7.1 Description

The Legore Quarry Workers Housing - Legore Bridge Road is a group of 12 dwelling houses of two distinct types built in the late 19th and early 20th centuries on the east and west sides of Legore Bridge Road about 1/2 mile north of the Legore Quarry near Woodsboro, Maryland. Five of the houses are 2 story frame constructed with gable roofs and appear to date from the 1890's; the remaining seven are brick, four-square, hipped roof buildings apparently built about 1910. The frame houses are located along the west side of Legore Bridge Road and the brick houses are on the east side.

Four of the frame houses share an identical plan roughly square in shape with a gable facade on the east elevation. They are two stories in height with two bays in the principal facade. The entrance is centered between the 2 bays. Shed porches with turned columns are present on each house. The siding is clapboard and the roofs are standing seam tin with two interior chimneys. Most window sash is 6/6. Nearly all the houses have shed additions on the south elevations. The four houses are widely but regularly spaced along the road with similar set backs. The fifth frame house is unlike the others, being located off the road by about fifty yards behind screening trees and having a different plan. It is two stories with a rectangular plan plus a rear ell and the entrance in the long side. The exterior is also clapboard and the roof is standing seam tin. Several additions dating from different periods in the early 20th century have been built on the house.

The seven brick houses are located along the east side of Legore Bridge Road. Most have stretcher bond exterior walls, standing seam hipped tin roofs and three-bay main elevations. Entry porches are on all the houses. The window arches are segmental; all sash is 2/2. Some roofs have been replaced with composition shingles and two houses have vinyl siding. One house has a stucco exterior.



8.1 Significance

The Legore Quarry Workers Housing - Legore Bridge Road is one of 4 groups of company housing associated with the Legore Quarry, established in 1861. Each group has different types of houses and floor plans. The Legore Bridge Road group is unique among the housing for the two floor plans, and apparently different building periods. The reason may be related to their occupants status within the company or fluctuations in company fortunes. Architecturally, the frame houses reflect vernacular housing commonly found in rural areas in the late 19th century and the brick four-square houses also are typical dwelling houses of the early 20th century. The defining factors in these houses is their unified siting, original materials, plans, and use.

The Legore Bridge Road workers housing was compared architecturally to rural and small town vernacular dwellings in Frederick County. No other area of the county is known at this time to have comparable "company towns" of the late 19th and 20th centuries. Although workers houses near the Catoctin Furnace undoubtedly exist, they are loosely organized and do not have the immediate visual distinction as provided industrial living quarters as the several groups of quarry housing. The Legore housing groups need more research into their construction, relation to the quarries' operating history, and architectural description and floor plans of the interiors.
