz Farmstead is an agricultural complex centered on a circa 1885-1895 frame dwelling in the vernacular Queen Anne style with a polygonal end bay, cross gables, and a deep veranda on two elevations, and its associated outbuildings, which include four contributing and several non-contributing structures. The contributing outbuildings are a two-story frame tenant house which may have been relocated to a position immediately east of the rear wing of the dwelling, a one-story frame summer kitchen, a frame wagon shed/cor crib, and a frame hog barn. The outbuildings range in date from about 1875 to 1910. The farmstead is located east of Mussetter Road at the end of East Hyatt Road near Monrovia, Frederick County, Maryland. Dates for the buildings are based on architectural evidence, land records, and historical maps.

The farmstead is about 500 feet north of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad line along Bush Creek. The setting of the buildings is primarily open fields interspersed with tree lines and clusters of trees. The principal elevation of the house faces south and the agricultural outbuildings are located to the south and west. The summer kitchen and tenant house are located east of the house, as is a non-contributing mobile home. The house exterior is covered with stone-patterned asphalt material and the gables are covered with modern vertical siding. The roof is covered with corrugated metal. The probable original exterior cladding was german siding which may still be in place beneath the artificial siding. The gable ends of the roof and the cross gables on the south elevation and the west side of the rear wing were probably shingled. Each gable still retains a round-arched 1/1 window. The south elevation has five bays with 1/1 sash and louvred shutters. The center entrance has a glass paneled door and a small narrow transom. The one-story veranda extends across the entire south facade and follows the polygonal outline of the west gable end, finally ending at the northwest corner of the rear wing. The porch has Tuscan columns. The polygonal end bay has scalloped brackets at the corners of the gable. A single off-center chimney is located near the junction of the main section and rear wing. The east elevation shows two bays in the main section and a cellar entrance near the northeast corner. The east side of the rear wing has replacement windows including a picture window on the first story. The tenant house is located only about three feet from the east side of the main house rear wing, strongly suggesting that it was either moved to its present location or was associated with a smaller, earlier building on the site of the present house. The interior of the dwelling has been considerably altered, but retains its center hall plan with a deteriorated staircase. No mantelpieces remain in place, although the doorways have bull's-eye corner blocks and fluted trim.

Outbuildings:

Tenant house: The two-story tenant house, as the current residents of the property, the Huebners, refer to it, has a stone foundation, but no cellar. It is in deteriorated condition and has german siding with a corrugated metal roof. An interior chimney is located at the east gable end. The first story on the south

The Delashmutt-Utz Farmstead is minimally significant for the architecture of the main dwelling, an altered example of the vernacular Queen Anne style of the late 19th century. In general form, the house resembles the John S. Watkins House (F-5-86), a circa 1908 frame dwelling near Monrovia. The Watkins House has its original german siding and a pressed metal roof and gable surfaces, as well as gable ornamentation. In its original state, the Delashmutt-Utz House may have been similar. The present house was probably built to replace an earlier structure on the farm owned by Elias L. Delashmutt (1801-1884) as an investment property. Land records indicate that N. L. Beall occupied the Delashmutt property in 1872. The tenant house may have been contemporary with the earlier structure. In 1891, the farmstead was sold in an equity settlement, passing through the hands of two owners in a year before being purchased by Charles M. Utz (1869-1927). Utz may have had the present main dwelling erected.

elevation has a doorway and a single window with some indication in the siding that a porch over the doorway has been removed. The second story has a single window opening. The simple nature of the building's design and materials suggest a date of about 1875 and the land records state that some type of dwelling and outbuildings were in place in 1872. The farm was apparently a tenant farm owned by Elias Delashmutt and occupied by N. L. Beall. The close proximity of the main dwelling to the tenant house seems to indicate that an earlier, smaller house could have been nearby this remaining outbuilding, which could have been a tenant house, a summer kitchen, or a wash house in that earlier complex.

Summer kitchen: The small frame building currently called a summer kitchen is located north of the main dwelling and the tenant house. It has weatherboard siding and a corrugated metal roof. A stovepipe rising from the roof is the only evidence of a heat source. The interior walls are plastered and on the south elevation is a shed porch. A vertical board door is on the south and a single 6/6 window is in the north elevation. The building appears to date from about 1890.

Wagon shed/corn crib: The frame wagon shed/corn crib was probably built about 1900-1910. It stands southwest of the main dwelling and the main opening is on the south elevation. The exterior is covered with vertical siding, including the sides of the cribs. The roof is corrugated metal. Stone piers support the cribs. On the west elevation is a shed addition.

Hog barn: The frame hog barn is located south of the wagon shed. Also built about 1910, it has vertical siding with shed additions on both the north and south elevations. The roof is corrugated metal.


