The Harbaugh-Willard Farm is a 2 story brick house with a side gable roofline. The building is significant in representing the architecture of a prosperous nineteenth century farm through the proportions and details of the main house. Although vernacular in rendition, the house was executed with slightly higher standards than seen in its neighbors. This up-scale rendition included an elaborate entrance and the use of flemish bond brick work. The farm is also associated with the Harbaughs, an influential family in the region, which is still referred to as the Harbaugh Valley. Its representative domestic and agricultural outbuildings reveal its association with agriculture.

7.1 Description

The Harbaugh-Willard Farm is a 2 story brick house with a side gable roofline located approximately 1/4 miles to the southeast of Sabillasville, Maryland. The principal elevation faces west and contains 3 bays. The farm includes a collection of domestic and agricultural outbuildings.

Resting on a stone foundation, the house consists of flemish bond brickwork on the principal facade and 5 course common bond on the other elevations. Its side gable roof of standing seam tin contains one interior brick end chimney. On the west facade, 6/6 light windows are symmetrically placed on both floors. The side door placement on the first floor contains an elaborate entrance with a fanlight, sidelights and pilasters surrounding a panelled door. A one story hipped roof open porch covers the full facade and has turned columns and carved brackets. A 2 story brick ell addition extends from the east elevation; it contains 5 course common bond brickwork. Its gable roof of composition shingling intersects with the main house gable and contains an interior brick end chimney. The elevation contains 6/6 light windows on the first and second floors and 4 light fixed attic windows. A brick shed addition projects off the brick section and has a shed roofed frame entry hood into the cellar.

The north elevation has symmetrical fenestration with 6/6 light windows in both the main block and the addition. The main block has splayed lintels consisting of 3 stacked soldier courses on the first floor and jack arches on the second. The attic has 4 light fixed windows. The gable end has an incomplete cornice return. The cornice is corbelled. The south elevation has no openings in the main block except for 4 light fixed attic windows. The ell addition is recessed in the center creating a 2 story porch which has been enclosed and sheathed in asphalt shingling. The rest of the ell is flush with the enclosed porch section; it has 6/6 and 1/1 light windows. The brick shed roofed attachment contains a door opening.

Three domestic outbuildings are located within the yard surrounding the house including an frame octagonal chicken coop with 6/6 light windows, a sheep shed with tongue and groove siding, and a one story aluminum sided cottage. Agricultural outbuildings further from the house include a new metal barn with a silo, a gambrel roofed concrete barn and a tractor shed. These buildings are still utilized for agricultural pursuits. A modern rancher house is located several yards from the main house.


8.1 Significance

The Harbaugh-Willard Farm is significant in representing the architecture of a prosperous nineteenth century farm through the proportions and details of the main house. Although vernacular in rendition, the house was executed with slightly higher standards than seen in its neighbors. This up-scale rendition included an elaborate entrance and the use of flemish bond brick work. The farm is also associated with the Harbaughs, an influential family in the region, which is still referred to as the Harbaugh Valley. Its representative domestic and agricultural outbuildings reveal its association with agriculture.

Considered in its historic context, the Harbaugh-Willard Farm contains a high level of integrity. In comparison to other farms in its vicinity, it reveals its importance as a more prosperous farm largely through the architectural detail of the farmhouse. There are fewer brick buildings in this region than in other areas (such as Emmitsburg). Compared to the others, the Harbaugh-Willard Farm appears to have sustained fewer alterations and changes to the main house thus retaining a higher or equal level of integrity. Its agricultural and domestic outbuildings date from the early twentieth century and do not contribute significantly to the resource. Other brick houses with outbuildings more closely associated with the main house may elevate integrity.

The area known as Harbaugh's Valley was originally a Swiss settlement. One of the first settlers was George Harbaugh, a Swiss, who entered the region from Pennsylvania. The Swiss were probably attracted to the familiar landscape of the mountains. The Harbaughs, as a family, grew and prospered, and many Harbaughs still reside in the area to present day. The Harbaugh-Willard Farm was probably constructed by 1930. In 1958, it was owned by J. Harbaugh; in 1873, T. Williar resided there. The Willard family purchased the property in 1937 and have farmed it since that time.

Architecturally, the house shows elements of the transitional period between the Federal and Greek Revival styles particularly with the entrance treatment and the flemish bond brickwork. These stylistic elements were incorporated into the vernacular form that was developing in the region: the 2 story dwelling with a 2 story rear addition. While similar in form to its neighbors, stylistic details elevated the Harbaugh-Willard Farm.
