The Dotterer Farm is significant in representing a late eighteenth century log dwelling house with a later log addition and in representing an intact agricultural and domestic complex dating from that late nineteenth century. The house is unusual in utilizing log construction for the addition and thus demonstrates a progression of log construction techniques from the late eighteenth century into the nineteenth century. Constructed by 1800, the original section (circa 1790) is two stories, sheathed in weatherboard. A later two story addition (circa 1850), also sided in weatherboard, extends from the rear of the original section. Under new ownership in the late 1800s, the farm was upgraded to a more grandiose scale. The dwelling house took on decorative details such as sawtooth bargeboard and a dentilled cornice. A new (circa 1885) barn was constructed with some stylized elements such as brick in the lower level and lattice in the cornice. An extensive collection of agricultural and domestic outbuildings have remained intact and contribute to the complex.

7.1 Description:

The Dotterer Farm is situated on a lane off of Graceham Road approximately one mile from the town of Graceham, Maryland. The two story log and frame dwelling house faces south. An extensive collection of agricultural and domestic outbuildings contribute to the complex.

Constructed by 1800, the house has two sections. The original section (circa 1790) is of log construction, sheathed in weatherboard, and rests on a stone foundation. The facade has 3 asymmetrical bays. The gable roofline is covered in standing seam tin and has a center brick chimney on the ridgeline. Decorative details on this section include a dentilled cornice, sawtooth bargeboard in the gable ends, pendants hanging from the gable peaks and an incomplete cornice return.

A later two story addition (circa 1850) extends from the rear of the original log section; it is possibly of log construction and is sheathed in weatherboard. Resting on a stone foundation, it has a standing seam tin gable roof with a center brick chimney.

The principal facade of the house, facing south, has off-center door placement and two 2/2 windows on the first and second floors. The east and west gable ends have 2/2 windows asymmetrical on the first and second floors and 1 attic window.

The addition extends from the rear (north) facade: the main facade for the addition faces east. The facade has two door openings, one with raised panelling, and 2/2 windows. It is dominated by a 2 story, full facade, open porch that has decorative brackets. The last bay on the second floor of the porch is enclosed. The west elevation has a one story, hipped roof, enclosed sun room running three bays across with 4 light ribbons of windows. The north gable end has asymmetrical placement of 2/2 windows and two 1 light attic windows.

Several domestic outbuildings are clustered near the house several feet to the east. Contemporary to the house are a summer kitchen and a smokehouse. The frame, one story summer kitchen is sheathed in board and batten siding and has a standing seam tin gable roof oriented on a east-west axis. It has 6/6 windows and two door openings. The pyramidal hipped roof smokehouse is located directly across from the summer kitchen. It is also sheathed in board and batten siding. Its door opening faces north. The roof, which is covered in standing seam tin, has a pendant at the peak.

Two other domestic outbuildings date from late nineteenth century ownership: a chicken coop and a hogpen. The long, rectangular chicken coop is situated directly behind the summer kitchen to the north: it is 9 bays long and covered in german siding. Openings include doors and 2/2 windows on the east elevation. Resting on a concrete foundation, it has a shed roof of corrugated tin. The vertical sided hogpen has a gable roof running north to south and is located to the northwest of the house.

7.2 Description

Agricultural outbuildings are located several yards to the north of the dwelling house. Built circa 1885, the bank barn has a stone foundation on the east and west gable ends and a brick foundation on the south elevation. The main story of the barn is sheathed in vertical siding and is covered with a corrugated tin gable roof. Decorative elements include 2-part stable doors on the east elevation with lattice work above, lattice beneath the cornice, and louvred windows and a round window in each gable end. The barn is referred to as a "Sixty-Pie Barn" because it required 60 pies to feed the men who raised it. Connected to the barn is a one story concrete block dairy shed. To the north of the barn, there is a vertical sided wagon shed with a drive-through portion, a vertical sided corncrib with a shed roof, and a vertical sided blacksmith shop with a standing seam tin gable roof.

8.1 Significance:

The house is unusual in utilizing log construction for the addition and thus demonstrates a progression of log construction techniques from the late eighteenth century into the nineteenth century. Under new ownership in late 1800s, the farm was upgraded to a more grandiose scale. The dwelling house took on decorative details such as sawtooth bargeboard and a dentilled cornice. A new barn was constructed with some stylized elements such as brick in the lower level and lattice in the cornice.

Within its historic context, the Dotterer Farm compares to other farms in the region with a high level of integrity. It has retained an intact appearance dating from late nineteenth century. Considered collectively, the complex is unique to the region in demonstrating how an original log dwelling was incorporated into the plan of a new owner, a wealthy nineteenth century farmer, and included a substantial bank barn and other outbuildings.

In 1767, Christian Kuhn (also Coon or Koon) purchased 119 1/4 acres that was part of the "Resurvey of John's Delight" from Henry Bitzell (Land Deed, L, 1213). The house was probably constructed by the Kuhn family by 1800 and is representative of a log dwelling house of early German settlers. At Christian's death in 1806, the property was inherited by his son, Henry Kuhn (Wills, G.M.R.B. 1, 168). Henry bequeathed to his son, Zebulon, "150 acres of the farm on which he now resides" in 1830 (Wills, G.M.E. 1, 550). In 1834, Henry's wife, Elizabeth requested a plat of the 150 acres which showed the following division: first part, "Resurvey on John's Delight", 120 3/4 acres, and the second part, addition to "Saint Elizabeth", 29 1/4 acres. After Zebulon's death in the 1840s, the property became in dispute (Equity Docket 1920). Leonard Picking purchased the property of 194 3/4 acres through a public sale in 1848 for \$1,756.10 (Land Deed, W.B.T. 12, 212).

Leonard Picking and his wife, Cassandra, sold the property of 143 acres in 1857 to John J. Crum (also Krom) for a purchase price of \$4,800 (Land deed, E.S. 10, 257) which had changed to include portions of the "Resurvey on Fountain Low" and "Breeche's Pocket". By 1873, Crum was listed as a principal businessman and producer of Frederick County in Bond's Atlas. It noted that his farm of 170 acres produced wheat, corn, oats, rye, hay, and produce. He was also a dealer in stock. Crum sold the tract of 143 acres in 1891 to Mary E. and Lemuel Dotterer for \$5,720 (Land Deed W.I.P.No.13, 323). Substantial improvements (particularly noted in the construction of a new barn) were made to the property in the late nineteenth century probably after the Dotterer purchase in 1891. The property has remained in the Dotterer family to present day.

Remnants of a lime kiln exist in a field on the property. According to local legend, stone used for the construction of the state capital was obtained at this kiln.


