Description of Property and Justification: *(Please attach map and photo)*

This reconnaissance-level survey was limited to views of the property from the public right-of-way and information found in existing survey data due to no permission to enter the property granted by the owner. Therefore, a comprehensive update of the property cannot be provided at this time, but the overview is sufficient to support a recommendation for NRHP eligibility. Based on 1994 MHT survey data, this farm features two groups of buildings, which have a period of significance ranging from 1865 to 1940. The principal cluster of buildings features a two-story, two-section log and frame dwelling, which dates from circa 1865. The second complex of buildings includes a small log and frame house, which may have been a tenant house, and dates from the same period. Both dwellings have attendant agricultural outbuildings, such as: barns, vehicle and equipment sheds, granaries, wash house, spring house, summer kitchen, milk house, and dairy barn. This 2008 survey identified a large, heavy timber frame, bank barn, a Wisconsin-style dairy barn, a granary with a shed-roof addition for vehicle storage, an equipment shed, and a concrete stave silo with a metal dome roof. Access to the property is necessary to confirm the function, architectural components, and condition of each building, which may contribute to the property's historical and architectural significance. Historic mapping (Lake 1873) indicates a farm at this location operated by J.W. Purdum. The bank barn may date from this period of occupation. The Wisconsin-style dairy barn dates from the mid-twentieth century. The log dwellings may pre-date 1865. Purdum does appear in the annals of Frederick County local history (William and McKinsey 1979) but not as a prominent

individual. Further directed historical research and survey is warranted to establish the NRHP eligibility of this property.

MHT's 1994 survey data on the Josiah W. Purdum Farmstead argues that the property is only minimally significant for its architecture, which reflects the local agricultural and historic development from the mid-nineteenth century to the 1940s, since the property is typical of many farms of the period in Frederick County. However, intensive development of the nearby landscape into residential subdivisions has occurred since the 1994 survey. With the decreasing number of intact examples of Frederick County farms taken into consideration, the significance of the Josiah W. Purdum Farmstead has increased. The farmstead reflects trends in local agricultural history and continues to convey an association with the growth and development of the local community. Additionally, the farm contains well-maintained examples of domestic and agricultural architecture that are significant at the local level. Therefore, the Josiah W. Purdum farmstead is recommended NRHP eligible under Criteria A and C at the local level. Additional survey work is recommended in order to delineate a NRHP boundary and evaluated the contributing resources within the property.



The Josiah W. Purdum Farmstead has two groups of buildings, each with domestic and agricultural buildings. The main group has a log and frame double house with vinyl siding, built by 1865, a log or frame wash house or summer kitchen with an exterior stone and brick chimney, a bank barn, a wagon shed/corn crib, and a mid-20th century concrete block dairy barn and milk house. A stone springhouse probably contemporary with the dwelling is some distance east in a valley between the principal group and the second building group, which is centered on a log and frame tenant house with composition siding. Nearby are a small frame and stone bank barn and a second wagon shed/corn crib. The history of the complex is not entirely clear, but further examination of the buildings and their interiors may offer more definite dating information. Josiah W. Purdum (1808-1886) lived in Montgomery County until his purchase of the farm in 1865. Some buildings and parts of the dwellings may have been in existence by then, but their earlier history has been mostly concealed by later alterations. The farmstead is minimally significant for its representation of a typical mid-19th century farmstead with alterations and additional buildings over a long period ending in the 1940's. Other non-contributing buildings of subsequent dates are also in the group.

The Josiah W. Purdum Farmstead is an agricultural complex with two groups of buildings, the principal of which is centered on a two-story, two-section log and frame dwelling with vinyl siding built about 1865 and the secondary group, centered on a smaller log and frame dwelling built about the same period as a tenant house. Both dwellings have agricultural outbuildings nearby with dates possibly ranging from the 1860's to about 1940. They include frame barns, wagon sheds with corn cribs, and, with the principal group, a frame or log wash house or summer kitchen, and a concrete block dairy barn and milk house. Located in a small stream valley between the two groups of buildings is a stone springhouse. The farmstead is located on the east side of Bartholows Road about 2,000 feet south of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad tracks along the south bank of Bush Creek near Mt. Airy, Frederick County, Maryland. The farmstead is about 1500 feet from Bartholows Road at the end of a driveway across open agricultural fields. The tenant house, a small frame barn, and one of the wagon sheds with cribs is located further to the east from the principal group, but within sight of the main dwelling. Dates for the buildings are based on exterior architectural evidence, land records, historical maps, and a Purdum family biographical entry in the Williams & McKinsey 1910 History of Frederick County. Some features of the buildings strongly suggest a date earlier than 1865, but research and available information did not confirm the possibility. Interior observation could more clearly bracket a date period when the earliest structures were erected.

