**Description of Property and Eligibility Determination:** *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

The Christian Correll Bank Barn is a historic property located in the Bridgeport Survey District on Taneytown Pike. The Christian Correll Barn is a component of a four-building rural unincorporated hamlet of Bridgeport composed of commercial and residential buildings. It is the only property of the four that is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.


According to the owner, Mr. Edmund Makosky, the Christian Correll Bank Barn was constructed in 1830. It is built of brick with Flemish bond and rests on a stone foundation. Fieldstone encases the walls of the basement on both the north gable end and the west bank elevation while the east lower wall is composed of brickwork. The bank elevation is on the west side of the barn leading to the upper floor hay storage area. Cattle enter the bottom floor stall area through doors beneath the barn's weather boarded jetty overhang on the east elevation. The two gable ends and the west wall have decorative patterns set in the brickwork portraying diamonds, an hourglass, an unfolding lily, and rectangles. Except for the corrugated metal roof, the Christian Correll Bank Barn maintains its integrity of materials and design and appears eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Mr. Makosky is currently using the structure as a cattle barn and has diligently maintained it throughout the years of his ownership.
