Red Bird Lane is located on the northern edge of Catoctin Furnace, Maryland. A row of six log houses, probable "worker's housing", is situated on Red Bird Lane. All of the buildings sit on the east side of the road, facing the west. One of the houses that has retained a high level of integrity is located on 6822 Red Bird Lane. Constructed circa 1900, this 1 & 1/2 story log building is sheathed in german siding. It represents the concentration of six log houses. Almost identical in plan and form, these buildings exemplify the use of vernacular log building into the twentieth century. They may have served as worker's housing for the nearby furnace.

7.1 Description:

Red Bird Lane is located on the northern edge of Catoctin Furnace, Maryland. A row of six log houses, probable "worker's housing, is situated on Red Bird Lane. All of the buildings sit on the east side of the road, facing the west.

The six buildings have the same original plan and form and are of log construction. Three of the buildings are sheathed in aluminum siding, two, in german siding, and one, in asphalt shingling. All of the houses are 1 & 1/2 stories. They vary in width from 2 to 4 bays with one being a double pen log plan (6814 Red Bird Lane). The gable rooflines are oriented on a north-south axis.

One of the houses that has retained a high level of integrity is located on 6822 Red Bird Lane. Constructed circa 1900, this 1 & 1/2 story log building is sheathed in german siding. The gable roof of standing seam tin has one exterior end concrete chimney. A one story german-sided addition with a standing seam tin gable roof extends from the rear elevation. It has a center concrete chimney.

The main (west) elevation has a center door and two 3/1 windows on the first floor and two 4 & 4 casement windows on the upper half floor. A one story open porch covers the three bays with square columns on a concrete base. The east elevation has 3/1 windows on the first floor and 4 & 4 casement windows on the upper half floor. The north and south gable ends have 3/1 windows and 1/1 attic windows.

The addition has pairs of 3/1 windows on the north and south elevations. A small enclosed porch with a shed roof projects from the east elevation. It also has 3/1 paired windows.


A cluster of domestic outbuildings is situated to the east of the house. A one story german sided washhouse has a gable roof of standing seam tin running east to west. There are two 6/6 windows and a center door on the south elevation. There is a one story concrete building next to the washhouse. A tongue and grooved outhouse is located several feet from the washhouse next to a vertical sided shed. A german-sided chicken coop (furthest from the house) has a shed roof.

8.1 Significance


The Red Bird Lane House represents a concentration of six log houses in close proximity to Catoctin Furnace. Almost identical in plan and form, these buildings exemplify the use of vernacular log building into the twentieth century. They may have served as worker's housing for the nearby furnace.

Other concentrations of buildings that suggest worker's housing are located in other sections of Catoctin Furnace and in Thurmont. Some later forms are the shotgun house while others are simple frame dwellings. The houses on Red Bird Lane may be the only concentration of identical log buildings dating from circa 1900. Overall, they have retained a good level of integrity.

These dwelling units were probably constructed by 1900. The iron works at Catoctin Furnace operated from the eighteenth century through 1910 and produced pig iron (Williams, Vol. I, 342). The company began to decline in the late nineteenth century due to increased competition from larger companies in the country.