In the principal building group, the dwelling is the southernmost building and is essentially a long, rectangular building with two three-bay sections joined at the gable ends. The exterior vinyl siding, a one-story porch on the east elevation, and the corrugated metal roof do not completely obscure the different sections. The northernmost three-bay section has a more narrow spandrel space between the bays. This suggests that the northern section was the earlier part, and this may be one of the structures which could date earlier than 1865. An interior chimney between the northern and southern parts also points to this having been the earliest built section. The southern three-bay section has more widely spaced bays and another interior chimney on the south gable end. The one-story porch on the east elevation extends across the entire facade. Each section has a center entry with a glazed panel door under a two-light transom. The windows are 2/2 with louvred shutters. The west elevation has a two-story shed addition on the northern section. This addition has an open porch with a plain balustrade on the second story. The addition conceals the entire first story of the main section. The southernmost section of the dwelling has three bays with a center entrance, reflecting the same configuration as on the east elevation. The north and south gable ends each have two attic windows and the northern end has two bays on the first and second stories. An entry porch with a concrete base and a gable roof occupies the eastern bay. The interior of the house was inaccessible for this survey.

Wash house: The frame or log building located west of the northern section of the house has the exterior form and details of a wash house or summer kitchen of

The Josiah W. Purdum Farmstead is minimally significant in architecture, exemplifying an extended agricultural complex of the mid-19th century with additional outbuildings erected up to the 1940's. The farmstead's principal buildings, the main dwelling and the tenant house, a wash house, a springhouse, and a bank barn, may contain interior and structural evidence of early 19th century building dates, but documentation by historical maps and land records can only verify its existence to about 1865 and the agricultural outbuildings have features placing them in the last half of the 19th century and first half of the 20th century. The buildings are typical of many farms of the period in Frederick County, with modern siding concealing german siding, corrugated metal roofs, frame and concrete block structures predominating in the later buildings. Josiah W. Purdum (1808-1886) was born in Montgomery County and, according to a Purdum family biography in the 1910 History of Frederick County, bought the farm after his marriage, but the purchase apparently took place about 20 years after the marriage date after at least four children had been born. The Purdum family retained the property until 1944.

second quarter of the 19th century. The building has 1-1/2 stories with an exterior stone and brick chimney on the north gable end. The cladding is clapboards and the roof is corrugated metal. On the east elevation is a vertical board door flanked by a narrow 6-light window. On the west elevation is an attached garage shed, built in the early 20th century. Two other non-contributing concrete block garages are located nearby. The wash house is also a building which could have been built prior to 1865.

Dairy barn and milk house: The concrete block dairy barn and milk house are located north of the domestic outbuildings. Built about 1940, the barn has a gambrel roof covered with standing seam metal. The milk house has a gable roof of the same material.

Bank barn: The frame and stone bank barn stands east of the dairy barn. It appears to date from about 1870. The siding is vertical flush boards with louvred arched vents. The roof is corrugated metal. Louvred cupolas are at each of the gable ends. On the east elevation, the stall level has been partially enclosed as a milking parlor used prior to the construction of the dairy barn. A non-contributing concrete silo stands just north of the ramp on the west elevation.

Wagon shed/corn crib: The frame wagon shed/corn crib probably dates from about 1920-1925. It has tongue-and-groove and vertical siding on the gable ends and horizontal vented siding on the crib sides. The roof is covered with corrugated metal.

Springhouse: The stone springhouse is located approximately halfway between the principal building group and the tenant house group in a small valley. The current use of the immediate surroundings is a cow pasture and the building was inaccessible for close observation. It is a rectangular fieldstone building with a corrugated metal roof and a vertical board door on the west elevation. Its material and form suggest a date earlier than 1865.

Tenant house: The two-story log or frame tenant house is located east of the principal building group and the stone springhouse. It has been considerably altered in the mid-20th century with composition siding. It also appears to have been built in two stages. The western section was apparently a two-bay structure with an interior or exterior chimney on the east gable end. This part is most likely of log structure. The eastern single bay section enclosed the chimney. A one-story porch extends across the south elevation and two sections of the porch have been enclosed with vertical boards. The sash is 2/2 with louvred shutters. The porch has turned columns and brackets. The north elevation has a two-story rear wing with an interior end chimney. The roof is corrugated metal. The tenant house may date from 1865, but, as in the principal building, an earlier date may be confirmed by more detailed examination.

Small frame bank barn: The bank barn is located northeast of the tenant house and was not accessible for close observation. It has louvred arched vents and a corrugated metal roof. It appears to have been built about 1870.

Wagon shed/corn crib: The second wagon shed with corn cribs stands west of the bank barn and may have been built about 1900. It has vertical siding and a corrugated metal roof.




